Scarred as an Adjective

Definitions of "Scarred" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “scarred” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Deeply affected or marked by mental or physical pain or injury.*
- *Blemished by injury or rough wear.*



Synonyms of "Scarred" as an adjective (1 Word)

marred Blemished by injury or rough wear.
*Walls **marred** by graffiti.*



Usage Examples of "Scarred" as an adjective

- *Could her scarred mind ever be free of fear?*
- *The scarred piano bench.*
- *The fire left her arm badly scarred.*
- *A face scarred by anxiety.*



Associations of "Scarred" (30 Words)

accident

An event that happens by chance or that is without apparent or deliberate cause.

*The pregnancy was an **accident**.*

ache

Have a desire for something or someone who is not present.

*My legs **ached** from the previous day's exercise.*

aching

A dull persistent (usually moderately intense) pain.

*My **aching** head.*

afflicted

Mentally or physically unfit.

battle

Battle or contend against in or as if in a battle.

*Grant won a decisive victory in the **battle** of Chickamauga.*

bleeding	Used for emphasis, or to express annoyance. <i>She looks so bleeding bored all day.</i>
bruise	Inflict a bruise or bruises on a part of the body. <i>I will admit that my pride was bruised by his comment.</i>
casualty	Someone injured or killed in an accident. <i>He went to casualty to have a cut stitched.</i>
damage	Suffer or be susceptible to damage. <i>How much is the damage.</i>
damaged	Harmed or injured or spoiled. <i>I won't buy damaged goods.</i>
disfigure	Spoil the appearance of. <i>The vandals disfigured the statue.</i>
dysfunctional	Impaired in function; especially of a bodily system or organ. <i>Dysfunctional families.</i>
fatality	A death resulting from an accident or a disaster. <i>A sense of fatality gripped her.</i>
harm	Cause or do harm to. <i>This could harm his World Cup prospects.</i>
hurt	Hurt the feelings of. <i>Ow You're hurting me.</i>
impaired	Mentally or physically unfit. <i>An impaired banking system.</i>
injure	Suffer physical harm or damage to (a part of one's body). <i>He injured his back helping the girl.</i>
injured	Emotionally hurt or upset or annoyed. <i>Injured feelings.</i>
irreversibly	In a way that cannot be undone or altered. <i>Our landscape will be irreversibly damaged.</i>
lacerate	Having edges that are jagged from injury. <i>The point had lacerated his neck.</i>
marred	Blemished by injury or rough wear. <i>Walls marred by graffiti.</i>
mentally	In a manner relating to the mind. <i>Soldiers become physically and mentally exhausted.</i>
painfully	In a painful manner or to a painful degree. <i>His ignorance was painfully obvious.</i>

rehabilitate	Restore (someone) to health or normal life by training and therapy after imprisonment, addiction, or illness. <i>The campaign aims to rehabilitate the river s flood plain.</i>
sepsis	A serious condition resulting from the presence of harmful microorganisms in the blood or other tissues and the body's response to their presence, potentially leading to the malfunctioning of various organs, shock, and death.
sore	Extremely; severely. <i>They were sore afraid.</i>
suffer	Undergo or suffer. <i>He suffered the penalty.</i>
twinge	A sudden, sharp localized pain. <i>Kate felt a twinge of guilt.</i>
unrepaired	Unserviceable because necessary repairs have not been made.
wounded	People who are wounded. <i>They had to leave the wounded where they fell.</i>
