<b>discover</b>	See for the first time make a discovery. <i>The courage to <b>discover</b> the truth and possibly be disappointed.</i>
<b>encounter</b>	Be beset by. <i>We have <b>encountered</b> one small problem.</i>
<b>ensure</b>	Be careful or certain to do something; make certain of something. <i>Legislation to <b>ensure</b> equal opportunities for all.</i>

<b>discovered</b>	Discovered or determined by scientific observation. <i><b>Discovered</b> differences in achievement.</i>
<b>experimenter</b>	A research worker who conducts experiments. <i>Each participant was tested by a trained <b>experimenter</b>.</i>
<b>eye</b>	The visual or light detecting organ of many invertebrate animals that corresponds to the eye of humans and vertebrate animals. <i>Delicate flowers of light blue colour with white or yellow <b>eyes</b>.</i>
<b>find</b>	Come upon after searching find the location of something that was missed or lost. <i><b>Find</b> the product of two numbers.</i>
<b>look</b>	Of a building or room have an outlook in a specified direction. <i>His camera does his <b>looking</b> for him.</i>
<b>lookout</b>	An elevated post affording a wide view. <i>A fortified <b>lookout</b> tower.</i>
<b>macroscopic</b>	Visible to the naked eye; using the naked eye.
<b>microscopy</b>	Research with the use of microscopes.
<b>observant</b>	A member of a branch of the Franciscan order that followed a strict rule. <i>An <b>observant</b> Jew.</i>
<b>observation</b>	The act of taking the altitude of the sun or another celestial body to find a latitude or longitude. <i>Units kept enemy forces under <b>observation</b> for days.</i>
<b>observatory</b>	A room or building housing an astronomical telescope or other scientific equipment for the study of natural phenomena.
<b>observe</b>	Observe with care or pay close attention to. <i>Please <b>observe</b> the reaction of these two chemicals.</i>
<b>observer</b>	A person who follows events closely and comments publicly on them. <i>Some <b>observers</b> expect interest rates to rise.</i>
<b>observing</b>	Quick to notice; showing quick and keen perception.

<b>optical</b>	Relating to the science of optics. <i>The optic or <b>optical</b> axis of the eye.</i>
<b>percipient</b>	(especially in philosophy or with reference to psychic phenomena) a person who is able to perceive things. <i>A <b>percipient</b> author.</i>
<b>phantasm</b>	A ghostly appearing figure. <i>The cart seemed to glide like a terrible <b>phantasm</b>.</i>
<b>sight</b>	Take aim by looking through the sights of a gun or other device. <i>Joseph lost his <b>sight</b> as a baby.</i>
<b>spectacle</b>	A blunder that makes you look ridiculous used in the phrase make a spectacle of yourself. <i>The acrobatic feats make a good <b>spectacle</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">spectator</a></u>	A close observer; someone who looks at something (such as an exhibition of some kind). <i>The <b>spectators</b> applauded the performance.</i>
<b>telescope</b>	(with reference to an object made of concentric tubular parts) slide or cause to slide into itself, so that it becomes smaller. <i>In the accident the cars <b>telescoped</b>.</i>
<b>telescopic</b>	Having parts that slide one within another. <i>A bright star with a <b>telescopic</b> companion.</i>
<b>viewer</b>	A device for looking at film transparencies or similar photographic images. <i>A slide <b>viewer</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">visibility</a></u>	Degree of exposure to public notice. <i>That candidate does not have sufficient <b>visibility</b> to win an election.</i>

<b>witness</b>	Be a witness to. <i>The clerk <b>witnessed</b> her signature.</i>
