Associations of "Self doubt" (30 Words)

conceit	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>He could always come up with some inspired off the wall conceit.</i>
<u>cynical</u>	Believing the worst of human nature and motives; having a sneering disbelief in e.g. selflessness of others. <i>A cynical manipulation of public opinion.</i>
<u>distrust</u>	The feeling that someone or something cannot be relied upon. <i>Speculation remained that the Army distrusted the peace process.</i>
doubtful	Feeling uncertain about something. <i>It is doubtful whether these schemes have any lasting effect.</i>
dubiety	The state or quality of being doubtful; uncertainty. <i>His enemies made much of the dubiety of his paternity.</i>
<u>dubious</u>	Not to be relied upon; suspect. <i>He has a dubious record indeed.</i>
<u>ego</u>	A person's sense of self-esteem or self-importance. <i>He needed a boost to his ego.</i>
egocentrism	Concern for your own interests and welfare.
egoism	The theory that the pursuit of your own welfare in the basis of morality.
egoist	A self-centered person with little regard for others.
egotism	An exaggerated opinion of your own importance. <i>In his arrogance and egotism he underestimated Gill.</i>
egotist	A conceited and self-centered person. <i>He is a self absorbed egotist.</i>
greed	Intense and selfish desire for something, especially wealth, power, or food. <i>The colonists greed for African land.</i>
incredulity	Doubt about the truth of something. <i>He stared down the street in incredulity.</i>

<u>incredulous</u>	Not disposed or willing to believe; unbelieving. <i>An incredulous gasp.</i>
individualist	A person who pursues independent thought or action. <i>An individualistic way of dressing.</i>
<u>leery</u>	Cautious or wary due to realistic suspicions. <i>A city leery of gang violence.</i>
misgiving	Uneasiness about the fitness of an action. <i>We have misgivings about the way the campaign is being run.</i>
mistrust	The trait of not trusting others. <i>The public mistrust of government.</i>
narcissism	Self-centredness arising from failure to distinguish the self from external objects, either in very young babies or as a feature of mental disorder.
<u>pride</u>	Be especially proud of (a particular quality or skill). <i>In the pride of youth.</i>
sceptical	Marked by or given to doubt. <i>The public were deeply sceptical about some of the proposals.</i>
selfish	Concerned chiefly or only with yourself and your advantage to the exclusion of others. <i>I joined them for selfish reasons.</i>
selfishness	The quality or state of being selfish; lack of consideration for other people. <i>An act of pure selfishness.</i>
skeptic	Someone who habitually doubts accepted beliefs.
superego	That part of the unconscious mind that acts as a conscience. <i>The father is the model for the superego.</i>
<u>suspect</u>	Doubt the genuineness or truth of. <i>The police have arrested a suspect.</i>
<u>suspicious</u>	Openly distrustful and unwilling to confide. <i>They are not treating the fire as suspicious.</i>
vainglorious	Excessively proud of oneself or one's achievements; overly vain. <i>This vainglorious boast of personal infallibility.</i>
<u>vanity</u>	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited; false pride. <i>The vanity of human wishes.</i>
