- allure** The quality of being powerfully and mysteriously attractive or fascinating.  
*People for whom gold holds no **allure**.*
- attraction** A quality or feature that evokes interest, liking, or desire.  
*This reform has many **attractions** for those on the left.*
- bait** Food placed on a hook or in a net, trap, or fishing area to entice fish or other animals as prey.  
*Herrings make excellent **bait** for pike.*
- call** A direction in a square dance given by the caller.  
*Turkeys in the wild don't sound like most turkey **calls**.*
- charm** A characteristic property of certain subatomic particles specifically charm quarks charm antiquarks and hadrons containing these expressed as a quantum number.  
*The **charm** begins with ritual instructions.*

<b>conquest</b>	The overcoming of a problem or weakness. <i>Colonial <b>conquests</b>.</i>
<b><u>decoy</u></b>	A bird or mammal, or an imitation of one, used by hunters to attract other birds or mammals. <i>A <b>decoy</b> duck.</i>
<b>draw</b>	An act of drawing on a cigarette or cigar. <i>Most high handicappers would benefit from a controlled <b>draw</b>.</i>
<b><u>lure</u></b>	Something used to lure fish or other animals into danger so they can be trapped or killed. <i>The <b>lure</b> of the exotic East.</i>
<b><u>magnet</u></b>	A piece of iron or other material which has its component atoms so ordered that the material exhibits properties of magnetism such as attracting other iron containing objects or aligning itself in an external magnetic field. <i>The beautiful stretch of white sand is a <b>magnet</b> for sun worshippers.</i>
<b>pull</b>	An act of pulling something. <i>He was sidelined with a hamstring <b>pull</b>.</i>
<b>taking away someone's innocence</b>	The act of someone who picks up or takes something.
<b><u>temptation</u></b>	The act of influencing by exciting hope or desire. <i>He felt the <b>temptation</b> and his will power weakened.</i>

<b><u>coax</u></b>	Gently and persistently persuade (someone) to do something. <i>Her lovely hair had been <b>coaxed</b> into ringlets.</i>
<b>coquet</b>	Behave flirtatiously; flirt. <i>For a while he <b>coquetted</b> with engineering.</i>
<b>dating</b>	Use of chemical analysis to estimate the age of geological specimens.
<b><u>decoy</u></b>	Lure or entrap with or as if with a decoy. <i>We need a <b>decoy</b> to distract their attention.</i>
<b>delusive</b>	Giving a false or misleading impression. <i><b>Delusive</b> faith in a wonder drug.</i>
<b>devil</b>	(in Christian and Jewish belief) the supreme spirit of evil; Satan. <i>Where the <b>devil</b> is he.</i>
<b><u>entice</u></b>	Provoke someone to do something through (often false or exaggerated) promises or persuasion. <i>A show which should <b>entice</b> a new audience into the theatre.</i>
<b>enticing</b>	Highly attractive and able to arouse hope or desire. <i>An <b>enticing</b> prospect.</i>
<b><u>fascinate</u></b>	To render motionless, as with a fixed stare or by arousing terror or awe. <i>The snake charmer <b>fascinates</b> the cobra.</i>
<b>glamorize</b>	Make glamorous and attractive. <i>This new wallpaper really <b>glamorizes</b> the living room.</i>
<b>inducement</b>	A thing that persuades or leads someone to do something. <i>Companies were prepared to build only in return for massive <b>inducements</b>.</i>
<b>ingratiating</b>	Calculated to please or gain favor. <i>A smooth <b>ingratiating</b> manner.</i>
<b>intrigue</b>	Form intrigues for in an underhand manner. <i>The cabinet was a nest of <b>intrigue</b>.</i>
<b>invite</b>	Invite someone to one's house. <i>We were <b>invited</b> to a dinner at the Embassy.</i>
<b><u>inviting</u></b>	Attractive and tempting. <i>The sea down there looks so <b>inviting</b>.</i>
<b><u>lure</u></b>	Something used to lure fish or other animals into danger so they can be trapped or killed. <i>The child was <b>lured</b> into a car but managed to escape.</i>
<b><u>seductive</u></b>	Tending to entice into a desired action or state. <i>A <b>seductive</b> voice.</i>
<b><u>tempt</u></b>	Induce into action by using one's charm. <i>The window displays <b>tempted</b> the shoppers.</i>

- temptation** Something that seduces or has the quality to seduce.  
*He felt the **temptation** and his will power weakened.*
- tempter** A person who tempts others.  
*Satan is the great **tempter** of mankind.*
- tempting** Very pleasantly inviting.  
*A **tempting** financial offer.*
- woo** Seek the favour, support, or custom of.  
*Pop stars are being **wooed** by film companies eager to sign them up.*
- worldly** Characteristic of or devoted to the temporal world as opposed to the spiritual world.  
*The benefits of his **worldly** wisdom.*
