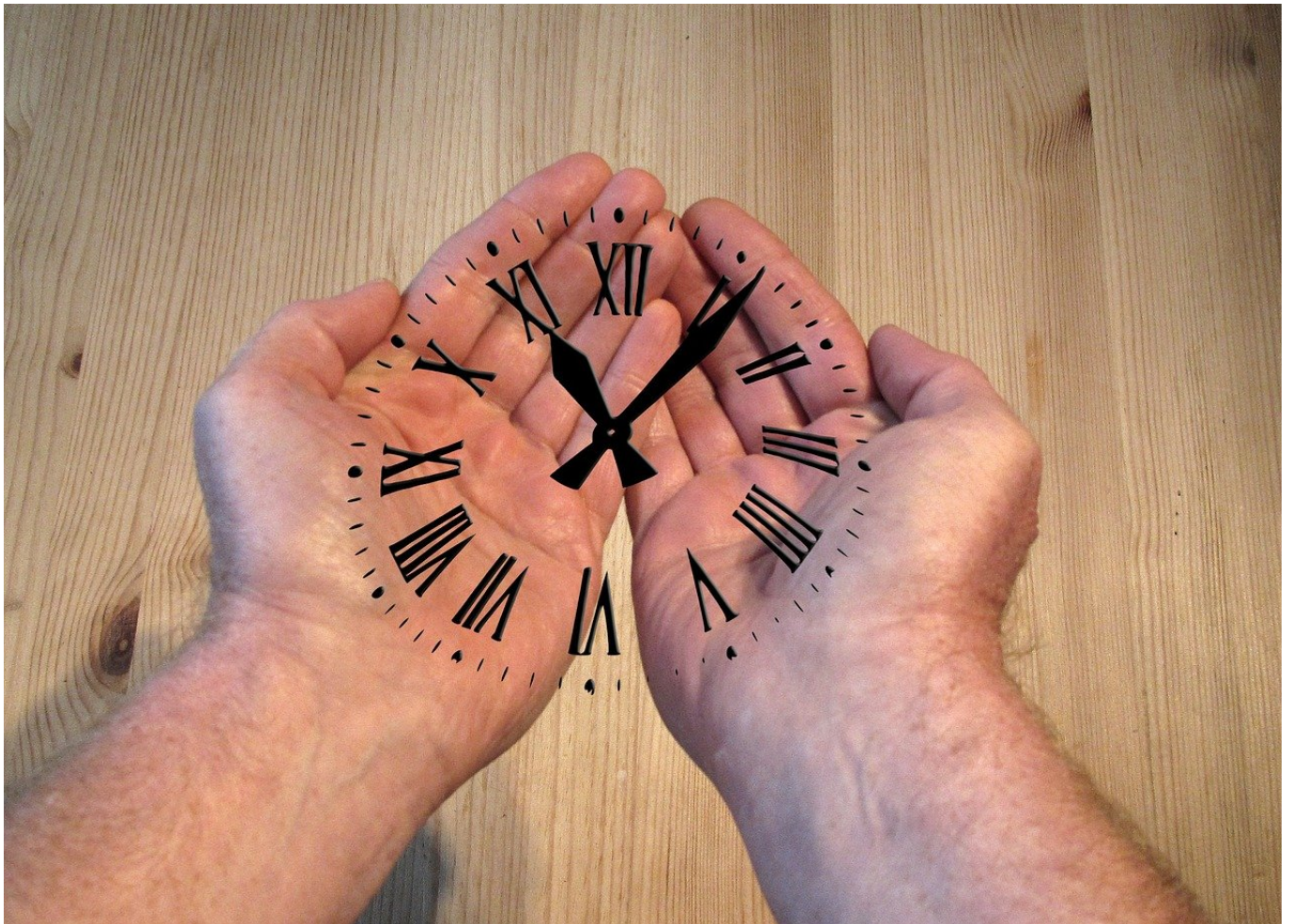
## Sections as a Noun

### Definitions of "Sections" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “sections” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A very thin slice (of tissue or mineral or other substance) for examination under a microscope.*
- *A division of an orchestra containing all instruments of the same class.*
- *A segment of a citrus fruit.*
- *The area created by a plane cutting through a solid.*
- *One of the portions into which something is regarded as divided and which together constitute a whole.*
- *A land unit equal to 1 square mile.*
- *A small team of policemen working as part of a police platoon.*
- *A distinct region or subdivision of a territorial or political area or community or group of people.*
- *One of several parts or pieces that fit with others to constitute a whole object.*
- *A self-contained part of a larger composition (written or musical).*

- A small class of students who are part of a larger course but are taught separately.
- A specialized division of a large organization.
- A small army unit usually having a special function.
- (geometry) the area created by a plane cutting through a solid.
- The cutting of or into body tissues or organs (especially by a surgeon as part of an operation).

