look	Look forward to the probable occurrence of. <i>They looked up as he came into the room.</i>
lookout	A structure commanding a wide view of its surroundings. <i>What if he gets fits It s a bad lookout in that case.</i>
microscopy	Research with the use of microscopes.
observant	Adhering strictly to laws and rules and customs. <i>Observant of the speed limit.</i>
observation	A remark expressing careful consideration. <i>He made a telling observation about Hughie.</i>
observe	Observe with care or pay close attention to. <i>A stockbroker once observed that dealers live and work in hell.</i>

observer	A person who becomes aware (of things or events) through the senses. <i>Elections scrutinized by international observers.</i>
observing	Quick to notice; showing quick and keen perception.
ocular	Of or connected with the eyes or vision. <i>Ocular diseases.</i>
offstage	(in a theatre) away from the stage and so not visible to the audience. <i>She walked away as the clear winner of both onstage and offstage dancing.</i>
optic	A lens or other optical component in an optical instrument. <i>The optic or optical axis of the eye.</i>
optical	Operating in or employing the visible part of the electromagnetic spectrum. <i>An optical illusion.</i>
participant	Someone who takes part in an activity. <i>Staff are to be active participants in the decision making process.</i>
percipient	(especially in philosophy or with reference to psychic phenomena) a person who is able to perceive things. <i>He is a percipient interpreter of the public mood.</i>
sight	Take a detailed visual measurement of something with or as with a sight. <i>He was a familiar sight on the television.</i>
spectacle	A blunder that makes you look ridiculous used in the phrase make a spectacle of yourself. <i>The spectacle of a city's mass grief.</i>
spectator	A close observer; someone who looks at something (such as an exhibition of some kind). <i>The spectators applauded the performance.</i>
telescope	A magnifier of images of distant objects. <i>The novel was telescoped into a short play.</i>
telescopic	Having parts that slide one within another. <i>A bright star with a telescopic companion.</i>
visibility	Quality or fact or degree of being visible; perceptible by the eye or obvious to the eye. <i>The issue began to lose its visibility.</i>
visible	Visible imports or exports. <i>A visible improvement.</i>
visual	Relating to seeing or sight. <i>Visual powers.</i>

A watchman or group of watchmen who patrolled and guarded the streets of a town before the introduction of the police force.
