Definitions of "Scrub" as a noun

- *Special hygienic clothing worn by surgeons during operations.*
- *A semi-abrasive cosmetic lotion applied to the face or body in order to cleanse the skin.*
- *Dense vegetation consisting of stunted trees or bushes.*
- *The act of cleaning a surface by rubbing it with a brush and soap and water.*
- *An act of scrubbing something or someone.*



Synonyms of "Scrub" as a noun (4 Words)

- bush** Dense vegetation consisting of stunted trees or bushes.

- chaparral** Vegetation consisting chiefly of tangled shrubs and thorny bushes.
- scouring** The act of cleaning a surface by rubbing it with a brush and soap and water.

Scrub as a Verb

Definitions of "Scrub" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "scrub" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Clean with hard rubbing.*
- *(of a driver) allow (a tyre) to slide or scrape across the road surface so as to reduce speed.*
- *Thoroughly clean one's hands and arms before performing surgery.*
- *Cancel or abandon (something).*
- *Rub (someone or something) hard so as to clean them, typically with a brush and water.*
- *Remove dirt by rubbing hard.*
- *Wash thoroughly.*

- *(of a driver) reduce (speed) by allowing the tyres to slide or scrape across the road surface.*
- *Postpone indefinitely or annul something that was scheduled.*
- *Use water to remove impurities from (gas or vapour).*
- *(of a person) have a smart and well-groomed appearance after making a deliberate effort.*
- *(of a rider) rub the arms and legs urgently on a horse's neck and flanks to urge it to move faster.*

abandon Cease to support or look after (someone); desert.
*Fans invaded the pitch and the match was **abandoned**.*

abolish Do away with.
*Slavery was **abolished** in the mid 19th century in America and in Russia.*

abort	Cease development die and be aborted. <i>Many doctors assume that women who undergo testing would choose to abort.</i>
brush	Clean with a brush. <i>She brushed a wisp of hair away from her face.</i>
call off	Pay a brief visit.
cancel	Decide or announce that (a planned event) will not take place. <i>I intend to cancel your debt to me.</i>
clean	Clean one s body or parts thereof as by washing. <i>There are a variety of ways to cook the herring but it must first be gutted and cleaned.</i>
cleanse	Rid of something unpleasant or defiling. <i>This preparation will cleanse and tighten the skin.</i>
cut	Form or shape by cutting or incising. <i>We had to lose weight so we cut the sugar from our diet.</i>
discard	Throw or cast away. <i>Hilary bundled up the clothes she had discarded.</i>
discontinue	Cease from doing or providing (something), especially something that has been provided on a regular basis. <i>Their current top of the range running shoe is being discontinued.</i>
do away with	Spend time in prison or in a labor camp.
drop	Score a goal by a drop kick. <i>She dropped a remark about having been included in the selection.</i>
eliminate	Eliminate from the body. <i>Let s eliminate the course on Akkadian hieroglyphics.</i>
forget	Forget to do something. <i>Don t forget to call the chairman of the board to the meeting.</i>
forget about	Dismiss from the mind; stop remembering.
give up	Give as a present; make a gift of.
jettison	Throw away, of something encumbering. <i>Six aircraft jettisoned their loads in the sea.</i>
put an end to	Formulate in a particular style or language.
rub	Scrape or rub as if to relieve itching. <i>Rub oil into her skin.</i>
scour	Remove dirt or unwanted matter by scouring. <i>A stream came crashing through a narrow cavern to scour out a round pool below.</i>

scrap	Discard or remove from service a redundant old or inoperative vehicle vessel or machine especially so as to convert it to scrap metal. <i>A bold decision was taken to scrap existing plant.</i>
scratch	Play a record using the scratch technique. <i>The lovers scratched their names into the bark of the tree.</i>
scrub up	Postpone indefinitely or annul something that was scheduled.
sponge	Decorate pottery using a sponge. <i>I ll go and sponge this orange juice off my dress.</i>
stop	Stop moving or operating. <i>You ll have to stop the night.</i>
swab	Wash with a swab or a mop. <i>Swab the ship s decks.</i>
take away	Head into a specified direction.
throw out	Cause to go on or to be engaged or set in operation.
wash	Be capable of being washed. <i>The cat washes several times a day.</i>
wipe	Pass a swipe card over an electronic reader. <i>Paul wiped his face with a handkerchief.</i>



