- *Anything apparently limitless in quantity or volume.*
- *The expanse of salt water that covers most of the earth's surface and surrounds its land masses.*
- *A division of an ocean or a large body of salt water partially enclosed by land.*
- *A vast expanse or quantity of something.*
- *Turbulent water with swells of considerable size.*
- *Large waves.*

<b>billow</b>	A large sea wave.
<b>blanket</b>	A large piece of woollen or similar material used as a covering on a bed or elsewhere for warmth. <i>There was a <b>blanket</b> of snow.</i>
<b>breaker</b>	A person who interrupts a conversation on a Citizens' Band radio channel, indicating that they wish to transmit a message. <i>A rule <b>breaker</b>.</i>
<b>carpet</b>	A natural object that resembles or suggests a carpet. <i>A <b>carpet</b> of flowers.</i>
<b>comber</b>	A long curling sea wave. <i>The <b>combers</b> glassy blue green moved slowly in.</i>

<b>expanse</b>	A wide and open space or area as of surface or land or sky. <i>The green <b>expanse</b> of the forest.</i>
<b>marine</b>	A soldier who serves both on shipboard and on land. <i>A contingent of 2 000 <b>marines</b>.</i>
<b>mass</b>	The celebration of the Eucharist. <i>A huge ice <b>mass</b>.</i>
<b>ocean</b>	A large body of water constituting a principal part of the hydrosphere. <i>She had <b>oceans</b> of energy.</i>
<b>oceanic</b>	An eastern subfamily of Malayo-Polynesian languages.
<b>roller</b>	Relating to or involving roller skates. <i>It s best to put <b>rollers</b> in when hair is slightly damp after washing.</i>
<b>sheet</b>	A quantity of text or other information contained on a sheet of paper. <i>A <b>sheet</b> of unmarked paper.</i>
<b>span</b>	The wingspan of an aircraft or a bird. <i>A short concentration <b>span</b>.</i>
<b>stretch</b>	A stretch limo. <i>Beyond any <b>stretch</b> of his understanding.</i>
<b>sweep</b>	A sweepstake. <i>The whole <b>sweep</b> of the history of the USSR.</i>
<b>the ocean</b>	Anything apparently limitless in quantity or volume.
<b>the waves</b>	A persistent and widespread unusual weather condition (especially of unusual temperatures).
<b>tract</b>	A major passage in the body, large bundle of nerve fibres, or other continuous elongated anatomical structure or region. <i>It took courage to privatize vast <b>tracts</b> of nationalized industry.</i>
<b>wave</b>	A shape regarded as resembling a breaking wave. <i>A heat <b>wave</b>.</i>

### beach

Of an angler land a fish on a beach.  
*Competitive procurement seems to have **beached** several firms.*

### coast

A slope down which sleds may coast.  
*They were **coasting** down a long hill.*

### coastal

Of or relating to a coast.  
***Coastal** marshes.*

### dolphin

A bollard, pile, or buoy for mooring boats.

### dune

A ridge of sand created by the wind; found in deserts or near lakes and oceans.  
*A sand **dune**.*

<b>fish</b>	Catch or try to catch fish or shellfish. <i>He is generally thought to be a bit of a cold <b>fish</b>.</i>
<b>fisherman</b>	A person who catches fish for a living or for sport.
<b>fishery</b>	A place where fish are reared for commercial purposes.
<b>foreshore</b>	The part of a shore between high- and low-water marks, or between the water and cultivated or developed land.
<b>freshwater</b>	Water that is not salty. <b>Freshwater</b> and marine fish.
<b>gulf</b>	A large difference or division between two people or groups, or between viewpoints, concepts, or situations. <i>The widening <b>gulf</b> between the rich and the poor.</i>
<b>herring</b>	Valuable flesh of fatty fish from shallow waters of northern Atlantic or Pacific; usually salted or pickled.
<b>lagoon</b>	A stretch of salt water separated from the sea by a low sandbank or coral reef.
<b>lake</b>	Any of numerous bright translucent organic pigments. <i>The fish was served in a <b>lake</b> of spicy sauce.</i>
<b>loch</b>	Scottish word for a lake. <b>Loch</b> Lomond.
<b>mackerel</b>	Flesh of very important usually small (to 18 in) fatty Atlantic fish.
<b>marine</b>	A member of a body of troops trained to serve on land or sea, in particular (in the UK) a member of the Royal Marines or (in the US) a member of the Marine Corps. <b>Marine</b> painters.
<b>maritime</b>	Bordering on the sea. <i>A <b>maritime</b> province.</i>
<b>nautical</b>	Of or concerning navigation, sailors, or the sea; maritime. <b>Nautical</b> charts.
<b><a href="#">ocean</a></b>	A very large expanse of sea, in particular each of the main areas into which the sea is divided geographically. <i>She had <b>oceans</b> of energy.</i>
<b>offshore</b>	Away from shore; away from land. <i>This huge stretch of coastline is dominated by <b>offshore</b> barrier islands.</i>
<b>salmon</b>	Any of a number of fishes resembling the salmon. <i>Cotton checked throw in cream and <b>salmon</b> pink.</i>
<b>seashore</b>	The land between high- and low-water marks.

- shark** A small SE Asian freshwater fish with a tail resembling that of a shark popular in aquaria.  
*A card **shark**.*
- shore** Serve as a shore to.  
*Record companies have been anxious to import the music to American **shores**.*
- underwater** Submerged; flooded.  
*An epidemic of **underwater** mortgages.*
- waterfront** The area of a city (such as a harbor or dockyard) alongside a body of water.  
*Liverpool s **waterfront**.*
- whale** Hunt for whales.
- whaler** A seaman who works on a ship that hunts whales.
