Associations of "Screwed over" (30 Words)

<u>absenteeism</u>	Habitual absence from work. <i>High levels of absenteeism caused by low job motivation.</i>
bevel	Cut a bevel on shape to a bevel. <i>A very small 45 bevel is ground on the top surface.</i>
coil	An intrauterine contraceptive device in the form of a coil. <i>Many women don't like the idea of having a coil fitted.</i>
<u>consumerism</u>	The theory that an increasing consumption of goods is economically beneficial. <i>Many people are becoming increasingly conscious of the environmental impact of consumerism.</i>
exorbitant	(of a price or amount charged) unreasonably high. <i>Exorbitant rent.</i>
extra	Excessive or extravagant. <i><i>Crudit</i> is so extra just call it a snack.</i>
extravagant	Resulting from or showing a lack of restraint in spending money or resources. <i>Extravagant claims about the merchandise.</i>
gyrate	Revolve quickly and repeatedly around one's own axis. <i>The young people gyrated on the dance floor.</i>
helical	Having the shape or form of a helix; spiral. <i>Helical molecules.</i>
helix	A curve on a conical or cylindrical surface which would become a straight line if the surface were unrolled into a plane.
<u>inordinate</u>	(of a person) unrestrained in feelings or behaviour. <i>A book of inordinate length.</i>
intemperate	(of weather or climate) not mild; subject to extremes. <i>An intemperate social occasion.</i>

levity	The treatment of a serious matter with humour or lack of due respect. <i>As an attempt to introduce a note of levity the words were a disastrous flop.</i>
outdo	Get the better of. <i>She outdoes all other athletes.</i>
overcome	Overcome as with emotions or perceptual stimuli. <i>She was obviously overcome with excitement.</i>
overreach	An injury to a forefoot of a horse resulting from its having overreached. <i>The Church overreached itself in securing a territory that would prove impossible to hold.</i>
overstep	Be superior or better than some standard. <i>You must not overstep your borrowing limit.</i>
prodigal	A person who leaves home to lead a prodigal life but later makes a repentant return. <i>The government wished to clip the wings of the local authority prodigals.</i>
spiral	To wind or move in a spiral course. <i>An inflationary spiral.</i>
spiraling	In the shape of a coil.
stairs	A flight of stairs or a flight of steps.
superabundance	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
superfluous	Unnecessary, especially through being more than enough. <i>Delete superfluous or unnecessary words.</i>
tiredness	The state of wishing for sleep or rest; weariness. <i>Tiredness overcame her and she fell into a deep slumber.</i>
too	In addition. <i>She is a grown woman and a strong one too.</i>
transcend	Surpass (a person or achievement). <i>He doubts that he will ever transcend Shakespeare.</i>
undue	Not yet payable. <i>Undue influence.</i>
unnecessary	Unnecessary things. <i>Good construction is essential to avoid unnecessary waste.</i>
weariness	Extreme tiredness; fatigue. <i>Growing war weariness.</i>
