## Schedule as a Noun

### Definitions of "Schedule" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “schedule” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A timetable.*
- *An appendix to a formal document or statute, especially as a list, table, or inventory.*
- *A plan for carrying out a process or procedure, giving lists of intended events and times.*
- *An ordered list of times at which things are planned to occur.*
- *One's day-to-day plans or timetable.*
- *A temporally organized plan for matters to be attended to.*
- *(with reference to the British system of income tax) any of the forms (named ‘A’, ‘B’, etc.) issued for completion and relating to the various classes into which taxable income is divided.*

<b>agenda</b>	A temporally organized plan for matters to be attended to. <i>The government had its own <b>agenda</b>.</i>
<b>appointment book</b>	The act of putting a person into a non-elective position.
<b><u>calendar</u></b>	A book in which to note daily appointments. <i>The social <b>calendar</b>.</i>
<b>catalogue</b>	A series of unwelcome or unpleasant things. <i>A mail order <b>catalogue</b>.</i>
<b>diary</b>	A book in which one keeps a daily record of events and experiences. <i>The City <b>Diary</b>.</i>
<b>docket</b>	A voucher entitling the holder to receive or obtain delivery of goods ordered. <i>One new case on the <b>docket</b> from Florida.</i>
<b>inventory</b>	A collection of resources. <i>They carried a vast <b>inventory</b> of hardware.</i>
<b>list</b>	A formal structure analogous to a list by which items of data can be stored or processed in a definite order. <i>Consult the <b>list</b> of drugs on page 326.</i>
<b>list of appointments</b>	The property possessed by a line or surface that departs from the vertical.

<b>plan</b>	A drawing or diagram made by projection on a horizontal plane especially one showing the layout of a building or one floor of a building. <i>The UN peace <b>plan</b>.</i>
<b>programme</b>	A presentation or item on television or radio, especially one broadcast regularly between stated times. <i>An extensive <b>programme</b> of reforms.</i>
<b>scheme</b>	A particular ordered system or arrangement. <i>A classical rhyme <b>scheme</b>.</i>
<b>social calendar</b>	A party of people assembled to promote sociability and communal activity.
<b>timetable</b>	A chart showing how the weekly time of a school or college is allotted to classes. <i>Science students had very full <b>timetables</b>.</i>

## Schedule as a Verb

### Definitions of "Schedule" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "schedule" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Arrange or plan (an event) to take place at a particular time.*
- *Make a schedule; plan the time and place for events.*
- *Plan for an activity or event.*
- *Make arrangements for (someone or something) to do something.*
- *Include (a building or site) in a list for legal preservation or protection.*

### arrange

Arrange attractively.

*Can you **arrange** a meeting with the President.*

### book

Register in a hotel booker.

*Her agent had **booked** her for several concerts in Tokyo.*

### **fix a time for**

Put (something somewhere) firmly.

### **line up**

Mark with lines.

### **make arrangements for** Perform or carry out.

<b>organize</b>	Cause to be structured or ordered or operating according to some principle or idea. <i>Social programmes are <b>organized</b> by the school.</i>
<b>plan</b>	Make plans for something. <i><b>Plan</b> an attack.</i>
<b>programme</b>	Write a computer program. <i>We learn how to <b>programme</b> our own lives.</i>
<b>set up</b>	Adapt for performance in a different way.
<b>slot in</b>	Assign a time slot.
<b>time</b>	Regulate or set the time of. <i>Williams <b>timed</b> his pass perfectly from about thirty yards.</i>
<b>timetable</b>	Schedule (something) to take place at a particular time. <i>German lessons were <b>timetabled</b> on Wednesday and Friday.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Schedule" as a verb

- *The release of the single is scheduled for April.*
- *He is scheduled to be released from prison this spring.*
- *I scheduled an exam for this afternoon.*
- *I've scheduled a concert next week.*
- *Cowley Bridge has already been scheduled and protected as an ancient monument.*



## Associations of "Schedule" (30 Words)

- almanac** A handbook, typically published annually, containing information of general interest or on a sport or pastime.
- annual** An annual plant.  
*Annual* or yearly income.
- annually** Without missing a year.  
*The prize is awarded annually.*



<b>biennial</b>	Botany a plant having a life cycle that normally takes two seasons from germination to death to complete flowering biennials usually bloom and fruit in the second season. <i>Parsnips and carrots are <b>biennial</b> plants often grown as annuals.</i>
<b>bimonthly</b>	Every two months. <i><b>Bimonthly</b> visits.</i>
<b>biweekly</b>	Every two weeks. <i>She followed her doctor s instructions to undergo health checks <b>biweekly</b>.</i>
<b>busy</b>	Keep busy with. <i>The <b>busy</b> city streets.</i>
<b>calendar</b>	Enter something in a calendar or timetable. <i>The social <b>calendar</b>.</i>
<b>customarily</b>	In a way which follows customs or usual practices; usually. <i>The leaves are <b>customarily</b> used for animal fodder.</i>
<b>daily</b>	A newspaper that is published every day. <i><b>Daily</b> routine.</i>
<b>date</b>	Sweet edible fruit of the date palm with a single long woody seed. <i>1066 is the most famous <b>date</b> in English history.</i>
<b>day</b>	The part of a day spent working. <i>They only met a few <b>days</b> ago.</i>
<b>diary</b>	A column in a newspaper or magazine giving news or gossip on a particular topic. <i>The City <b>Diary</b>.</i>
<b>diurnal</b>	Of or during the day. <i><b>Diurnal</b> flowers are open during the day and closed at night.</i>
<b>dossier</b>	A collection of papers containing detailed information about a particular person or subject (usually a person's record). <i>We have a <b>dossier</b> on him.</i>
<b>feverish</b>	Of or relating to or characterized by fever. <i>A <b>feverish</b> cold.</i>
<b>frenetic</b>	Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion. <i>A <b>frenetic</b> pace of activity.</i>
<b>hectic</b>	A hectic fever or flush. <i>A <b>hectic</b> business schedule.</i>
<b>month</b>	A period of time between the same dates in successive calendar months. <i>The first six <b>months</b> of 1992.</i>

<b>monthly</b>	A periodical that is published every month (or 12 issues per year). <i>Monthly payments.</i>
<b>periodic</b>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The <b>periodic</b> appearance of the seventeen year locust.</i>
<b>periodical</b>	Happening or recurring at regular intervals. <i>She took <b>periodical</b> gulps of her tea.</i>
<b>periodically</b>	In a sporadic manner. <i>The students received help from a friend only <b>periodically</b>.</i>
<b>quarterly</b>	In diagonally opposed quarters of an escutcheon. <i>Interest is paid <b>quarterly</b>.</i>
<b>regularly</b>	In a regular way without variation. <i><b>Regularly</b> spaced buildings.</i>
<b>timetable</b>	Schedule (something) to take place at a particular time. <i>German lessons were <b>timetabled</b> on Wednesday and Friday.</i>
<b>uniformly</b>	In a way that is the same in all cases and at all times. <i>Water can be applied <b>uniformly</b> to crops using precision irrigation.</i>
<b>weekly</b>	A periodical that is published every week (or 52 issues per year). <i><b>Weekly</b> paper.</i>
<b>workweek</b>	Hours or days of work in a calendar week. <i>We need a shorter <b>workweek</b> and protected benefits for contract workers.</i>
<b>yearly</b>	Occurring or payable every year. <i>Rent was paid <b>yearly</b>.</i>
