caterwaul	The yowling sound made by a cat in heat. The song ended in a <b>caterwaul</b> of feedback.
clown	A playful, extrovert person. <i>A circus <b>clown</b></i> .
comedian	A professional performer who tells jokes and performs comical acts. <i>He s a real <b>comedian</b> this fellow.</i>




comic	Comic strips. The shop sold newspapers and children s <b>comic</b> s.
cry	A loud inarticulate shout or scream expressing a powerful feeling or emotion. He kept a <b>cry</b> of hounds to hunt in the wilderness.
entertainer	A person, such as a singer, dancer, or comedian, whose job is to entertain others. She is one of Hollywood s highest paid <b>entertainer</b> s.
hoot	A raucous sound made by a horn, siren, or steam whistle. There were <b>hoot</b> s of derision.
<u>howl</u>	A wailing noise in a loudspeaker due to feedback. <i>Howls of laughter.</i>
howler	A joke that seems extremely funny. The occasional schoolboy <b>howler</b> would amuse the examiners.
joker	A person who enjoys telling or playing jokes. When I demanded my money he showed me the <b>joker</b> in the contract.
laugh	Something that causes laughter a source of fun amusement or derision. I like Peter he s a good <b>laugh</b> .
<u>riot</u>	A public act of violence by an unruly mob. Everyone thought she was a <b>riot</b> .
screaming	A high-pitched noise resembling a human cry. Neighbours heard <b>screaming</b> and shouting and decided to dial 999.
screech	A loud, harsh, squealing noise. He ducked at the <b>screech</b> ings of shells.
screeching	A high-pitched noise resembling a human cry. <i>He ducked at the <b>screeching</b>s of shells.</i>
<u>shout</u>	A call-out for one of the emergency services. <i>His words were interrupted by warning <b>shout</b>s.</i>
shriek	A high-pitched piercing cry or sound; a scream. <i>Shrieks of laughter.</i>
shrieking	Sharp piercing cry. There is <b>shrieking</b> and yelling from both men and women.
sidesplitter	A joke that seems extremely funny.
squall	A sudden violent gust of wind or localized storm, especially one bringing rain, snow, or sleet. Low clouds and <b>squall</b> s of driving rain.



squawk	The noise of squawking. She awoke to the <b>squawk</b> of chickens.
<u>squeal</u>	A high-pitched howl. They drew up with a <b>squeal</b> of brakes.
thigh-slapper	A joke that seems extremely funny.
wail	A prolonged high-pitched cry of pain, grief, or anger. <i>Christopher let out a <b>wail</b>.</i>
whoop	A long rasping indrawn breath characteristic of whooping cough. A moment s silence was followed by <b>whoop</b> s of delight.
wit	A witty amusing person who makes jokes. He needed all his <b>wit</b> s to figure out the way back.
wow	A joke that seems extremely funny. <i>Your play s a <b>wow</b></i> .
yawp	Foolish or noisy talk. The cur did not bark other than a single <b>yawp</b> .
<u>yell</u>	An extremely amusing person or thing. Her foot slipped and she gave a <b>yell</b> of fear.
yelp	A short, sharp cry, especially of pain or alarm. She uttered a <b>yelp</b> as she bumped into a table.








## Usage Examples of "Scream" as a noun

#### **Definitions of "Scream" as a verb**

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "scream" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Turn informer.
- Move very rapidly with or as if with a loud, high-pitched sound.
- Make a loud, high-pitched sound.
- Utter a sudden loud cry.
- Make a loud, piercing sound.
- Urgently and vociferously call attention to one's views or feelings, especially ones of anger or distress.
- *Give a long, loud, piercing cry or cries expressing extreme emotion or pain.*
- Cry something in a high-pitched, frenzied way.
- Utter or declare in a very loud voice.






