### **Sedentary as an Adjective**

#### Definitions of "Sedentary" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "sedentary" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- (of an animal) sessile.
- (of work or a way of life) characterized by much sitting and little physical exercise.
- Inhabiting the same locality throughout life; not migratory or nomadic.
- (of a position) sitting; seated.
- Requiring sitting or little activity.
- (of a person) tending to spend much time seated; somewhat inactive.





## Synonyms of "Sedentary" as an adjective (6 Words)

**desk-bound** Restricted to working in an office rather than in an active physical capacity.

inactive	Not participating in a chemical reaction; chemically inert. <i>Inactive</i> accounts.
seated	Sitting down. The audience remained <b>seated</b> .
sitting	(of a hen or other bird) settled on eggs for the purpose of incubating them. A <i>sitting</i> position.
<u>stationary</u>	Standing still. The car remained <b>stationary</b> with the engine running.
still	(of a body of water) free from disturbance by heavy waves. She sat very <b>still</b> her eyes closed.





#### Usage Examples of "Sedentary" as an adjective

- We all walk a certain amount every day even if we are sedentary.
- Forced by illness to lead a sedentary life.
- *He spoke from a sedentary position.*
- A tribe of sedentary agriculturists.
- A sedentary lifestyle spells bad news for hips and thighs.

## Associations of "Sedentary" (30 Words)

already	Prior to a specified or implied time. It was <b>already</b> past four o clock.
<u>complacency</u>	The feeling you have when you are satisfied with yourself. <i>His <b>complacency</b> was absolutely disgusting.</i>
constancy	The quality of being enduring and free from change or variation. <i>Early mariners relied on the constancy of the trade winds.</i>



<u>dormant</u>	In a condition of biological rest or suspended animation. That <b>dormant</b> urge to write fiction has re emerged.
fixed	Of a number having a fixed and unchanging value. A <b>fixed</b> smile.
idleness	The trait of being idle out of a reluctance to work. We suffered a period of enforced <b>idleness</b> .
immobile	Not capable of movement or of being moved. <i>She sat <b>immobile</b> for a long time.</i>
immobility	The quality of not moving. <i>The disorder is caused by long periods of <b>immobility</b>.</i>
<u>immovable</u>	Immovable property. The <b>immovable</b> hills.
inaction	The state of being inactive. Future generations will condemn us for <b>inaction</b> .
inactive	Not exerting influence or change. <i>The <b>inactive</b> X chromosome</i> .
inactivity	A disposition to remain inactive or inert. Don t suddenly take up violent exercise after years of <b>inactivity</b> .
<u>inert</u>	Unable to move or resist motion. An <b>inert</b> political system.
lull	Calm by deception. <i>Conversation <b>lull</b>ed for an hour.</i>
<u>motionless</u>	Not in physical motion. An eagle hung almost <b>motionless</b> close to the ground.
<u>nonetheless</u>	Despite anything to the contrary (usually following a concession. The rally which the government had declared illegal was <b>nonetheless</b> attended by some 6 000.
quiescence	Inactivity or dormancy. This method has been shown to induce sleep like <b>quiescence</b> in adult animals.
quiescent	Marked by a state of tranquil repose. The <b>quiescent</b> melancholy of the town.
ready	Make ready or suitable or equip in advance for a particular purpose or for some use event etc. <b>Ready</b> to learn to read.
settled	Not changeable. A period of <b>settled</b> weather.



<u>stable</u>	Shelter in a stable. Prices have remained relatively <b>stable</b> .
standing	Executed in or initiated from a standing position. A <b>standing</b> army.
<u>static</u>	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. <i>The reception was going sour breaking up into static.</i>
statics	The branch of mechanics concerned with forces in equilibrium.
<u>stationary</u>	Not moving or not intended to be moved. <i>Stationary</i> machinery.
steadfast	Resolutely or dutifully firm and unwavering. <i>Steadfast loyalty.</i>
still	A plant and works where alcoholic drinks are made by distillation. <i>Film stills.</i>
torpid	In a condition of biological rest or suspended animation. <i>Torpid frogs.</i>
tranquilize	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to.
unmoving	Not stirring any emotion. This must be the most <b>unmoving</b> performance of Verdi s opera ever recorded.
