Seep as a Verb

Definitions of "Seep" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “seep” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Pass gradually or leak through or as if through small openings.*
- *(of a liquid) flow or leak slowly through porous material or small holes.*



Synonyms of "Seep" as a verb (20 Words)

- bleed** Get or extort (money or other possessions) from someone.
*Air can be got rid of by **bleeding** the radiator at the vent.*
- discharge** Go off or discharge.
*The eyes and nose began to **discharge**.*
- drain** Empty of liquid drain the liquid from.
*Gradually the tension and stress **drained** away.*
- dribble** Propel.
*He attempted to **dribble** the ball from the goal area.*
- drip** (of liquid) fall in small drops.
*His hands were **dripping** with blood.*

escape	Interrupt an operation by means of the escape key. <i>We escaped to our summer house for a few days.</i>
excrete	(of a living organism or cell) separate and expel as waste (a substance, especially a product of metabolism). <i>Excess bicarbonate is excreted by the kidney.</i>
exude	Release (a liquid) in drops or small quantities. <i>Sir Thomas exuded goodwill.</i>
filter	Remove by passing through a filter. <i>You ll be put through to a secretary whose job it is to filter calls.</i>
flow	Fall or flow in a certain way. <i>Their talk and laughter grew louder as the excellent brandy flowed.</i>
issue	Prepare and issue for public distribution or sale. <i>Licences were issued indiscriminately to any company.</i>
leach	Cause a liquid to leach or percolate. <i>Pesticides and fertilizers that leach into rivers.</i>
leak	Be leaked. <i>A report was leaked to the press.</i>
ooze	Slowly exude or discharge a viscous fluid. <i>She oozes a raunchy sex appeal.</i>
percolate	Permeate or penetrate gradually. <i>It will have to be instant coffee there s no time to percolate any.</i>
permeate	Spread throughout (something); pervade. <i>Water permeates sand easily.</i>
soak	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>Soak the bandage with disinfectant.</i>
sweat	Get rid of something from the body by exuding sweat. <i>He s not going to have a lot of time to sweat the details.</i>
trickle	Cause (a liquid) to flow in a small stream. <i>A solitary tear trickled down her cheek.</i>
well	Come up, as of a liquid. <i>Tears well in her eyes.</i>



Usage Examples of "Seep" as a verb

- *Water began to seep through the soles of his boots.*

- bethink** Come to think.
He bethought himself of the verse from the Book of Proverbs.
- bleed** An instance of bleeding.
*The picture **bleeds** on three sides.*
- click** Make a clicking or ticking sound.
*The key **clicked** in the lock and the door opened.*
- cut** A passage cut or dug out as a railway cutting or a new channel made for a river or other waterway.
*They **cut** her in public.*
- emit** Make (a sound).
*The ozone layer blocks some harmful rays which the sun **emits**.*

filter	A traffic light signalling a filter arrangement. <i>Many other apps also offer filters for enhancing photos.</i>
hole	Make a hole or holes in. <i>The dog had dug a hole in the ground.</i>
imbue	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>His works are invariably imbued with a sense of calm and serenity.</i>
impregnate	Fertilize (an ovum). <i>Wood which had been impregnated with preservative.</i>
<u>infiltrate</u>	Enter a group or organization in order to spy on the members. <i>Virtually no water infiltrates deserts such as the Sahara.</i>
leach	The process of leaching. <i>The nutrient is quickly leached away.</i>
leaky	Permitting the unwanted passage of fluids or gases. <i>A leaky defense system.</i>
<u>omnipresent</u>	(of God) present everywhere at the same time. <i>The omnipresent threat of natural disasters.</i>
<u>ooze</u>	The sluggish flow of a fluid. <i>I picked a fruit and watched the ooze of fig milk from the stem.</i>
penetrable	Capable of being penetrated. <i>The outer membrane is penetrable.</i>
percolate	(of coffee) be prepared in a percolator. <i>He put some coffee on to percolate.</i>
perforate	Perforated. <i>A perforate shell.</i>
permeable	(of a material or membrane) allowing liquids or gases to pass through it. <i>Permeable sandy soils.</i>
<u>permeate</u>	Penetrate mutually or be interlocked. <i>His personality has begun to permeate through the whole organization.</i>
<u>pervade</u>	Spread or diffuse through. <i>A smell of stale cabbage pervaded the air.</i>
pervious	(of a substance) allowing water to pass through; permeable. <i>Pervious rocks.</i>
<u>pierce</u>	Force a way through; penetrate. <i>Light pierced through the forest.</i>
<u>piercing</u>	(of a feeling) intense, typically in a distressing way. <i>Piercing knifelike pains.</i>

- porous** Allowing passage in and out.
*Compacting the soil to make it less **porous**.*
- pushing** The act of applying force in order to move something away.
*The **pushing** is good exercise.*
- sap** A piece of metal covered by leather with a flexible handle; used for hitting people.
*Her illness had **sapped** her of energy and life.*
- snap** The act of snapping the fingers movement of a finger from the tip to the base of the thumb on the same hand.
*He could call a **snap** election.*
- stick** In field hockey the foul play of raising the stick above the shoulder.
*A **stick** of dynamite.*
