endowment	The act of endowing with a permanent source of income. <i>He tried to promote the endowment of a Chair of Psychiatry.</i>

erudition	Profound scholarly knowledge. <i>He was known for his wit erudition and teaching skills.</i>
grant	A contract granting the right to operate a subsidiary business. <i>A research grant.</i>
intellectual attainment	A person who uses the mind creatively.
knowledge	Information held on a computer system. <i>Her considerable knowledge of antiques.</i>
learnedness	Profound scholarly knowledge.
learning	Knowledge acquired through study, experience, or being taught. <i>These children experienced difficulties in learning.</i>
letters	Owner who lets another person use something (housing usually) for hire. <i>He is a man of letters.</i>
payment	The act of paying money. <i>A suit with a velvet collar that I got as payment for being in the show.</i>

Associations of "Scholarship" (30 Words)

absence	Failure to be present. <i>He was surprised by the absence of any explanation.</i>
alumnus	A former member of a group, company, or organization. <i>A Harvard alumnus.</i>
attendance	The number of people that are present. <i>My attendance at church was very patchy.</i>
award	Give as judged due or on the basis of merit. <i>A 3 5 per cent pay rise was awarded to staff.</i>
college	The teaching staff and students of a college considered collectively. <i>Colleges of further education.</i>
collegian	A student (or former student) at a college or university.

degree	A specific identifiable position in a continuum or series or especially in a process. <i>Persons of unequal degree.</i>
<u>disciple</u>	A personal follower of Christ during his life, especially one of the twelve Apostles. <i>A disciple of Rousseau.</i>
doctorate	One of the highest earned academic degrees conferred by a university. <i>A doctorate in art history.</i>
<u>earned</u>	Gained or acquired; especially through merit or as a result of effort or action. <i>An earned run in baseball.</i>
enrol	Register formally as a participant or member. <i>The endowment of religious houses cannot be measured simply by the licences enrolled in chancery.</i>
<u>enrollment</u>	The body of people (such as students) who register or enroll at the same time.
flunk	Judge (an examination candidate) to have failed to reach the required standard. <i>Tip flunked out of Caltech and moved back home.</i>
grad	A person who has received a degree from a school (high school or college or university).
<u>graduate</u>	A graduated cup tube flask or measuring glass used especially by chemists and pharmacists. <i>He started with motorbikes but now he s graduated to his first car.</i>
homeroom	A classroom in which a group of students assembles daily with the same teacher before dispersing to other classes.
<u>learner</u>	A person who is learning a subject or skill. <i>A fast learner.</i>
lecturer	A public lecturer at certain universities. <i>A senior lecturer in surgery at Leeds University.</i>
matriculate	A person who has matriculated. <i>The arms have been matriculated by the Lord Lyon King of Arms in Edinburgh.</i>
postgraduate	A student engaged in a postgraduate course. <i>A postgraduate degree.</i>
<u>professor</u>	An associate professor or an assistant professor. <i>The professors of true religion.</i>

pupil	A young person attending school (up through senior high school). <i>They are former pupils of the school.</i>
schoolgirl	Characteristic of or associated with schoolgirls. <i>Schoolgirl French.</i>
schoolmaster	Food fish of warm Caribbean and Atlantic waters.
sophomore	Denoting the second recording, film, etc. released or created by a particular musician, group, director, etc. <i>The Canadian filmmaker's sophomore movie is a father son story.</i>
student	A school pupil. <i>A student of sociology.</i>
teach	Work as a teacher. <i>She teaches at the local high school.</i>
textbook	According to or characteristic of a casebook or textbook typical. <i>He had the presence of mind to carry out a textbook emergency descent.</i>
undergraduate	Denoting or relating to an undergraduate. <i>A group of Oxford undergraduates.</i>
<u>university</u>	The body of faculty and students at a university. <i>I went to university at the Sorbonne.</i>