Usage Examples of "Scrub" as a verb

- *She scrubbed furiously at the plates.*
- *It took ages to scrub off the muck.*
- *She was scrubbing herself down at the sink.*
- *The vapour is scrubbed by the condensate.*
- *He had to scrub the floor.*
- *The doctor scrubbed up and donned a protective gown.*
- *Surgeons must scrub prior to an operation.*
- *I usually only scrub the front tyre when I get into a turn too hot.*
- *The first two races had to be scrubbed because of blustery winds and rough seas.*
- *By now the field was spreadeagled and scrubbing to keep in touch with the hounds.*
- *The band scrub up well to play weddings and parties.*
- *He slammed the bike down on the cases to scrub off speed.*
- *We had to scrub our vacation plans.*
- *She scrubbed his back.*

- bathtub** A bath.

bleach	Clean or sterilize a drain sink etc with bleach. <i>His contributions to the album are bleached of personality.</i>
brush	Rub with a brush or as if with a brush. <i>Once you ve had it professionally cleaned be sure to brush your coat after each wear.</i>
bubble	Rise in bubbles or as if in bubbles. <i>We both lived in a bubble the kind provided by occupying a privileged pied terre in Greenwich Village.</i>
clean	Clean one s body or parts thereof as by washing. <i>Cats are clean animals.</i>
cleaner	A device for cleaning such as a vacuum cleaner. <i>My suit s at the cleaners.</i>
cleanly	Smoothly and without difficulty; precisely and deftly. <i>Some plain but cleanly country maid.</i>
cleanse	Rid of something unpleasant or defiling. <i>You can consume the broth three times a day for a cleanse.</i>
conditioner	Exercise that conditions the body. <i>Add a water conditioner to neutralize chlorine.</i>
dampen	Smother or suppress. <i>Slider switches on the mixers can dampen the drums.</i>
deaden	Make (someone) insensitive to something. <i>Laughter might deaden us to the moral issue.</i>
detergent	Any additive with a similar action to a detergent e g an oil soluble substance which holds dirt in suspension in lubricating oil. <i>Packets of detergent.</i>
lather	Exude sweat or lather. <i>Dad had got into a right lather by the time I got home.</i>
launder	A channel for conveying molten metal from a furnace or container to a ladle or mould. <i>123 000 had been laundered through Geneva bank accounts.</i>
laundress	A working woman who takes in washing.
laundry	Clothes and linen that need to be washed or that have been newly washed. <i>Cooking and laundry were undertaken by domestic staff.</i>
lave	Cleanse (one's body) with soap and water. <i>The waves laved the shore.</i>
med	Medicine medication. <i>She s at med school.</i>

moisten	Moisten with fine drops. <i>She moistened her lips with the tip of her tongue.</i>
rinse	Rinse one's mouth and throat with mouthwash. <i>Always rinse your hair thoroughly.</i>
sanitation	Making something sanitary (free of germs) as by sterilizing. <i>They could afford to erect new dwellings with a reasonable standard of construction and sanitation.</i>
shampoo	Wash something in or out of the hair using shampoo. <i>A shampoo and set.</i>
shower	Cause a mass of small things to fall in a shower. <i>His hooves showered sparks across the concrete floor.</i>
soap	Rub soap all over usually with the purpose of cleaning. <i>A bar of soap.</i>
tub	The contents of a tub or the amount it can contain. <i>She's revolting she doesn't tub.</i>
wash	A quantity of clothes needing to be or just having been washed. <i>Citrus scented body wash.</i>
washing	The action of washing oneself or laundering clothes bed linen etc. <i>Avoid over enthusiastic washing.</i>
