Definitions of "Seep" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "seep" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Pass gradually or leak through or as if through small openings.
- (of a liquid) flow or leak slowly through porous material or small holes.





Synonyms of "Seep" as a verb (20 Words)

bleed	Get or extort (money or other possessions) from someone. <i>Air can be got rid of by</i> bleed <i>ing the radiator at the vent.</i>
discharge	Go off or discharge. The eyes and nose began to discharge .
drain	Empty of liquid drain the liquid from. Gradually the tension and stress drain ed away.
<u>dribble</u>	Propel. He attempted to dribble the ball from the goal area.
<u>drip</u>	(of liquid) fall in small drops. His hands were drip ping with blood.



escape	Interrupt an operation by means of the escape key. We escape d to our summer house for a few days.
<u>excrete</u>	(of a living organism or cell) separate and expel as waste (a substance, especially a product of metabolism. Excess bicarbonate is excrete d by the kidney.
exude	Release (a liquid) in drops or small quantities. Sir Thomas exude d goodwill.
filter	Remove by passing through a filter. You ll be put through to a secretary whose job it is to filter calls.
flow	Fall or flow in a certain way. Their talk and laughter grew louder as the excellent brandy flow ed.
issue	Prepare and issue for public distribution or sale. Licences were issue d indiscriminately to any company.
leach	Cause a liquid to leach or percolate. Pesticides and fertilizers that leach into rivers.
leak	Be leaked. A report was leak ed to the press.
<u>00Ze</u>	Slowly exude or discharge a viscous fluid. She ooze s a raunchy sex appeal.
percolate	Permeate or penetrate gradually. It will have to be instant coffee there s no time to percolate any.
<u>permeate</u>	Spread throughout (something); pervade. Water permeate s sand easily.
<u>soak</u>	Fill soak or imbue totally. Soak the bandage with disinfectant.
sweat	Get rid of something from the body by exuding sweat. <i>He s not going to have a lot of time to</i> sweat <i>the details.</i>
<u>trickle</u>	Cause (a liquid) to flow in a small stream. A solitary tear trickle d down her cheek.
well	Come up, as of a liquid. <i>Tears well in her eyes.</i>

bethink	Come to think. He bethought himself of the verse from the Book of Proverbs.
bleed	An instance of bleeding. The picture bleed s on three sides.
<u>click</u>	Make a clicking or ticking sound. The key click ed in the lock and the door opened.
cut	A passage cut or dug out as a railway cutting or a new channel made for a river or other waterway. They cut her in public.
<u>emit</u>	Make (a sound. The ozone layer blocks some harmful rays which the sun emit s.



filter	A traffic light signalling a filter arrangement. Many other apps also offer filter s for enhancing photos.
hole	Make a hole or holes in. The dog had dug a hole in the ground.
imbue	Fill soak or imbue totally. His works are invariably imbue d with a sense of calm and serenity.
impregnate	Fertilize (an ovum). Wood which had been impregnate d with preservative.
<u>infiltrate</u>	Enter a group or organization in order to spy on the members. Virtually no water infiltrate s deserts such as the Sahara.
leach	The process of leaching. The nutrient is quickly leach ed away.
leaky	Permitting the unwanted passage of fluids or gases. A leaky defense system.
<u>omnipresent</u>	(of God) present everywhere at the same time. The omnipresent threat of natural disasters.
<u>00Ze</u>	The sluggish flow of a fluid. I picked a fruit and watched the ooze of fig milk from the stem.
penetrable	Capable of being penetrated. <i>The outer membrane is penetrable.</i>
percolate	(of coffee) be prepared in a percolator. <i>He put some coffee on to percolate.</i>
perforate	Perforated. A perforate shell.
permeable	(of a material or membrane) allowing liquids or gases to pass through it. <i>Permeable</i> sandy soils.
<u>permeate</u>	Penetrate mutually or be interlocked. <i>His personality has begun to permeate through the whole organization.</i>
<u>pervade</u>	Spread or diffuse through. A smell of stale cabbage pervade d the air.
pervious	(of a substance) allowing water to pass through; permeable. <i>Pervious</i> rocks.
<u>pierce</u>	Force a way through; penetrate. Light pierce d through the forest.
<u>piercing</u>	(of a feeling) intense, typically in a distressing way. Piercing knifelike pains.



porous	Allowing passage in and out. Compacting the soil to make it less porous .
pushing	The act of applying force in order to move something away. The pushing is good exercise.
sap	A piece of metal covered by leather with a flexible handle; used for hitting people. Her illness had sap ped her of energy and life.
snap	The act of snapping the fingers movement of a finger from the tip to the base of the thumb on the same hand. <i>He could call a snap election.</i>
stick	In field hockey the foul play of raising the stick above the shoulder. A stick of dynamite.
