#### Definitions of "Scour" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "scour" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Rinse, clean, or empty with a liquid.
- Examine minutely.
- Rub hard or scrub.
- Clean or brighten the surface of (something) by rubbing it hard, typically with an abrasive or detergent.
- *Remove (dirt or unwanted matter) by scouring.*
- Administer a strong purgative to.
- Clean with hard rubbing.
- (of livestock) suffer from diarrhoea.
- (of water or a watercourse) make (a channel or pool) by flowing quickly over something and removing soil or rock.






# Synonyms of "Scour" as a verb (9 Words)

abrade	Scrape or wear away by friction or erosion. It was a landscape slowly <b>abrade</b> d by a fine stinging dust.
clean	Clean and tidy up the house. There are a variety of ways to cook the herring but it must first be gutted and <b>clean</b> ed.
cleanse	(in biblical translations) cure (a leper). The mission to <b>cleanse</b> the nation of subversives.
<u>flush</u>	Of a toilet be cleansed by flushing. The grouse were <b>flush</b> ed from the woods.
purge	Oust politically. Bob had helped <b>purge</b> Martha of the terrible guilt that had haunted her.



<u>rub</u>	Scrape or rub as if to relieve itching. I <b>rub</b> bed myself dry.
<u>scrub</u>	Thoroughly clean one's hands and arms before performing surgery. By now the field was spreadeagled and <b>scrub</b> bing to keep in touch with the hounds.
<u>wash</u>	Be capable of being washed. The sea began to <b>wash</b> along the decks.
wipe	Pass a swipe card over an electronic reader. You can <b>wipe</b> that idea if that s what you re thinking.







#### Usage Examples of "Scour" as a verb

- Scour the counter tops.
- A stream came crashing through a narrow cavern to scour out a round pool below.
- The police scoured the country for the fugitive.
- She scoured the cooker.
- Use an electric toothbrush to scour off plaque.
- He went out to deal with piglets who were scouring.
- He immediately proceeded to scour him with the most potent medicines.
- I was scouring out the pans.

<u>detect</u>	Discover or identify the presence or existence of. She <b>detect</b> ed high levels of lead in her drinking water.
discovered	Discovered or determined by scientific observation. <b>Discovered</b> differences in achievement.
explore	Examine (organs) for diagnostic purposes. <i>Explore</i> unknown territory in biology.
find	Come upon after searching find the location of something that was missed or lost. <i>The majority of staff <b>find</b> the magazine to be informative and useful.</i>
finding	The action of finding someone or something. An area rich in archaeological <b>finding</b> s.
forage	The act of searching for food and provisions. The animals <b>forage</b> in the woods.
<u>gawk</u>	An awkward or shy person. They were <b>gawk</b> ing at some pin up.
goggle	Close-fitting glasses with side shields, for protecting the eyes from glare, dust, water, etc. <i>A pair of <b>goggles</b></i> .
hide-and-seek	The movement of a read/write head to a specific data track on a disk.
hound	Used in names of dogfishes e g nurse hound smooth hound. <i>He has a reputation as a publicity</i> <b>hound</b> .
hunt	An association of huntsmen who hunt for sport. She <b>hunt</b> ed for her reading glasses but was unable to locate them.
<u>hunting</u>	The activity of hunting wild animals or game. <i>House hunting</i> .
investigation	The action of investigating something or someone; formal or systematic examination or research. <i>A murder investigation</i> .
look	Of a building or room have an outlook in a specified direction. <i>The orderly gave me a funny <b>look</b>.</i>
observation	The act of observing; taking a patient look. She was brought into hospital for <b>observation</b> .
probe	Examine physically with or as if with a probe. <b>Probe</b> an anthill.
prospector	Someone who explores an area for mineral deposits. I see myself as a <b>prospector</b> of opportunities for my clients.



pursuit	An auxiliary activity. A whole range of leisure <b>pursuit</b> s.
<u>quest</u>	The act of searching for something. The dog went off and <b>quest</b> ed.
research	Engaged in or intended for research. The students had to <b>research</b> the history of the Second World War for their history project.
<u>rummage</u>	A thorough search of a vessel by a customs officer. Mick <b>rummage</b> d up his skateboard.
<u>scan</u>	An act of scanning someone or something. Their brains are <b>scan</b> ned so that researchers can monitor the progress of the disease.
scavenger	A person employed to clean the streets. <i>4 aminosalicylic acid is not an effective free radical</i> <b>scavenger</b> .
<u>scrutinize</u>	Examine or inspect closely and thoroughly. <i>He <b>scrutinize</b>d his likeness in the mirror.</i>
search	Subject to a search. The advanced <b>search</b> includes options for sorting by date and specifying the news source.
seek	Go to or towards. A liquid <b>seek</b> s its own level.
shooting	The action or practice of shooting with a gun. The <b>shooting</b> of a music video.
spelunker	A person who explores caves.
<u>vault</u>	Bound vigorously. The <b>vault</b> of heaven.