# Synonyms of "Scream" as a verb (22 Words)

bawl	Make a raucous noise. I sat on the couch and <b>bawl</b> ed my eyes out.
bellow	Make a loud noise, as of animal. The bull <b>bellow</b> ed.
call	Rouse somebody from sleep with a call. <i>He had promised Celia he would</i> <b>call</b> <i>in at the clinic.</i>
call out	Challenge the sincerity or truthfulness of.
caterwaul	Utter shrieks, as of cats. <i>He seems to think that singing soulfully is to whine and caterwaul tunelessly.</i>
cry	Utter a sudden loud cry. Wounded people were <b>cry</b> ing for help.
cry out	Demand immediate action.



holler	Utter a sudden loud cry. <i>He <b>holler</b>ed out to surrender our weapons.</i>
hollo	Encourage somebody by crying hollo.
<u>howl</u>	Make a howling sound. A baby started to <b>howl</b> .
screech	Make a high pitched screeching noise. She hit her brother causing him to <b>screech</b> with pain.
<u>shout</u>	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. She <b>shout</b> ed for joy.
shout out	Utter in a loud voice; talk in a loud voice (usually denoting characteristic manner of speaking.
shriek	Utter a high-pitched piercing sound or words, especially as an expression of terror, pain, or excitement. The wheels <b>shriek</b> ed as the car sped away.
squall	Blow in a squall. Sarah was <b>squall</b> ing in her crib.
squawk	(of a bird) make a loud, harsh noise. He is well known for <b>squawk</b> ing about price fixing at local gas pumps.
<u>squeal</u>	Make a squeal. The girls <b>squeal</b> ed with delight.
wail	Utter a wail. The wind <b>wail</b> ed and buffeted the timber structure.
whoop	Give or make a whoop. The children <b>whoop</b> ed when they were led to the picnic table.
yawp	Make a raucous noise. The fans screeched <b>yawp</b> ed and pounded their palms.
<u>yell</u>	Utter or declare in a very loud voice. I <b>yell</b> ed to her from the window but she couldn t hear me.
yelp	Utter a yelp. The puppies <b>yelp</b> ed.

<u>clamor</u>	Compel someone to do something by insistent clamoring. <i>He clamor</i> ed for justice and tolerance.
cry	Utter a sudden loud cry. Don t <b>cry</b> it ll be all right.
<u>exclaim</u>	Cry out suddenly in surprise, strong emotion, or pain. I won he <b>exclaim</b> ed.
gorgeous	Very pleasant or enjoyable. A <b>gorgeous</b> Victorian gown.
heckle	Comb with a heckle. He was booed and <b>heckle</b> d when he tried to address the demonstrators.
heckler	Someone who tries to embarrass you with gibes and questions and objections. <i>He was adept at dealing with</i> <b>heckler</b> <i>s.</i>
holler	Give a loud shout or cry. He <b>holler</b> ed out to surrender our weapons.
hoot	Of an owl utter a hoot. A car horn <b>hoot</b> ed frightening her.
<u>howl</u>	Make a howling sound. He <b>howl</b> ed in agony.
loud	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i>A group of loud children.</i>
oh	A midwestern state in north central United States in the Great Lakes region.
outcry	An exclamation or shout. An <b>outcry</b> of spontaneous passion.
<u>rumble</u>	A fight between rival gangs of adolescents. The debate about television replays <b>rumble</b> s on.
screech	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>He ducked at the <b>screech</b>ings of shells.</i>
<u>shout</u>	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. From crocodile handbag to gold trimmed shoes she <b>shout</b> ed money.
shouting	Uttering a loud inarticulate cry as of pain or excitement. It s all over but the <b>shouting</b> .
shriek	Utter a shrill cry. She was <b>shriek</b> ing abuse at a taxi.



squawk	The noise of squawking. Her plan provoked a loud <b>squawk</b> from her friends.
<u>terrified</u>	Thrown into a state of intense fear or desperation. The <b>terrified</b> horse bolted.
WOW	A joke that seems extremely funny. <i>They <b>wow</b>ed audiences on their recent British tour.</i>
yeah	Not only so, but.
<u>yell</u>	A loud utterance of emotion (especially when inarticulate. You heard me losing my temper and <b>yell</b> ing at her.
