Definitions of "Schooling" as a noun

- *The process of being formally educated at a school.*
- *The training of an animal (especially the training of a horse for dressage).*
- *Education received at school.*
- *The training of a horse on the flat or over fences.*
- *The act of teaching at school.*



Synonyms of "Schooling" as a noun (15 Words)

- andragogy** The method and practice of teaching adult learners; adult education.
*Much has been written about **andragogy** in general education circles over the past fifty years.*
- coaching** The job of a professional coach.
- discipline** The act of punishing.
*For such a plan to work requires **discipline**.*
- disciplining** The act of punishing.
- drill** Similar to the mandrill but smaller and less brightly colored.
*Tables can be mastered by **drill** and practice.*
- drilling** The act of drilling a hole in the earth in the hope of producing petroleum.
*Our days often began with military **drilling**.*
- education** The United States federal department that administers all federal programs dealing with education including federal aid to educational institutions and students created 1979.
*Colleges of **education**.*

instruction	The activities of educating or instructing; activities that impart knowledge or skill. <i>Always study the instructions supplied.</i>
pedagogy	The activities of educating or instructing; activities that impart knowledge or skill. <i>Pedagogy is recognized as an important profession.</i>
<u>school</u>	The period of instruction in a school the time period when school is in session. <i>A dancing school.</i>
teaching	Ideas or principles taught by an authority. <i>Good classroom teaching is seldom rewarded.</i>
training	Activity leading to skilled behavior. <i>In service training for staff.</i>
<u>tuition</u>	A fee paid for instruction (especially for higher education). <i>Private tuition in French.</i>
tutelage	Attention and management implying responsibility for safety. <i>The organizations remained under firm government tutelage.</i>
<u>tutoring</u>	A person who gives private instruction (as in singing, acting, etc).

Associations of "Schooling" (30 Words)

- absenteeism** Habitual absence from work.
*High levels of **absenteeism** caused by low job motivation.*
- academy** (in England) an inner-city school which is funded by the government and sometimes also by a private individual or organization but is not controlled by the local authority.
*A police **academy**.*
- bed** A place on the seabed where shellfish especially oysters or mussels breed or are bred.
*A period of calm will allow the changes to **bed** in.*
- bursar** A student who holds a bursary.
- campus** The grounds of a school, hospital, or other institution.
*For the first year I had a room on **campus**.*

<u>compulsory</u>	Required by law or a rule; obligatory. <i>In most schools physical education is compulsory.</i>
<u>convent</u>	The building or buildings occupied by a convent. <i>Maria entered the convent at the age of eighteen.</i>
cradle	Hold or place in or as if in a cradle. <i>The welfare state was set up to provide care from the cradle to the grave.</i>
curriculum	An integrated course of academic studies. <i>Course components of the school curriculum.</i>
<u>dorm</u>	A dormitory.
<u>educate</u>	Provide or pay for instruction for (one's child), especially at a school. <i>She was educated at a boarding school.</i>
education	The United States federal department that administers all federal programs dealing with education including federal aid to educational institutions and students created 1979. <i>A course of education.</i>
<u>educator</u>	A person who provides instruction or education; a teacher. <i>The perspective of a professional educator.</i>
grad	A person who has received a degree from a school (high school or college or university).
graduation	The ceremony at which degrees are conferred. <i>The ruler had 16 graduations per inch.</i>
headmaster	Presiding officer of a school.
homeroom	A classroom in which all students in a particular grade (or in a division of a grade) meet at certain times under the supervision of a teacher who takes attendance and does other administrative business.
kindergarten	(in Britain and Australia) an establishment where children below the age of compulsory education play and learn; a nursery school.
pedagogics	The principles and methods of instruction.
playpen	A portable enclosure in which babies may be left to play.
<u>primary</u>	A primary coil or winding in an electrical transformer. <i>A primary alcohol.</i>
pupil	A trainee barrister. <i>Will you take me on as your pupil.</i>
schoolmaster	A male teacher in a school.
semester	Half a year; a period of 6 months. <i>The opening week of Harvard s autumn semester.</i>

teach	A teacher. <i>The philosophy teaches self control.</i>
<u>teacher</u>	A personified abstraction that teaches. <i>Books were his teachers.</i>
teaching	The profession of a teacher. <i>The teachings of the Koran.</i>
<u>tutor</u>	Act as a tutor to a single pupil or a very small group. <i>A guitar tutor.</i>
<u>university</u>	The body of faculty and students at a university. <i>I went to university at the Sorbonne.</i>
valedictorian	The student with the best grades who usually delivers the valedictory address at commencement.
