<b>setting</b>	A mounting consisting of a piece of metal (as in a ring or other jewelry) that holds a gem in place. <i>A place <b>setting</b> of sterling flatware.</i>
<b>shot</b>	Tiny lead pellets used in quantity in a single charge or cartridge in a shotgun. <i>Several of the competitors will have a <b>shot</b> at the all round title.</i>
<b>tantrum</b>	A display of bad temper. <i>She threw a <b>tantrum</b>.</i>
<b>view</b>	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. <i>Strong political <b>views</b>.</i>
<b>vista</b>	A mental view of a succession of remembered or anticipated events. <i>Sweeping lawns and landscaped <b>vistas</b>.</i>

<b>circumstances</b>	Your overall circumstances or condition in life including everything that happens to you. <i>A victim of <b>circumstances</b>.</i>
<b>cityscape</b>	A viewpoint toward a city or other heavily populated area. <i>Shades of red brick which once coloured the <b>cityscape</b>.</i>
<b>condition</b>	The procedure that is varied in order to estimate a variable's effect by comparison with a control condition. <i>A skin <b>condition</b>.</i>
<b>diorama</b>	A picture (or series of pictures) representing a continuous scene.
<b>elemental</b>	A supernatural entity or force thought to be physically manifested by occult means. <i><b>Elemental</b> sulphur.</i>
<b>environment</b>	The setting or conditions in which a particular activity is carried on. <i>The impact of pesticides on the <b>environment</b>.</i>
<b>environmental</b>	Concerned with the ecological effects of altering the environment. <i><b>Environmental</b> tourism.</i>
<b>foreground</b>	Move into the foreground to make more visible or prominent. <i>Sexual relationships are <b>foregrounded</b> and idealized.</i>
<b>innate</b>	Not established by conditioning or learning. <i>Her <b>innate</b> capacity for organization.</i>
<b>landscape</b>	The genre of landscape painting. <i>The soft colours of the Northumbrian <b>landscape</b>.</i>
<b>locale</b>	The scene of any event or action (especially the place of a meeting). <i>Her summers were spent in a variety of exotic <b>locales</b>.</i>
<b>nature</b>	The essential qualities or characteristics by which something is recognized. <i>It is the <b>nature</b> of fire to burn.</i>
<b>panorama</b>	An unbroken view of the whole region surrounding an observer. <i>The tower offers a wonderful <b>panorama</b> of Prague.</i>
<b>panoramic</b>	(of a view or picture) with a wide view surrounding the observer; sweeping. <i>His <b>panoramic</b> vision of post World War I peace.</i>
<b>pomp</b>	Cheap or pretentious or vain display. <i>I perceived Captain Delmar in all the <b>pomp</b> and pride of full uniform.</i>
<b>scenery</b>	The painted structures of a stage set that are intended to suggest a particular locale. <i>They worked all night painting the <b>scenery</b>.</i>

<b>scenic</b>	Used of locations; having beautiful natural scenery. <i><b>Scenic</b> drives.</i>
<b>setting</b>	The context and environment in which something is set. <i>Short stories with a contemporary <b>setting</b>.</i>
<b>situation</b>	Physical position in relation to the surroundings. <i>Eternal truths will be neither true nor eternal unless they have fresh meaning for every new social <b>situation</b>.</i>
<b>surrounding</b>	All round a particular place or thing. <i>Cardiff and the <b>surrounding</b> area.</i>
<b>surroundings</b>	The environmental condition. <i>I took up the time admiring my <b>surroundings</b>.</i>
<b>sylvan</b>	Relating to or characteristic of wooded regions. <i>A shady <b>sylvan</b> glade.</i>
<b>terms</b>	Status with respect to the relations between people or groups. <i>He got his new car on excellent <b>terms</b>.</i>
<b>unsanitary</b>	Not sanitary or healthful. <i>Grim and <b>unsanitary</b> conditions.</i>
<b>view</b>	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. <i>He tried to get a better <b>view</b> of it.</i>
<b>vista</b>	The visual percept of a region. <i>Sweeping lawns and landscaped <b>vistas</b>.</i>
<b>within</b>	On the inside. <i>Enquire <b>within</b>.</i>