- discussion section** An extended communication (often interactive) dealing with some particular topic.

<b>division</b>	Biology a group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>No multiplication or <b>division</b> is necessary.</i>
<b>incision</b>	A depression scratched or carved into a surface. <i>A block of marble delicately decorated with <b>incisions</b>.</i>
<b>part</b>	The appropriate or expected behaviour in a particular role or situation one's duty. <i>They resisted every effort on his <b>part</b>.</i>
<b>plane section</b>	A level of existence or development.
<b>segment</b>	The smallest distinct part of a spoken utterance, especially with regard to vowel and consonant sounds rather than stress or intonation. <i>A <b>segment</b> of an orange.</i>
<b>subdivision</b>	A section of a section; a part of a part; i.e., a part of something already divided. <i>Such an arrangement offers the possibility of <b>subdivision</b> into a series of identical spaces.</i>

## Associations of "Sections" (30 Words)

### apportion

Divide up and share out.

*Voting power will be **apportioned** according to contribution.*

### branch

Grow and send out branches or branch like structures.

*Sophie was in the **branches** of a tree eating an apple.*

### **cleave**

Make a way through (something) forcefully, as if by splitting it apart.

*The water is going to **cleave** a channel into the rock.*

### divide

Separate into parts or portions.

***Divide** 4 into 20.*

### **division**

Biology a group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category.

*A retail **division**.*

### fraction

A component of a mixture that has been separated by a fractional process.

*Her eyes widened a **fraction**.*

<b>fractional</b>	Relating to or denoting the separation of a mixture into fractions. <i>The <b>fractional</b> variance in mass density per unit.</i>
<b>fracture</b>	Sustain a fracture of a bone. <i>He <b>fractured</b> his skull when he was a kid.</i>
<b>fragment</b>	Break or cause to break into fragments. <i><b>Fragments</b> of a play.</i>
<b>fragmentary</b>	Consisting of small disconnected parts. <i><b>Fragmentary</b> remains.</i>
<b>fragmentation</b>	The disintegration of social norms governing behavior and thought and social relationships. <i>The <b>fragmentation</b> of society into a collection of interest groups.</i>
<b>half</b>	Partially or to the extent of a half. <i>Gave me a <b>half</b> smile.</i>
<b>intersect</b>	Meet at a point. <i>The area is <b>intersected</b> only by minor roads.</i>
<b>least</b>	Used in names of very small animals and plants e.g. least shrew. <i>My best routine was the one I had practised the <b>least</b>.</i>
<b>moiety</b>	One of two basic subdivisions of a tribe. <i>The enzyme removes the sulphate <b>moiety</b>.</i>
<b>part</b>	A melody or other constituent of harmony assigned to a particular voice or instrument in a musical work. <i>Glue the two <b>parts</b> together.</i>
<b>partial</b>	Having a strong preference or liking for. <i><b>Partial</b> collapse.</i>
<b>partially</b>	In part; in some degree; not wholly. <i>The work <b>partially</b> fulfills the function of a historical memoir.</i>
<b>partition</b>	Divide a room into smaller rooms or areas by erecting partitions. <i>The Arab peninsula was <b>partitioned</b> by the British.</i>
<b>partly</b>	In part; in some degree; not wholly. <i>I felt <b>partly</b> to blame.</i>
<b>piece</b>	To join or unite the pieces of. <i>The children acted out a comic <b>piece</b> to amuse the guests.</i>
<b>portion</b>	A part of a whole. <i>Eating meals that are <b>portioned</b> out properly will help you avoid binge eating.</i>



<b>schism</b>	The formal separation of a Church into two Churches or the secession of a group owing to doctrinal and other differences. <i>The widening <b>schism</b> between Church leaders and politicians.</i>
<b>scission</b>	The act of dividing by cutting or splitting. <i>A <b>scission</b> arose between the socialists and those further to the left.</i>
<b>secant</b>	The ratio of the hypotenuse to the shorter side adjacent to an acute angle (in a right-angled triangle); the reciprocal of a cosine.
<b>sector</b>	The minimum track length that can be assigned to store information unless otherwise specified a sector of data consists of 512 bytes. <i>The government aimed to reassure the industrial and commercial <b>sector</b>.</i>
<b>segment</b>	Divide into segments. <i>The cells <b>segmented</b>.</i>
<b>segmentation</b>	The act of dividing or partitioning; separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. <i><b>Segmentation</b> of the road network.</i>
<b>some</b>	To some extent quite a lot. <i>They were here for <b>some</b> weeks.</i>
<b>somewhat</b>	To a small degree or extent. <i>Matters have improved <b>somewhat</b> since then.</i>
