## Seemingly as an Adverb

### Definitions of "Seemingly" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “seemingly” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *According to the facts as one knows them; as far as one knows.*
- *From appearances alone.*
- *So as to give the impression of having a certain quality; apparently.*
- *From appearances alone-Thomas.*

### Synonyms of "Seemingly" as an adverb (14 Words)

<b>allegedly</b>	Used to convey that something is claimed to be the case or have taken place, although there is no proof. <b><i>Allegedly</i></b> obscene material.
<b><a href="#">apparently</a></b>	From appearances alone. <i>Irrigation often produces bumper crops from <b>apparently</b> desert land.</i>
<b>as far as one can see</b>	To the same degree (often followed by `as.
<b>as far as one can tell</b>	To the same degree (often followed by `as.

<b>avowedly</b>	As acknowledged. <i>The article is <b>avowedly</b> a historical analysis.</i>
<b>evidently</b>	In a way that is clearly seen or understood; obviously. <i><b>Evidently</b> Mrs Smith thought differently.</i>
<b>ostensibly</b>	From appearances alone. <i>Had been <b>ostensibly</b> frank as to his purpose while really concealing it.</i>
<b>outwardly</b>	In outward appearance. <i><b>Outwardly</b> she seemed no different.</i>
<b>professedly</b>	By open declaration. <i>Susan Smith was <b>professedly</b> guilty of the murders.</i>
<b>purportedly</b>	As appears or is stated to be true, though not necessarily so; allegedly. <i>A <b>purportedly</b> independent arbitrator.</i>
<b>superficially</b>	As to the outward appearance only; on the surface. <i>He was <b>superficially</b> wounded in the neck.</i>
<b>supposedly</b>	Believed or reputed to be the case. <i>There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues <b>supposedly</b> because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.</i>
<b>to all appearances</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent ('whole' is often used informally for 'wholly').
<b>to all intents and purposes</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent ('whole' is often used informally for 'wholly').

## Usage Examples of "Seemingly" as an adverb

- A seemingly competent and well-organized person.
- It's touch-and-go, seemingly, and she's asking for you.
- The child is seemingly healthy but the doctor is concerned.

<b>apparent</b>	Seeming real or true, but not necessarily so. <i>The committee investigated some <b>apparent</b> discrepancies.</i>
<b>apparently</b>	From appearances alone-Thomas. <i>The child nodded <b>apparently</b> content with the promise.</i>

<b><u>casual</u></b>	A youth belonging to a subculture characterized by the wearing of expensive casual clothing and frequently associated with football hooliganism. <i>The business employs eight full time sales staff and ten <b>casuals</b>.</i>
<b>clearly</b>	Without doubt or question. <i>I could <b>clearly</b> see myself in his situation.</i>
<b>detectable</b>	Easily seen or detected. <i>There is a <b>detectable</b> note of bitterness when he talks of his father.</i>
<b>discernible</b>	Perceptible by the senses or intellect. <i>The skyline is easily <b>discernible</b> even at a distance of several miles.</i>
<b>distinctly</b>	To a distinct degree. <i>Two <b>distinctly</b> different cultures.</i>
<b>effortless</b>	Requiring no physical or mental exertion. <i>The swallows glided in an <b>effortless</b> way through the busy air.</i>
<b><u>evident</u></b>	Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment. <i>She ate the biscuits with <b>evident</b> enjoyment.</i>
<b><u>evidently</u></b>	Used as an affirmative response. <i><b>Evidently</b> Mrs Smith thought differently.</i>
<b><u>exterior</u></b>	The outer side or surface of something. <i><b>Exterior</b> grade plywood.</i>
<b><u>facile</u></b>	(especially of success in sport) easily achieved; effortless. <i>A <b>facile</b> seven lengths victory.</i>
<b>identifiable</b>	Capable of being identified. <i>There are no easily <b>identifiable</b> features on the shoreline.</i>
<b>justified</b>	Having, done for, or marked by a good or legitimate reason. <i>A neatly <b>justified</b> list of names.</i>
<b><u>manifest</u></b>	Record in a ship s manifest. <i>Bad industrial relations are often <b>manifested</b> in strikes.</i>
<b>marked</b>	Strongly marked easily noticeable. <i>A scar <b>marked</b> face.</i>
<b><u>noticeable</u></b>	Undesirably noticeable. <i><b>Noticeable</b> shadows under her eyes.</i>
<b>observable</b>	Capable of being seen or noticed. <i><b>Observable</b> differences.</i>
<b>obvious</b>	Predictable and lacking in subtlety. <i>Unemployment has been the most <b>obvious</b> cost of the recession.</i>

<b>obviously</b>	Unmistakably (`plain' is often used informally for `plainly'). <i><b>Obviously</b> everyone has to do what they think is right.</i>
<b>palpability</b>	The quality of being perceivable by touch.
<b>perceptible</b>	Easily seen or detected. <i>He continued after a <b>perceptible</b> pause.</i>
<b>plain</b>	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>Stuck to the <b>plain</b> facts.</i>
<b>rightly</b>	In accordance with justice or what is morally right. <i>He was <b>rightly</b> considered the greatest singer of his time.</i>
<u><b>seeming</b></u>	Appearing as such but not necessarily so. <i>Ellen s <b>seeming</b> indifference to the woman s fate.</i>
<u><b>unambiguous</b></u>	Admitting of no doubt or misunderstanding; having only one meaning or interpretation and leading to only one conclusion. <i>As a horror apartheid is absolutely <b>unambiguous</b>.</i>
<u><b>unattractive</b></u>	Not appealing to the senses. <i>If the revised bid is <b>unattractive</b> it may not be accepted.</i>
<u><b>unequivocal</b></u>	Leaving no doubt; unambiguous. <i>An <b>unequivocal</b> answer.</i>
<u><b>visible</b></u>	Visible imports or exports. <i>The <b>visible</b> trade gap.</i>
<b>visibly</b>	In a visible manner. <i>The defendant paled <b>visibly</b> as the guilty verdict was announced.</i>
