- *Someone employed to make written copies of documents and manuscripts.*
- *A person who copies out documents, especially one employed to do this before printing was invented.*
- *A Jewish recordkeeper or, later, a professional theologian and jurist.*
- *A pointed instrument used for making marks on wood, bricks, etc., to guide a saw or in signwriting.*
- *A writer, especially a journalist.*
- *Informal terms for journalists.*
- *A sharp-pointed awl for marking wood or metal to be cut.*

<b>augustin eugene scribe</b>	Informal terms for journalists.
<b>author</b>	The writings produced by a particular author. <i>He is the <b>author</b> of several books on the subject.</i>
<b>clerk</b>	An assistant in a shop. <i>A chapter <b>clerk</b>.</i>
<b>copyist</b>	Someone employed to make written copies of documents and manuscripts. <i>The end of the first movement is in the hand of a <b>copyist</b>.</i>
<b>journalist</b>	Someone who keeps a diary or journal. <i>He was a seasoned TV <b>journalist</b>.</i>
<b>penman</b>	Informal terms for journalists. <i>This talented <b>penman</b> s work.</i>
<b>record keeper</b>	Anything (such as a document or a phonograph record or a photograph) providing permanent evidence of or information about past events.
<b>recorder</b>	A person who keeps records. <i>A <b>recorder</b> of rural life.</i>
<b>reporter</b>	A person who investigates and reports or edits news stories.
<b>scratch awl</b>	A competitor who has withdrawn from competition.
<b>scribbler</b>	A person who writes for a living or as a hobby. <i><b>Scribblers</b> are forever borrowing other people s quotations.</i>
<b>scriber</b>	A sharp-pointed awl for marking wood or metal to be cut.
<b>scrivener</b>	A person who invested money at interest for clients and lent funds to those who wanted to raise money on security.
<a href="#"><u>secretary</u></a>	An official of a society or other organization who conducts its correspondence and keeps its records. <i>She was <b>secretary</b> to David Wilby MP.</i>
<b>transcriber</b>	A musician who adapts a composition for particular voices or instruments or for another style of performance.
<a href="#"><u>writer</u></a>	A person who has written something or who writes in a particular way. <i>Dickens was a prolific <b>writer</b>.</i>

- anonymous** Having no outstanding, individual, or unusual features; unremarkable or impersonal.  
***Anonymous** bureaucrats in the Civil Service.*
- author** The writings produced by a particular author.  
*I had to read **authors** I disliked.*
- autobiography** An account of a person's life written by that person.  
*He gives a vivid description of his childhood in his **autobiography**.*
- calligrapher** Someone skilled in penmanship.
- compose** Form the substance of.  
*He **composed** the First Violin Sonata four years earlier.*

<b>copy</b>	Send someone a copy of an email that is addressed to a third party. <i>Catastrophes make good <b>copy</b>.</i>
<b>dictation</b>	The activity of taking down a passage that is dictated by a teacher as a test of spelling, writing, or language skills. <i>The <b>dictation</b> of letters.</i>
<b>disquisition</b>	A long or elaborate essay or discussion on a particular subject. <i>Nothing can kill a radio show quicker than a <b>disquisition</b> on intertextual analysis.</i>
<b>doodle</b>	Make a doodle draw aimlessly. <i>The text was interspersed with <b>doodles</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">handwriting</a></u>	Something written by hand. <i>Her <b>handwriting</b> was small and neat.</i>
<b>hastily</b>	In a hurried or hasty manner. <i>Maybe I acted too <b>hastily</b>.</i>
<b>indite</b>	Write; compose. <i>He <b>indites</b> the wondrous tale of Our Lord.</i>
<u><a href="#">journal</a></u>	Write in a journal or diary. <i>He reads the medical <b>journals</b>.</i>
<b>ledger</b>	Fish using a ledger. <i><b>Ledger</b> tackle.</i>
<b>libretto</b>	The words of an opera or musical play.
<u><a href="#">narrator</a></u>	A person who narrates something, especially a character who recounts the events of a novel or narrative poem. <i>His poetic efforts are mocked by the <b>narrator</b> of the story.</i>
<u><a href="#">overseer</a></u>	A person who supervises others, especially workers.
<b>poet</b>	A writer of poems the term is usually reserved for writers of good poetry. <i>He is more <b>poet</b> than academic because of his gift for language.</i>
<b>poetics</b>	The art of writing poetry. <i>The terminology of traditional <b>poetics</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">pseudonym</a></u>	A fictitious name used when the person performs a particular social role. <i>I wrote under the <b>pseudonym</b> of Evelyn Hervey.</i>
<u><a href="#">publish</a></u>	Print (something) in a book or journal so as to make it generally known. <i>We <b>publish</b> practical reference books.</i>
<b>quickly</b>	With little or no delay; promptly. <i>He works <b>quickly</b>.</i>

- recognizance** A security entered into before a court with a condition to perform some act required by law; on failure to perform that act a sum is forfeited.  
*He was released on his own **recognizance** of 30 000.*
- rewrite** Rewrite so as to make fit to suit a new or different purpose.  
***Rewrite** after **rewrite** was drafted to ensure the final version would pass muster.*
- scrawl** Write carelessly.  
*He was **scrawling** on the back of a used envelope.*
- scribble** Write or draw (something) carelessly or hurriedly.  
*Illegible **scribbles**.*
- [sketch](#) Make a sketch of.  
*A charcoal **sketch**.*
- typewriter** A machine with keys for producing alphabetical characters, numerals, and typographical symbols one at a time on paper inserted round a roller.
- [write](#) Write and send a letter to.  
*He had to **write** a cheque for 800.*
- [writer](#) A person who is able to write and has written something.  
*Dickens was a prolific **writer**.*
