### Definitions of "Seep" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “seep” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Pass gradually or leak through or as if through small openings.*
- *(of a liquid) flow or leak slowly through porous material or small holes.*



## Synonyms of "Seep" as a verb (20 Words)

- bleed** Get or extort (money or other possessions) from someone.  
*Air can be got rid of by **bleeding** the radiator at the vent.*
- discharge** Go off or discharge.  
*The eyes and nose began to **discharge**.*
- drain** Empty of liquid drain the liquid from.  
*Gradually the tension and stress **drained** away.*
- dribble** Propel.  
*He attempted to **dribble** the ball from the goal area.*
- drip** (of liquid) fall in small drops.  
*His hands were **dripping** with blood.*

<b>escape</b>	Interrupt an operation by means of the escape key. <i>We <b>escaped</b> to our summer house for a few days.</i>
<b>excrete</b>	(of a living organism or cell) separate and expel as waste (a substance, especially a product of metabolism). <i>Excess bicarbonate is <b>excreted</b> by the kidney.</i>
<b>exude</b>	Release (a liquid) in drops or small quantities. <i>Sir Thomas <b>exuded</b> goodwill.</i>
<b>filter</b>	Remove by passing through a filter. <i>You ll be put through to a secretary whose job it is to <b>filter</b> calls.</i>
<b>flow</b>	Fall or flow in a certain way. <i>Their talk and laughter grew louder as the excellent brandy <b>flowed</b>.</i>
<b>issue</b>	Prepare and issue for public distribution or sale. <i>Licences were <b>issued</b> indiscriminately to any company.</i>
<b>leach</b>	Cause a liquid to leach or percolate. <i>Pesticides and fertilizers that <b>leach</b> into rivers.</i>
<b>leak</b>	Be leaked. <i>A report was <b>leaked</b> to the press.</i>
<b>ooze</b>	Slowly exude or discharge a viscous fluid. <i>She <b>oozes</b> a raunchy sex appeal.</i>
<b>percolate</b>	Permeate or penetrate gradually. <i>It will have to be instant coffee there s no time to <b>percolate</b> any.</i>
<b>permeate</b>	Spread throughout (something); pervade. <i>Water <b>permeates</b> sand easily.</i>
<b>soak</b>	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i><b>Soak</b> the bandage with disinfectant.</i>
<b>sweat</b>	Get rid of something from the body by exuding sweat. <i>He s not going to have a lot of time to <b>sweat</b> the details.</i>
<b>trickle</b>	Cause (a liquid) to flow in a small stream. <i>A solitary tear <b>trickled</b> down her cheek.</i>
<b>well</b>	Come up, as of a liquid. <i>Tears <b>well</b> in her eyes.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Seep" as a verb

- *Water began to seep through the soles of his boots.*



## Associations of "Seep" (30 Words)

- bethink** Come to think.  
*He bethought himself of the verse from the Book of Proverbs.*
- bleed** An instance of bleeding.  
*The picture **bleeds** on three sides.*
- click** Make a clicking or ticking sound.  
*The key **clicked** in the lock and the door opened.*
- cut** A passage cut or dug out as a railway cutting or a new channel made for a river or other waterway.  
*They **cut** her in public.*
- emit** Make (a sound).  
*The ozone layer blocks some harmful rays which the sun **emits**.*

<b>filter</b>	A traffic light signalling a filter arrangement. <i>Many other apps also offer <b>filters</b> for enhancing photos.</i>
<b>hole</b>	Make a hole or holes in. <i>The dog had dug a <b>hole</b> in the ground.</i>
<b>imbue</b>	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>His works are invariably <b>imbued</b> with a sense of calm and serenity.</i>
<b>impregnate</b>	Fertilize (an ovum). <i>Wood which had been <b>impregnated</b> with preservative.</i>
<b><u>infiltrate</u></b>	Enter a group or organization in order to spy on the members. <i>Virtually no water <b>infiltrates</b> deserts such as the Sahara.</i>
<b>leach</b>	The process of leaching. <i>The nutrient is quickly <b>leached</b> away.</i>
<b>leaky</b>	Permitting the unwanted passage of fluids or gases. <i>A <b>leaky</b> defense system.</i>
<b><u>omnipresent</u></b>	(of God) present everywhere at the same time. <i>The <b>omnipresent</b> threat of natural disasters.</i>
<b><u>ooze</u></b>	The sluggish flow of a fluid. <i>I picked a fruit and watched the <b>ooze</b> of fig milk from the stem.</i>
<b>penetrable</b>	Capable of being penetrated. <i>The outer membrane is <b>penetrable</b>.</i>
<b>percolate</b>	(of coffee) be prepared in a percolator. <i>He put some coffee on to <b>percolate</b>.</i>
<b>perforate</b>	Perforated. <i>A <b>perforate</b> shell.</i>
<b>permeable</b>	(of a material or membrane) allowing liquids or gases to pass through it. <i><b>Permeable</b> sandy soils.</i>
<b><u>permeate</u></b>	Penetrate mutually or be interlocked. <i>His personality has begun to <b>permeate</b> through the whole organization.</i>
<b><u>pervade</u></b>	Spread or diffuse through. <i>A smell of stale cabbage <b>pervaded</b> the air.</i>
<b>pervious</b>	(of a substance) allowing water to pass through; permeable. <i><b>Pervious</b> rocks.</i>
<b><u>pierce</u></b>	Force a way through; penetrate. <i>Light <b>pierced</b> through the forest.</i>
<b><u>piercing</u></b>	(of a feeling) intense, typically in a distressing way. <i><b>Piercing</b> knifelike pains.</i>

- porous** Allowing passage in and out.  
*Compacting the soil to make it less **porous**.*
- pushing** The act of applying force in order to move something away.  
*The **pushing** is good exercise.*
- sap** A piece of metal covered by leather with a flexible handle; used for hitting people.  
*Her illness had **sapped** her of energy and life.*
- snap** The act of snapping the fingers movement of a finger from the tip to the base of the thumb on the same hand.  
*He could call a **snap** election.*
- stick** In field hockey the foul play of raising the stick above the shoulder.  
*A **stick** of dynamite.*
