
## Scarce as an Adjective

#### Definitions of "Scarce" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "scarce" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Occurring in small numbers or quantities; rare.
- Deficient in quantity or number compared with the demand.
- (especially of food, money, or some other resource) insufficient for the demand.






## Synonyms of "Scarce" as an adjective (17 Words)

<u>deficient</u>	Falling short of some prescribed norm. <b>Deficient</b> in common sense.
few and far between	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by `a'; a small but indefinite number.
hard to come by	Very strong or vigorous.
hard to find	Not easy; requiring great physical or mental effort to accomplish or comprehend or endure.
in short supply	Holding office.
<u>inadequate</u>	Not sufficient to meet a need. An <b>inadequate</b> income.
<u>insufficient</u>	Of a quantity not able to fulfill a need or requirement. There was <b>insufficient</b> evidence to convict him.
lacking	Nonexistent. There was something <b>lacking</b> in our marriage.
meagre	(of something provided or available) lacking in quantity or quality. A <b>meagre</b> diet of bread and beans.



not enough	Sufficient for the purpose.
<u>rare</u>	(of meat) cooked a short time; still red inside. What is so <b>rare</b> as a day in June.
scant	Barely sufficient or adequate. A <b>scant</b> cup of sugar.
scanty	Small or insufficient in quantity or amount. They paid whatever they could out of their <b>scanty</b> wages to their families.
short	Tending to crumble or break into flakes due to a large amount of shortening. They have been backed at <b>short</b> odds to win thousands of pounds.
<u>sparse</u>	Scanty; in short supply. Areas of <b>sparse</b> population.
thin on the ground	Lacking excess flesh-Shakespeare.
wanting	Nonexistent. The English batting technique has been found <b>wanting</b> .







#### **Usage Examples of "Scarce" as an adjective**

- The freshwater shrimp becomes scarce in soft water.
- As raw materials became scarce, synthetics were developed.
- Fresh vegetables were scarce during the drought.

#### Definitions of "Scarce" as an adverb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "scarce" as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- Only a very short time before.
- Almost not.
- Scarcely.





## Synonyms of "Scarce" as an adverb (4 Words)

**barely** In a sparse or scanty way.

It was **barely** 5 a m.

- **hardly** No or not (suggesting surprise at or disagreement with a statement. The little house in which he lived was **hardly** bigger than a hut.
- just Indicating exactness or preciseness. They were **just** interested in making money. Almost not.
- scarcely They could scarcely all be wrong.





### Usage Examples of "Scarce" as an adverb

- He was scarce sixteen years old.
- They scarcely ever used the emergency generator.
- Had scarcely rung the bell when the door flew open.
- Would have scarce arrived before she would have found some excuse to leave.
- A babe scarce two years old.

adequacy	The quality of being sufficient for the end in view. <i>He questioned the adequacy of the usual sentimental interpretation of the Golden Rule.</i>
<u>barely</u>	Only a very short time before. She nodded <b>barely</b> able to speak.
coincidentally	Happening at the same time. <i>The report should be published</i> <b>coincidentally</b> with the letter.
curio	A rare, unusual, or intriguing object. They had such fun over the wonderful box of <b>curio</b> s that Jack had sent from India.



<u>deficient</u>	Insufficient or inadequate. A <b>deficient</b> education.
<u>hardly</u>	Only a very short time before. The party had <b>hardly</b> started when the police arrived.
<u>inadequate</u>	Of insufficient quantity to meet a need. <i>Inadequate funding</i> .
infrequently	Not often; rarely. A storage area for <b>infrequently</b> used items.
<u>insufficient</u>	Of a quantity not able to fulfill a need or requirement. <i>Insufficient</i> funds.
limited	Not unlimited. The legislation has had a <b>limited</b> effect.
<u>meager</u>	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i>Meager</i> resources.
meagerly	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. These voices are <b>meagerly</b> represented at the conference.
measly	Contemptibly small in amount. A <b>measly</b> tip.
occasional	Occurring from time to time. An <b>occasional</b> worker.
paucity	The presence of something in only small or insufficient quantities or amounts. A <b>paucity</b> of information.
pittance	A pious bequest to a religious house or order to provide extra food and wine at particular festivals, or on the anniversary of the benefactor's death. <i>He paid his workers a <b>pittance</b></i> .
<u>rare</u>	Recurring only at long intervals. <i>He plays with <b>rare</b> sensitivity.</i>
rarefaction	A decrease in the density of something. The cord has undergone <b>rarefaction</b> .
<u>rarely</u>	Not often. We <b>rarely</b> met.
rareness	Noteworthy scarcity.
<u>rarity</u>	Something unusual — perhaps worthy of collecting. The <b>rarity</b> of the condition.
scant	Deal with inadequately; neglect. The press regularly <b>scant</b> s a host of issues relating to safety and health.



scanty	Short underpants for women or children (usually used in the plural. <i>Her dress was <b>scanty</b></i> and <i>revealing</i> .
<u>seldom</u>	Not often. He was <b>seldom</b> absent.
<u>sometimes</u>	On certain occasions or in certain cases but not always. <b>Sometimes</b> I want to do things on my own.
<u>sparse</u>	Thinly dispersed or scattered. Areas of <b>sparse</b> population.
sparsely	In a thinly dispersed manner; in small numbers. A <b>sparsely</b> populated region.
<u>sporadic</u>	Recurring in scattered and irregular or unpredictable instances. <i>Sporadic</i> fighting broke out.
sporadically	In a sporadic manner. He worked <b>sporadically</b> at part time jobs.
subsist	Be attributable to. The peace <b>subsist</b> ed between 1303 and 1324.
