## Associations of "Screwed over" (30 Words)

<b><u>absenteeism</u></b>	Habitual absence from work. <i>High levels of <b>absenteeism</b> caused by low job motivation.</i>
<b>bevel</b>	Cut a bevel on shape to a bevel. <i>A very small 45 <b>bevel</b> is ground on the top surface.</i>
<b>coil</b>	An intrauterine contraceptive device in the form of a coil. <i>Many women don't like the idea of having a <b>coil</b> fitted.</i>
<b><u>consumerism</u></b>	The theory that an increasing consumption of goods is economically beneficial. <i>Many people are becoming increasingly conscious of the environmental impact of <b>consumerism</b>.</i>
<b>exorbitant</b>	(of a price or amount charged) unreasonably high. <i><b>Exorbitant</b> rent.</i>
<b>extra</b>	Excessive or extravagant. <i><i>Crudit</i> is so <b>extra</b> just call it a snack.</i>
<b>extravagant</b>	Resulting from or showing a lack of restraint in spending money or resources. <i><b>Extravagant</b> claims about the merchandise.</i>
<b>gyrate</b>	Revolve quickly and repeatedly around one's own axis. <i>The young people <b>gyrated</b> on the dance floor.</i>
<b>helical</b>	Having the shape or form of a helix; spiral. <i><b>Helical</b> molecules.</i>
<b>helix</b>	A curve on a conical or cylindrical surface which would become a straight line if the surface were unrolled into a plane.
<b><u>inordinate</u></b>	(of a person) unrestrained in feelings or behaviour. <i>A book of <b>inordinate</b> length.</i>
<b>intemperate</b>	(of weather or climate) not mild; subject to extremes. <i>An <b>intemperate</b> social occasion.</i>

<b>levity</b>	The treatment of a serious matter with humour or lack of due respect. <i>As an attempt to introduce a note of <b>levity</b> the words were a disastrous flop.</i>
<b>outdo</b>	Get the better of. <i>She <b>outdoes</b> all other athletes.</i>
<b>overcome</b>	Overcome as with emotions or perceptual stimuli. <i>She was obviously <b>overcome</b> with excitement.</i>
<b>overreach</b>	An injury to a forefoot of a horse resulting from its having overreached. <i>The Church <b>overreached</b> itself in securing a territory that would prove impossible to hold.</i>
<b>overstep</b>	Be superior or better than some standard. <i>You must not <b>overstep</b> your borrowing limit.</i>
<b>prodigal</b>	A person who leaves home to lead a prodigal life but later makes a repentant return. <i>The government wished to clip the wings of the local authority <b>prodigals</b>.</i>
<b>spiral</b>	To wind or move in a spiral course. <i>An inflationary <b>spiral</b>.</i>
<b>spiraling</b>	In the shape of a coil.
<b>stairs</b>	A flight of stairs or a flight of steps.
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b>superfluous</b>	Unnecessary, especially through being more than enough. <i>Delete <b>superfluous</b> or unnecessary words.</i>
<b>tiredness</b>	The state of wishing for sleep or rest; weariness. <i><b>Tiredness</b> overcame her and she fell into a deep slumber.</i>
<b>too</b>	In addition. <i>She is a grown woman and a strong one <b>too</b>.</i>
<b>transcend</b>	Surpass (a person or achievement). <i>He doubts that he will ever <b>transcend</b> Shakespeare.</i>
<b>undue</b>	Not yet payable. <i><b>Undue</b> influence.</i>
<b>unnecessary</b>	Unnecessary things. <i>Good construction is essential to avoid <b>unnecessary</b> waste.</i>
<b>weariness</b>	Extreme tiredness; fatigue. <i>Growing war <b>weariness</b>.</i>
