- *Operating at or responding to a particular frequency.*
- *Tending to select; characterized by careful choice.*
- *Tending to select; characterized by careful choice- John Mason Brown.*
- *(of a person) tending to choose carefully.*
- *Characterized by very careful or fastidious selection.*
- *(of a process or agent) affecting some things and not others.*
- *Relating to or involving the selection of the most suitable or best qualified.*



Synonyms of "Selective" as an adjective (8 Words)

- critical** Relating to or denoting a point of transition from one state to another.
*A **critical** edition of a Bach sonata.*
- demanding** Requiring more than usually expected or thought due; especially great patience and effort and skill.
*He was a **demanding** baby and rarely slept through the night.*
- discerning** Quick to understand- Nathaniel Hawthorne.
***Discerning** taste.*
- discriminating** Showing or indicating careful judgment and discernment especially in matters of taste.
*He became a **discriminating** collector and patron of the arts.*
- discriminatory** Capable of making fine distinctions.
*A **discriminatory** tax.*

- exacting** Requiring precise accuracy.
*Certain highly specialized xerophytes are extremely **exacting** in their requirements.*
- hard to please** Transmitted directly from a pointed light source.
- particular** First and most important.
*Has a **particular** preference for Chinese art.*



Usage Examples of "Selective" as an adjective

- *Modern pesticides are more selective in effect.*
- *The school was very selective in its admissions.*
- *He is very selective in his reading.*
- *The cow is the result of generations of selective breeding.*
- *A new marine VHF radio with digital selective calling.*
- *An exceptionally quick and selective reader.*

*I ll **accept** the charges.*
- access** Reach or gain access to.
*Information can be **accessed** from several files and displayed at the same time.*
- adjudicate** Make a formal judgement on a disputed matter.
*The Committee **adjudicates** on all betting disputes.*
- admission** The fee charged for admission.
*The country s **admission** to the UN.*
- alternative** (of one or more things) available as another possibility or choice.
***Alternative** possibilities were neutrality or war.*
- arbitrary** (of power or a ruling body) unrestrained and autocratic in the use of authority.
*Of **arbitrary** size and shape.*
- choice** One of a number of things from which only one can be chosen.
*This disk drive is the perfect **choice** for your computer.*

choose	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>I always choose the fish over the meat courses in this restaurant.</i>
chosen	Having been selected as the best or most appropriate. <i>She was Mama s chosen.</i>
decide	Cause to decide. <i>We finally decided after lengthy deliberations.</i>
decision	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. <i>The information was used as the basis for decision.</i>
elect	Elected but not yet installed in office. <i>The elect group of saints which was predestined for heaven.</i>
entree	An entrance, especially a theatrical entrance onto a stage or as if onto a stage. <i>She made a graceful entree into the ballroom.</i>
exclusive	Catering for or available to only a few, select customers; high class and expensive. <i>The problem isn t exclusive to Dublin.</i>
individually	One by one; singly; separately. <i>Taken individually the rooms were in fact square.</i>
opt	Select as an alternative over another. <i>She opted for the job on the East coast.</i>
option	Buy or sell an option on. <i>Choose the cheapest options for supplying energy.</i>
optional	Available to be chosen but not obligatory. <i>A wide range of optional excursions is offered.</i>
pick	Hit lightly with a picking motion. <i>He was picked for the England squad.</i>
predetermine	Cause to be biased. <i>Closed questions almost predetermine the response given.</i>
preferential	Of or involving preference or partiality; constituting a favour or privilege. <i>A preferential shop gives priority or advantage to union members in hiring or promoting.</i>
sampling	A sample. <i>Five random samplings collected from wild cats.</i>
scarify	Cut and remove debris from (a lawn) with a scarifier. <i>Scarify seeds.</i>

select	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>She selected a pair of shoes from among the dozen the salesgirl had shown her.</i>
selected	Chosen in preference to another.
selection	A plot of land acquired by selection. <i>The store carried a large selection of shoes.</i>
selectively	In a way that involves the selection of only particular people or things. <i>He accused state officials of selectively enforcing the law.</i>
singly	One by one; one at a time. <i>He talked to the players singly and in groups.</i>
<u>specially</u>	For a special purpose. <i>An especially or specially cautious approach to the danger.</i>
<u>unilateral</u>	Involving only one part or side. <i>Unilateral cerebral lesions.</i>
