### Definitions of "Security" as a noun

- *A certificate attesting credit, the ownership of stocks or bonds, or the right to ownership connected with tradable derivatives.*
- *Defense against financial failure; financial independence.*
- *Measures taken as a precaution against theft or espionage or sabotage etc.*
- *A formal declaration that documents a fact of relevance to finance and investment; the holder has a right to receive interest or dividends.*
- *The state of being free from danger or threat.*
- *A thing deposited or pledged as a guarantee of the fulfilment of an undertaking or the repayment of a loan, to be forfeited in case of default.*
- *An electrical device that sets off an alarm when someone tries to break in.*

- *The safety of a state or organization against criminal activity such as terrorism, theft, or espionage.*
- *A guarantee that an obligation will be met.*
- *Freedom from anxiety or fear.*
- *The state of being free from danger or injury.*
- *Procedures followed or measures taken to ensure the security of a state or organization.*
- *Property that your creditor can claim in case you default on your obligation.*
- *A department responsible for the security of the institution's property and workers.*
- *The state of feeling safe, stable, and free from fear or anxiety.*

<u>buffer</u>	A person or thing that reduces a shock or that forms a barrier between incompatible or antagonistic people or things. <i>Family and friends can provide a <b>buffer</b> against stress.</i>
<u>certainty</u>	A person that is certain to do or win the specified thing. <i>His <b>certainty</b> reassured the others.</i>
<b>certificate</b>	A document recording a person's birth, marriage, or death. <i>An 18 <b>certificate</b>.</i>
<u>collateral</u>	A person having the same ancestor as another but through a different line. <i>She put her house up as <b>collateral</b> for the bank loan.</i>
<b>comfort</b>	A freedom from financial difficulty that promotes a comfortable state. <i>There is room for four people to travel in <b>comfort</b>.</i>
<b>confidence</b>	The telling of private matters or secrets with mutual trust. <i>The girls exchanged <b>confidences</b> about their parents.</i>
<b>cover</b>	An area of the field consisting of cover point and extra cover. <i>The fox was flushed from its <b>cover</b>.</i>
<b>defence</b>	Military action or resources protecting a country against potential enemies. <i>Despite heavy pressure the <b>defence</b> was coping well.</i>
<b>equities</b>	Conformity with rules or standards.
<b>feeling of ease</b>	The general atmosphere of a place or situation and the effect that it has on people.
<b>feeling of safety</b>	The experiencing of affective and emotional states.
<b>freedom from danger</b>	Immunity from an obligation or duty.
<b>freedom from doubt</b>	The condition of being free; the power to act or speak or think without externally imposed restraints.
<b>guarantee</b>	A thing serving as security for a guarantee. <i>The treaty provides a <b>guarantee</b> of free trade.</i>

<b>guard</b>	The person who plays the position of guard on a basketball team. <i>A security <b>guard</b>.</i>
<b>happiness</b>	Emotions experienced when in a state of well-being. <i>She struggled to find <b>happiness</b> in her life.</i>
<b><u>holdings</u></b>	Something owned; any tangible or intangible possession that is owned by someone.
<b>indemnity</b>	Protection against future loss. <i>A deed of <b>indemnity</b>.</i>
<b>insurance</b>	Promise of reimbursement in the case of loss paid to people or companies so concerned about hazards that they have made prepayments to an insurance company. <i>Many new borrowers take out <b>insurance</b> against unemployment or sickness.</i>
<b>investments</b>	Outer layer or covering of an organ or part or organism. <i>This job calls for the investment of some hard thinking.</i>
<b>peace of mind</b>	The general security of public places.
<b><u>pledge</u></b>	The drinking of a person's health; a toast. <i>Appeals for emergency relief met with <b>pledges</b> totalling 250 000 000.</i>
<b>precaution</b>	A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>We never took <b>precautions</b>.</i>
<b>preventive</b>	Any obstruction that impedes or is burdensome. <i>Quinine was used as a malaria <b>preventive</b>.</i>
<b>prophylactic</b>	A condom. <i>I took malaria <b>prophylactics</b>.</i>
<b>protection</b>	Protection money paid to criminals especially on a regular basis. <i>The witnesses demanded police <b>protection</b>.</i>
<b>provision</b>	A condition or requirement in a legal document. <i>Farmers have been slow to make <b>provision</b> for their retirement.</i>
<b>safeguards</b>	A precautionary measure warding off impending danger or damage or injury etc. <i>An insurance policy is a good safeguard.</i>
<b>safety</b>	A condom. <i>A <b>safety</b> barrier.</i>
<b>safety measure</b>	A score in American football; a player is tackled behind his own goal line.

