<b>endowment</b>	The act of endowing with a permanent source of income. <i>He tried to promote the <b>endowment</b> of a Chair of Psychiatry.</i>
<b>eruditeness</b>	Profound scholarly knowledge.
<b>erudition</b>	Profound scholarly knowledge. <i>He was known for his wit <b>erudition</b> and teaching skills.</i>
<b>grant</b>	A contract granting the right to operate a subsidiary business. <i>A research <b>grant</b>.</i>
<b>intellectual attainment</b>	A person who uses the mind creatively.
<b>knowledge</b>	Information held on a computer system. <i>Her considerable <b>knowledge</b> of antiques.</i>
<b>learnedness</b>	Profound scholarly knowledge.
<b>learning</b>	Knowledge acquired through study, experience, or being taught. <i>These children experienced difficulties in <b>learning</b>.</i>
<b>letters</b>	Owner who lets another person use something (housing usually) for hire. <i>He is a man of <b>letters</b>.</i>
<b>payment</b>	The act of paying money. <i>A suit with a velvet collar that I got as <b>payment</b> for being in the show.</i>

## Associations of "Scholarship" (30 Words)

<b>absence</b>	Failure to be present. <i>He was surprised by the <b>absence</b> of any explanation.</i>
<b>alumnus</b>	A former member of a group, company, or organization. <i>A Harvard <b>alumnus</b>.</i>
<b>attendance</b>	The number of people that are present. <i>My <b>attendance</b> at church was very patchy.</i>
<b>award</b>	Give as judged due or on the basis of merit. <i>A 3 5 per cent pay rise was <b>awarded</b> to staff.</i>
<b>college</b>	The teaching staff and students of a college considered collectively. <i><b>Colleges</b> of further education.</i>
<b>collegian</b>	A student (or former student) at a college or university.

<b>degree</b>	A specific identifiable position in a continuum or series or especially in a process. <i>Persons of unequal <b>degree</b>.</i>
<b><u>disciple</u></b>	A personal follower of Christ during his life, especially one of the twelve Apostles. <i>A <b>disciple</b> of Rousseau.</i>
<b>doctorate</b>	One of the highest earned academic degrees conferred by a university. <i>A <b>doctorate</b> in art history.</i>
<b><u>earned</u></b>	Gained or acquired; especially through merit or as a result of effort or action. <i>An <b>earned</b> run in baseball.</i>
<b>enrol</b>	Register formally as a participant or member. <i>The endowment of religious houses cannot be measured simply by the licences <b>enrolled</b> in chancery.</i>
<b><u>enrollment</u></b>	The body of people (such as students) who register or enroll at the same time.
<b>flunk</b>	Judge (an examination candidate) to have failed to reach the required standard. <i>Tip <b>flunked</b> out of Caltech and moved back home.</i>
<b>grad</b>	A person who has received a degree from a school (high school or college or university).
<b><u>graduate</u></b>	A graduated cup tube flask or measuring glass used especially by chemists and pharmacists. <i>He started with motorbikes but now he s <b>graduated</b> to his first car.</i>
<b>homeroom</b>	A classroom in which a group of students assembles daily with the same teacher before dispersing to other classes.
<b><u>learner</u></b>	A person who is learning a subject or skill. <i>A fast <b>learner</b>.</i>
<b>lecturer</b>	A public lecturer at certain universities. <i>A senior <b>lecturer</b> in surgery at Leeds University.</i>
<b>matriculate</b>	A person who has matriculated. <i>The arms have been <b>matriculated</b> by the Lord Lyon King of Arms in Edinburgh.</i>
<b>postgraduate</b>	A student engaged in a postgraduate course. <i>A <b>postgraduate</b> degree.</i>
<b><u>professor</u></b>	An associate professor or an assistant professor. <i>The <b>professors</b> of true religion.</i>

<b>pupil</b>	A young person attending school (up through senior high school). <i>They are former <b>pupils</b> of the school.</i>
<b>schoolgirl</b>	Characteristic of or associated with schoolgirls. <i><b>Schoolgirl</b> French.</i>
<b>schoolmaster</b>	Food fish of warm Caribbean and Atlantic waters.
<b>sophomore</b>	Denoting the second recording, film, etc. released or created by a particular musician, group, director, etc. <i>The Canadian filmmaker's <b>sophomore</b> movie is a father son story.</i>
<b>student</b>	A school pupil. <i>A <b>student</b> of sociology.</i>
<b>teach</b>	Work as a teacher. <i>She <b>teaches</b> at the local high school.</i>
<b>textbook</b>	According to or characteristic of a casebook or textbook typical. <i>He had the presence of mind to carry out a <b>textbook</b> emergency descent.</i>
<b>undergraduate</b>	Denoting or relating to an undergraduate. <i>A group of Oxford <b>undergraduates</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">university</a></u>	The body of faculty and students at a university. <i>I went to <b>university</b> at the Sorbonne.</i>
