- A person who is blamed for the wrongdoings, mistakes, or faults of others, especially for reasons of expediency.

Appropriate (property) for public use.

**condemn**Most leaders roundly **condemn**ed the attack.



**condemning** Containing or imposing condemnation or censure.

The action of plotting or conspiring.

**conspiracy**A **conspiracy** to destroy the government.

The analysis and judgement of the merits and faults of a literary or

**criticism** artistic work.

He ignored the **criticism**s of his friends.

curse Invoke or use a curse against.

He **curse**d loudly as he burned his hand.

**defraud**Illegally obtain money from (someone) by deception.

He used a second identity to **defraud** the bank of thousands of pounds.

Fool or hoax.

**dupe**The immigrant was **dupe**d because he trusted everyone.

Foolish silly.

**fool** He **fool**ed nightclub managers into believing he was a successful

businessman.

Make someone feel guilty especially in order to induce them to do

something.

guilt

He remembered with sudden guilt the letter from his mother that he had

not yet read.

**idiot** A person of low intelligence.

incrimination An accusation that you are responsible for some lapse or misdeed.

His **incrimination** was based on my testimony.

indict Accuse formally of a crime.

His former manager was **indict**ed for fraud.

infamy

A state of extreme dishonor- F.D.Roosevelt.

He thrived on the **infamy** and vilification.

A form of untrustworthiness; the trait of lacking a sense of responsibility

**irresponsibility** and not feeling accountable for your actions.

The economic ills are a consequence of greed and irresponsibility.

**opprobrium**An occasion or cause of reproach or disgrace.

The critical **opprobrium** generated by his films.

A person who is easily taken advantage of, especially by being cheated or

**patsy** blamed for something.

There is a mischievous sparkle in his eyes that suggests he is no patsy.

Impose a penalty on inflict punishment on.

**punish**I have done wrong and I m being **punish**ed for it.



reproach

recrimination An accusation in response to one from someone else.

There are no tears no **recrimination**s.

In the Roman Catholic Church a set of antiphons and responses for Good

Friday representing the reproaches of Christ to his people.

He gave her a look of **reproach**.

A fraudulent business scheme.

An insurance scam.

scold Censure severely or angrily.

His mother was the village **scold**.

sucker Of a plant produce suckers.

The **sucker**s run along each tentacle.

A long, angry speech of criticism or accusation.

A tirade of abuse.

**victim** A living creature killed as a religious sacrifice.

Sacrificial **victim**s for the ritual festivals.
