- *From appearances alone.*
- *So as to give the impression of having a certain quality; apparently.*
- *From appearances alone-Thomas.*

allegedly	Used to convey that something is claimed to be the case or have taken place, although there is no proof. <i>Allegedly</i> obscene material.
apparently	From appearances alone. <i>Irrigation often produces bumper crops from apparently desert land.</i>
as far as one can see	To the same degree (often followed by `as.
as far as one can tell	To the same degree (often followed by `as.

avowedly	As acknowledged. <i>The article is avowedly a historical analysis.</i>
evidently	In a way that is clearly seen or understood; obviously. <i>Evidently Mrs Smith thought differently.</i>
ostensibly	From appearances alone. <i>Had been ostensibly frank as to his purpose while really concealing it.</i>
outwardly	In outward appearance. <i>Outwardly she seemed no different.</i>
professedly	By open declaration. <i>Susan Smith was professedly guilty of the murders.</i>
purportedly	As appears or is stated to be true, though not necessarily so; allegedly. <i>A purportedly independent arbitrator.</i>
superficially	As to the outward appearance only; on the surface. <i>He was superficially wounded in the neck.</i>
supposedly	Believed or reputed to be the case. <i>There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues supposedly because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.</i>
to all appearances	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).
to all intents and purposes	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).

Usage Examples of "Seemingly" as an adverb

- *A seemingly competent and well-organized person.*
- *It's touch-and-go, seemingly, and she's asking for you.*
- *The child is seemingly healthy but the doctor is concerned.*

apparent	Seeming real or true, but not necessarily so. <i>The committee investigated some apparent discrepancies.</i>
apparently	From appearances alone-Thomas. <i>The child nodded apparently content with the promise.</i>

<u>casual</u>	A youth belonging to a subculture characterized by the wearing of expensive casual clothing and frequently associated with football hooliganism. <i>The business employs eight full time sales staff and ten casuals.</i>
clearly	Without doubt or question. <i>I could clearly see myself in his situation.</i>
detectable	Easily seen or detected. <i>There is a detectable note of bitterness when he talks of his father.</i>
discernible	Perceptible by the senses or intellect. <i>The skyline is easily discernible even at a distance of several miles.</i>
distinctly	To a distinct degree. <i>Two distinctly different cultures.</i>
effortless	Requiring no physical or mental exertion. <i>The swallows glided in an effortless way through the busy air.</i>
<u>evident</u>	Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment. <i>She ate the biscuits with evident enjoyment.</i>
<u>evidently</u>	Used as an affirmative response. <i>Evidently Mrs Smith thought differently.</i>
<u>exterior</u>	The outer side or surface of something. <i>Exterior grade plywood.</i>
<u>facile</u>	(especially of success in sport) easily achieved; effortless. <i>A facile seven lengths victory.</i>
identifiable	Capable of being identified. <i>There are no easily identifiable features on the shoreline.</i>
justified	Having, done for, or marked by a good or legitimate reason. <i>A neatly justified list of names.</i>
<u>manifest</u>	Record in a ship s manifest. <i>Bad industrial relations are often manifested in strikes.</i>
marked	Strongly marked easily noticeable. <i>A scar marked face.</i>
<u>noticeable</u>	Undesirably noticeable. <i>Noticeable shadows under her eyes.</i>
observable	Capable of being seen or noticed. <i>Observable differences.</i>
obvious	Predictable and lacking in subtlety. <i>Unemployment has been the most obvious cost of the recession.</i>

obviously	Unmistakably (‘plain’ is often used informally for ‘plainly’). <i>Obviously everyone has to do what they think is right.</i>
palpability	The quality of being perceivable by touch.
perceptible	Easily seen or detected. <i>He continued after a perceptible pause.</i>
plain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>Stuck to the plain facts.</i>
rightly	In accordance with justice or what is morally right. <i>He was rightly considered the greatest singer of his time.</i>
seeming	Appearing as such but not necessarily so. <i>Ellen s seeming indifference to the woman s fate.</i>
unambiguous	Admitting of no doubt or misunderstanding; having only one meaning or interpretation and leading to only one conclusion. <i>As a horror apartheid is absolutely unambiguous.</i>
unattractive	Not appealing to the senses. <i>If the revised bid is unattractive it may not be accepted.</i>
unequivocal	Leaving no doubt; unambiguous. <i>An unequivocal answer.</i>
visible	Visible imports or exports. <i>The visible trade gap.</i>
visibly	In a visible manner. <i>The defendant paled visibly as the guilty verdict was announced.</i>