<b>safety measures</b>	The state of being certain that adverse effects will not be caused by some agent under defined conditions.
<b><u>screen</u></b>	A windscreen of a motor vehicle. <i>A computer <b>screen</b>.</i>
<b>securities</b>	Property that your creditor can claim in case you default on your obligation. <i>His pension gave him security in his old age.</i>
<b>security department</b>	The state of being free from danger or injury.
<b>security measure</b>	A formal declaration that documents a fact of relevance to finance and investment; the holder has a right to receive interest or dividends.
<b>security measures</b>	A formal declaration that documents a fact of relevance to finance and investment; the holder has a right to receive interest or dividends.
<b>security system</b>	Freedom from anxiety or fear.
<b>shares</b>	Assets belonging to or due to or contributed by an individual person or group. <i>He bought 100 <b>shares</b> of IBM at the market price.</i>
<b><u>shelter</u></b>	A place giving temporary protection from bad weather or danger. <i>Huts like this are used as a <b>shelter</b> during the winter.</i>
<b>surety</b>	The state of being sure or certain of something. <i>The magistrate granted bail with a <b>surety</b> of 500.</i>

<b>chaperone</b>	Accompany as a chaperone. <i><b>Chaperones</b> sat at the edge of the dance gossiping and watching.</i>
<b>convoy</b>	The act of escorting while in transit. <i>The warships <b>convoyed</b> the merchant ships across the Pacific.</i>
<b>counterespionage</b>	Spying on the spies.

<b>defensible</b>	Capable of being defended. <i>A morally <b>defensible</b> penal system.</i>
<b>encryption</b>	The activity of converting data or information into code. <i>I use <b>encryption</b> to protect sensitive information transmitted online.</i>

<u>espionage</u>	The practice of spying or of using spies, typically by governments to obtain political and military information. <i>The camouflage and secrecy of <b>espionage</b>.</i>
<b>fender</b>	A plastic cylinder, tyre, piece of old rope or matting, etc., hung over a ship's side to protect it against impact. <i>In Britain they call a <b>fender</b> a wing.</i>
<b>firewall</b>	Protect a network or system from unauthorized access with a firewall. <i>Our security products offer integral <b>firewalling</b>.</i>
<b>guard</b>	The person who plays the position of guard on a basketball team. <i>Soldiers on <b>guard</b> duty.</i>
<b>infiltration</b>	The slow passage of a liquid through a filtering medium. <i>The <b>infiltration</b> of seawater through the lava.</i>
<b>landslide</b>	A slide of a large mass of dirt and rock down a mountain or cliff. <i>The road was blocked by a <b>landslide</b>.</i>
<b>latch</b>	Fasten a door or gate with a latch. <i>The output relay can be set to <b>latch</b> at a preset value.</i>
<u>patrol</u>	Maintain the security of by carrying out a patrol. <i>A police <b>patrol</b> stopped the man and searched him.</i>
<b>police</b>	Members of a police force. <i>When someone is killed the <b>police</b> have to be informed.</i>
<b>probation</b>	A trial period during which your character and abilities are tested to see whether you are suitable for work or for membership. <i>I went to court and was put on <b>probation</b>.</i>
<b>protecting</b>	Shielding (or designed to shield) against harm or discomfort. <i>The <b>protecting</b> blanket of snow.</i>
<b>safeguard</b>	A measure taken to protect someone or something or to prevent something undesirable. <i>An insurance policy is a good <b>safeguard</b>.</i>
<b>safely</b>	In a way that is not likely to cause or lead to harm or injury. <i>All crews have returned <b>safely</b> from their missions.</i>
<b>safety</b>	The successful act of striking a baseball in such a way that the batter reaches base safely. <i>He ran to <b>safety</b>.</i>
<b>sentry</b>	A person employed to keep watch for some anticipated event. <i>Two men stood <b>sentry</b> on the door every evening.</i>
<u>shelter</u>	Provide shelter for. <i>We are <b>sheltered</b> from the awfulness of reality.</i>
