- click** Make a clicking or ticking sound.
*The key **clicked** in the lock and the door opened.*
- cut** Used of grass or vegetation cut down with a hand implement or machine.
***Cut** a ticket.*

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| emit | Produce and discharge (something, especially gas or radiation). <i>The ozone layer blocks some harmful rays which the sun emits.</i> |
| filter | Remove by passing through a filter. <i>An oil filter.</i> |
| hole | Hit the ball into a hole. <i>She is missed terribly and her death has left a hole in all our lives.</i> |
| imbue | Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>His works are invariably imbued with a sense of calm and serenity.</i> |
| impregnate | Fertilize and cause to grow. <i>Wood which had been impregnated with preservative.</i> |
| infiltrate | An infiltrating substance or a number of infiltrating cells. <i>The student organization was infiltrated by a traitor.</i> |
| leach | Cause a liquid to leach or percolate. <i>Pesticides and fertilizers that leach into rivers.</i> |
| leaky | Used informally; unable to retain urine. <i>A leaky roof.</i> |
| omnipresent | Widely or constantly encountered; widespread. <i>The omnipresent threat of natural disasters.</i> |
| ooze | Give a powerful impression of (a quality). <i>Honey oozed out of the comb.</i> |
| penetrable | Possible to understand; understandable. <i>The outer membrane is penetrable.</i> |
| percolate | Gain or regain energy. <i>It will have to be instant coffee there s no time to percolate any.</i> |
| perforate | Perforated. <i>Perforate the sheets of paper.</i> |
| permeable | (of a material or membrane) allowing liquids or gases to pass through it. <i>A frog s skin is permeable to water.</i> |
| permeate | Pass through. <i>The aroma of soup permeated the air.</i> |
| pervade | Spread or diffuse through. <i>A smell of stale cabbage pervaded the air.</i> |
| pervious | Admitting of passage or entrance. <i>Pervious rocks.</i> |
| pierce | Move or affect (a person's emotions or bodily feelings) deeply or sharply. <i>The cold pierced her bones.</i> |

- piercing** (of a sound) extremely high or loud.
*She let out a **piercing** scream.*
- porous** Able to absorb fluids.
*The partly **porous** walls of our digestive system.*
- pushing** The act of applying force in order to move something away.
*The **pushing** is good exercise.*
- sap** A piece of metal covered by leather with a flexible handle; used for hitting people.
*Her illness had **sapped** her of energy and life.*
- snap** Take a snapshot of.
*He can hear the **snap** of a twig.*
- stick** Stick to firmly.
*A **stick** of dynamite.*
