Secluded as an Adjective

Definitions of "Secluded" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “secluded” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Hidden from general view or use.*
- *(of a place) not seen or visited by many people; sheltered and private.*
- *Providing privacy or seclusion.*



Synonyms of "Secluded" as an adjective (11 Words)

cloistered	Kept away from the outside world; sheltered. <i>The cloistered academic world of books.</i>
concealed	Not accessible to view. <i>A concealed compartment in his briefcase.</i>
<u>hidden</u>	Designed to elude detection. <i>Hidden dangers.</i>
<u>private</u>	Concerning things deeply private and personal. <i>Private family matters.</i>
privity	Informed about something secret or not generally known. <i>Privity to the details of the conspiracy.</i>
<u>reclusive</u>	Providing privacy or seclusion. <i>Sitting under the reclusive calm of a shade tree.</i>
secret	Of information given in confidence or in secret. <i>Secret or private thoughts.</i>

sequestered Providing privacy or seclusion.
*A wild **sequestered** spot.*

sheltered Protected from difficulties or unpleasant realities.
*I was a mathematics don at Cambridge living a rather **sheltered** life.*

undisturbed Untroubled by interference or disturbance.
*The tombs had lain **undisturbed** for 2 500 years.*

unfrequented Devoid of creatures.
*A region with only a few **unfrequented** tracks.*



Usage Examples of "Secluded" as an adjective

- *The gardens are quiet and secluded.*
- *A secluded romantic spot.*



Associations of "Secluded" (30 Words)

alienate	Make (someone) feel isolated or estranged. <i>An urban environment which would alienate its inhabitants.</i>
alone	Radically distinctive and without equal. <i>This theory is altogether alone in its penetration of the problem.</i>
cloistered	Of communal life sequestered from the world under religious vows. <i>The cloistered academic world of books.</i>
detached	(of a house or other building) not joined to another on either side. <i>She felt detached from the group.</i>
estrangle	Remove from customary environment or associations. <i>Years of boarding school estranged the child from her home.</i>
forlorn	(of an aim or endeavour) unlikely to succeed or be fulfilled. <i>A forlorn attempt to escape.</i>
hermit	A hummingbird found in the shady lower layers of tropical forests, foraging along a regular route.
isolate	A culture of microorganisms isolated for study. <i>A country which is isolated from the rest of the world.</i>

isolated	Remote and separate physically or socially. <i>Tiny isolated villages remote from centers of civilization.</i>
<u>isolation</u>	A country's withdrawal from international politics. <i>He opposed a policy of American isolation.</i>
<u>lone</u>	(of a parent) not having a partner to share the care of one's child or children. <i>I am by no means a lone voice.</i>
loneliness	The state of being alone in solitary isolation. <i>The loneliness of a sailor's life.</i>
lonely	Devoid of creatures. <i>A lonely crossroads.</i>
lonesome	Marked by dejection from being alone. <i>A lonesome pine.</i>
<u>privacy</u>	The condition of being concealed or hidden. <i>A law to restrict newspapers freedom to invade people's privacy.</i>
<u>recluse</u>	One who lives in solitude. <i>He's a bit of a recluse.</i>
<u>reclusive</u>	Avoiding the company of other people; solitary. <i>Sitting under the reclusive calm of a shade tree.</i>
<u>remote</u>	A remote control device. <i>The remote past or future.</i>
seclude	Keep (someone) away from other people. <i>I secluded myself up here for a life of study and meditation.</i>
seclusion	The quality of being secluded from the presence or view of others. <i>They enjoyed ten days of peace and seclusion.</i>
<u>segregate</u>	Someone who is or has been segregated. <i>Black people were segregated in churches schools and colleges.</i>
separate	Become separated into pieces or fragments. <i>Police were trying to separate two rioting mobs.</i>
<u>sequester</u>	A general cut in government spending. <i>The dentist sequesters the tooth he is working on.</i>
<u>sole</u>	Put a new sole on. <i>The sole example.</i>
<u>solitary</u>	(of a flower or other part) borne singly. <i>A solitary walk.</i>
<u>solitude</u>	The state or situation of being alone. <i>The battle to preserve beloved solitudes flared up all over the country.</i>

troglodyte (especially in prehistoric times) a person who lived in a cave.

underpopulated Having a lower population density than normal or desirable.
*The richly endowed but **underpopulated** Ivory Coast.*

unrewarding Not rewarding or satisfying.
*It was dull **unrewarding** work.*

withdrawn Withdrawn from society seeking solitude.
*When her husband died she became very **withdrawn**.*
