- *Relating to or denoting the output side of a device using electromagnetic induction, especially in a transformer.*
- *Being of second rank or importance or value; not direct or immediate.*
- *Denoting or relating to organisms in a particular community that belong to the second trophic level among its consumers, and consume primary consumers.*
- *Coming after, less important than, or resulting from someone or something else that is primary.*
- *Having a reversible chemical reaction and therefore able to store energy.*
- *Belonging to a lower class or rank.*

- *Inferior in rank or status.*
- *Not of major importance.*
- *(chiefly of amines) derived from ammonia by replacement of two hydrogen atoms by organic groups.*
- *Relating to education for children from the age of eleven to sixteen or eighteen.*
- *Depending on or incidental to what is original or primary.*
- *(of an organic compound) having its functional group located on a carbon atom which is bonded to two other carbon atoms.*

additional	Added, extra, or supplementary to what is already present or available. <i>Called for additional troops.</i>
alternative	Serving or used in place of another. <i>An alternative plan.</i>
<u>ancillary</u>	Providing necessary support to the primary activities or operation of an organization, system, etc. <i>Paragraph 19 was merely ancillary to paragraph 16.</i>
another	Any of various alternatives; some other. <i>Put it off to another or some other day.</i>
auxiliary	Furnishing added support. <i>The main library and its auxiliary branches.</i>
<u>concomitant</u>	Following or accompanying as a consequence. <i>She loved travel with all its concomitant worries.</i>
<u>consequential</u>	Important; significant. <i>The new congress lacked consequential leaders.</i>
<u>contingent</u>	(of losses, liabilities, etc.) that can be anticipated to arise if a particular event occurs. <i>Arms sales contingent on the approval of congress.</i>
<u>derivative</u>	Resulting from or employing derivation. <i>Equity based derivative products.</i>
derived	Formed or developed from something else; not original. <i>The belief that classes and organizations are secondary and derived.</i>
extra	Excessive or extravagant. <i>Extra ribs as well as other supernumerary internal parts.</i>
incidental	(sometimes followed by `to') minor or casual or subordinate in significance or nature or occurring as a chance concomitant or consequence. <i>The road will bring other incidental advantages.</i>
<u>indirect</u>	(of a route) not straight; not following the shortest way. <i>Indirect evidence.</i>
inessential	Not basic or fundamental. <i>Inessential information.</i>
junior-grade	Inferior in rank or status.
less important	A quantifier meaning not as great in amount or degree.
<u>lesser</u>	Used in names of animals and plants which are smaller than similar kinds e g lesser spotted woodpecker lesser celandine. <i>He was convicted of a lesser assault charge.</i>

<u>lower</u>	(of an animal or plant) showing relatively primitive or simple characteristics. <i>Managers lower down the hierarchy.</i>
lower-ranking	Inferior in rank or status.
<u>lowly</u>	(of an organism) primitive or simple. <i>A lowly corporal.</i>
<u>marginal</u>	Minor and not important; not central. <i>A marginal victory.</i>
<u>minor</u>	Of an interval characteristic of a minor scale and less by a semitone than the equivalent major interval. <i>Minor children.</i>
of little account	Young, immature.
peripheral	Of secondary or minor importance; marginal. <i>She will see their problems as peripheral to her own.</i>
petty	Unduly concerned with trivial matters, especially in a small-minded or spiteful way. <i>She thought readers were being petty in writing to complain about blocked paths.</i>
resultant	Occurring with or following as a consequence. <i>Restructuring and the resultant cost savings.</i>
resulting	Occurring or following as the consequence of something. <i>Talk of a general election and the resulting political uncertainty.</i>
<u>spare</u>	With no excess fat; thin. <i>Spare time on my hands.</i>
subaltern	Of lower status. <i>The private tutor was a recognized subaltern part of the bourgeois family.</i>
<u>subordinate</u>	Subject or submissive to authority or the control of another. <i>His subordinate officers.</i>
<u>subservient</u>	Abjectly submissive; characteristic of a slave or servant- S.H.Adams. <i>He expected her career to become subservient to his.</i>
subsidiary	(of a company) controlled by a holding or parent company. <i>Many argue that the cause of animal rights is subsidiary to that of protecting the environment.</i>
<u>substitute</u>	Serving or used in place of another. <i>Substitute coffee.</i>

supporting	Capable of bearing a structural load. <i>A supporting wall.</i>
<u>tangential</u>	Diverging from a previous course or line; erratic. <i>Tangential thoughts.</i>
<u>unimportant</u>	Devoid of importance, meaning, or force. <i>The question seems unimportant.</i>

nominal	Pertaining to a noun or to a word group that functions as a noun. <i>EU legislation allowed variation around the nominal weight that printed on each packet.</i>
paltry	Contemptibly small in amount. <i>She would earn a paltry 33 more a month.</i>
peccadillo	A petty misdeed. <i>The sexual peccadilloes of celebrities aren't necessarily news.</i>
pettiness	The quality of being unimportant and petty or frivolous. <i>The sheer pettiness of the officials was quite startling.</i>
picayune	Small and of little importance. <i>The picayune squabbling of party politicians.</i>
piddling	Pathetically trivial; trifling. <i>Piddling little questions.</i>

recessive	A recessive trait or gene. <i>This variant was a low status and recessive feature.</i>
slight	Being of delicate or slender build. <i>A slight increase.</i>
<u>subordinate</u>	Make subordinate dependent or subservient. <i>A subordinate kingdom.</i>
subsidiary	(of a company) controlled by a holding or parent company. <i>The firm s Spanish subsidiary.</i>
supplementary	A supplementary person or thing. <i>The development of databases supplementary to existing ones.</i>
<u>tenuous</u>	Having thin consistency. <i>A tenuous argument.</i>
trifling	Unimportant or trivial. <i>A trifling sum.</i>
<u>trivial</u>	Concerned with trivialities. <i>A trivial mind.</i>
underling	A person lower in status or rank. <i>She was shouting orders at underlings between gulps of coffee.</i>
undistinguished	Lacking distinction; unexceptional. <i>An undistinguished career.</i>
unessential	Not absolutely necessary; inessential. <i>A train has broken down resulting in a call to postpone all unessential travel.</i>
