## **Scarred as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Scarred" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “scarred” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Deeply affected or marked by mental or physical pain or injury.*
- *Blemished by injury or rough wear.*



## Synonyms of "Scarred" as an adjective (1 Word)

**marred** Blemished by injury or rough wear.  
*Walls **marred** by graffiti.*

## Associations of "Scarred" (30 Words)

- accident** An event that happens by chance or that is without apparent or deliberate cause.  
*The pregnancy was an **accident**.*
- ache** Have a desire for something or someone who is not present.  
*My legs **ached** from the previous day s exercise.*
- aching** A dull persistent (usually moderately intense) pain.  
*My **aching** head.*
- afflicted** Mentally or physically unfit.
- battle** Battle or contend against in or as if in a battle.  
*Grant won a decisive victory in the **battle** of Chickamauga.*

<b>bleeding</b>	Used for emphasis, or to express annoyance. <i>She looks so <b>bleeding</b> bored all day.</i>
<b>bruise</b>	Inflict a bruise or bruises on a part of the body. <i>I will admit that my pride was <b>bruised</b> by his comment.</i>
<b>casualty</b>	Someone injured or killed in an accident. <i>He went to <b>casualty</b> to have a cut stitched.</i>
<b>damage</b>	Suffer or be susceptible to damage. <i>How much is the <b>damage</b>.</i>
<b>damaged</b>	Harmed or injured or spoiled. <i>I won't buy <b>damaged</b> goods.</i>
<b>disfigure</b>	Spoil the appearance of. <i>The vandals <b>disfigured</b> the statue.</i>
<b>dysfunctional</b>	Impaired in function; especially of a bodily system or organ. <i><b>Dysfunctional</b> families.</i>
<b>fatality</b>	A death resulting from an accident or a disaster. <i>A sense of <b>fatality</b> gripped her.</i>
<b>harm</b>	Cause or do harm to. <i>This could <b>harm</b> his World Cup prospects.</i>
<b>hurt</b>	Hurt the feelings of. <i>Ow You're <b>hurting</b> me.</i>
<b>impaired</b>	Mentally or physically unfit. <i>An <b>impaired</b> banking system.</i>
<b>injure</b>	Suffer physical harm or damage to (a part of one's body). <i>He <b>injured</b> his back helping the girl.</i>
<b>injured</b>	Emotionally hurt or upset or annoyed. <i><b>Injured</b> feelings.</i>
<b>irreversibly</b>	In a way that cannot be undone or altered. <i>Our landscape will be <b>irreversibly</b> damaged.</i>
<b>lacerate</b>	Having edges that are jagged from injury. <i>The point had <b>lacerated</b> his neck.</i>
<b>marred</b>	Blemished by injury or rough wear. <i>Walls <b>marred</b> by graffiti.</i>
<b>mentally</b>	In a manner relating to the mind. <i>Soldiers become physically and <b>mentally</b> exhausted.</i>
<b>painfully</b>	In a painful manner or to a painful degree. <i>His ignorance was <b>painfully</b> obvious.</i>

<b>rehabilitate</b>	Restore (someone) to health or normal life by training and therapy after imprisonment, addiction, or illness. <i>The campaign aims to <b>rehabilitate</b> the river s flood plain.</i>
<b>sepsis</b>	A serious condition resulting from the presence of harmful microorganisms in the blood or other tissues and the body's response to their presence, potentially leading to the malfunctioning of various organs, shock, and death.
<b>sore</b>	Extremely; severely. <i>They were <b>sore</b> afraid.</i>
<b>suffer</b>	Undergo or suffer. <i>He <b>suffered</b> the penalty.</i>
<b>twinge</b>	A sudden, sharp localized pain. <i>Kate felt a <b>twinge</b> of guilt.</i>
<b>unrepaired</b>	Unserviceable because necessary repairs have not been made.
<b>wounded</b>	People who are wounded. <i>They had to leave the <b>wounded</b> where they fell.</i>
