shot	Tiny lead pellets used in quantity in a single charge or cartridge in a shotgun. <i>Several of the competitors will have a shot at the all round title.</i>
tantrum	A display of bad temper. <i>She threw a tantrum.</i>
view	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. <i>Strong political views.</i>
<u>vista</u>	A mental view of a succession of remembered or anticipated events. <i>Sweeping lawns and landscaped vistas.</i>

*The conference took place against a **backdrop** of increasing diplomatic activity.*

Form a background to.

*The embassy filled him in on the **background** of the incident.*

circumstance

The set of facts or circumstances that surround a situation or event.

*They were thrown together by **circumstance**.*

circumstances	Your overall circumstances or condition in life including everything that happens to you. <i>A victim of circumstances.</i>
cityscape	A viewpoint toward a city or other heavily populated area. <i>Shades of red brick which once coloured the cityscape.</i>
condition	The procedure that is varied in order to estimate a variable's effect by comparison with a control condition. <i>A skin condition.</i>
diorama	A picture (or series of pictures) representing a continuous scene.
elemental	A supernatural entity or force thought to be physically manifested by occult means. <i>Elemental sulphur.</i>
environment	The setting or conditions in which a particular activity is carried on. <i>The impact of pesticides on the environment.</i>
environmental	Concerned with the ecological effects of altering the environment. <i>Environmental tourism.</i>
foreground	Move into the foreground to make more visible or prominent. <i>Sexual relationships are foregrounded and idealized.</i>
innate	Not established by conditioning or learning. <i>Her innate capacity for organization.</i>
landscape	The genre of landscape painting. <i>The soft colours of the Northumbrian landscape.</i>
locale	The scene of any event or action (especially the place of a meeting). <i>Her summers were spent in a variety of exotic locales.</i>
nature	The essential qualities or characteristics by which something is recognized. <i>It is the nature of fire to burn.</i>
panorama	An unbroken view of the whole region surrounding an observer. <i>The tower offers a wonderful panorama of Prague.</i>
panoramic	(of a view or picture) with a wide view surrounding the observer; sweeping. <i>His panoramic vision of post World War I peace.</i>
pomp	Cheap or pretentious or vain display. <i>I perceived Captain Delmar in all the pomp and pride of full uniform.</i>
scenery	The painted structures of a stage set that are intended to suggest a particular locale. <i>They worked all night painting the scenery.</i>

scenic	Used of locations; having beautiful natural scenery. <i>Scenic drives.</i>
setting	The context and environment in which something is set. <i>Short stories with a contemporary setting.</i>
situation	Physical position in relation to the surroundings. <i>Eternal truths will be neither true nor eternal unless they have fresh meaning for every new social situation.</i>
surrounding	All round a particular place or thing. <i>Cardiff and the surrounding area.</i>
surroundings	The environmental condition. <i>I took up the time admiring my surroundings.</i>
sylvan	Relating to or characteristic of wooded regions. <i>A shady sylvan glade.</i>
terms	Status with respect to the relations between people or groups. <i>He got his new car on excellent terms.</i>
unsanitary	Not sanitary or healthful. <i>Grim and unsanitary conditions.</i>
view	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. <i>He tried to get a better view of it.</i>
vista	The visual percept of a region. <i>Sweeping lawns and landscaped vistas.</i>
within	On the inside. <i>Enquire within.</i>
