## Associations of "Self worth" (30 Words)

<b>arrogance</b>	Overbearing pride evidenced by a superior manner toward inferiors. <i>The <b>arrogance</b> of this man is astounding.</i>
<b>boast</b>	Talk with excessive pride and self-satisfaction about one’s achievements, possessions, or abilities. <i>The hotel <b>boasts</b> high standards of comfort.</i>
<b>bragging</b>	Exhibiting self-importance. <i>We became involved in a lively <b>bragging</b> session.</i>
<b><u>centered</u></b>	Being or placed in the center.
<b>conceit</b>	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>He was puffed up with <b>conceit</b>.</i>
<b><u>ego</u></b>	(psychoanalysis) the conscious mind. <i>He needed a boost to his <b>ego</b>.</i>
<b><u>egocentric</u></b>	An egocentric person. <i><b>Egocentric</b> loners with an overinflated sense of self worth.</i>
<b>egocentrism</b>	Concern for your own interests and welfare.
<b>egoism</b>	The theory that the pursuit of your own welfare in the basis of morality.
<b>egoist</b>	A conceited and self-centered person.
<b>egotism</b>	An exaggerated opinion of your own importance. <i>In his arrogance and <b>egotism</b> he underestimated Gill.</i>
<b>egotist</b>	A person who is excessively conceited or absorbed in themselves; a self-seeker. <i>He is a self absorbed <b>egotist</b>.</i>
<b>esprit</b>	Liveliness of mind or spirit.
<b>esteem</b>	The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>I should <b>esteem</b> it a favour if you could speak to them.</i>
<b>greed</b>	Intense and selfish desire for something, especially wealth, power, or food. <i>The colonists <b>greed</b> for African land.</i>

<b>individualism</b>	The habit or principle of being independent and self-reliant. <i>Encouragement has been given to <b>individualism</b> free enterprise and the pursuit of profit.</i>
<b>individualist</b>	A self-centred or egotistical person. <i><b>Individualist</b> capitalism.</i>
<b>individualistic</b>	Marked by or expressing individuality; unconventional. <i>An <b>individualistic</b> way of dressing.</i>
<b>introspective</b>	Characterized by or given to introspection. <i>He grew withdrawn and <b>introspective</b>.</i>
<b>narcissism</b>	Self-centredness arising from failure to distinguish the self from external objects, either in very young babies or as a feature of mental disorder.
<b>pomposity</b>	The quality of being pompous; self-importance. <i>His reputation for arrogance and <b>pomposity</b>.</i>
<b>pride</b>	Consciousness of one's own dignity. <i>The team was bursting with <b>pride</b> after recording a sensational victory.</i>
<b>proudly</b>	With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated. <i>Ray watched <b>proudly</b> from the sidelines as his son won the singles title.</i>
<b>sanctimonious</b>	Making a show of being morally superior to other people. <i>What happened to all the <b>sanctimonious</b> talk about putting his family first.</i>
<b>selfish</b>	Concerned chiefly or only with yourself and your advantage to the exclusion of others- Maria Weston Chapman. <i>I joined them for <b>selfish</b> reasons.</i>
<b>selfishness</b>	Stinginess resulting from a concern for your own welfare and a disregard of others. <i>An act of pure <b>selfishness</b>.</i>
<b>smug</b>	Marked by excessive complacency or self-satisfaction. <i>A <b>smug</b> glow of self congratulation.</i>
<b>superego</b>	The part of a person's mind that acts as a self-critical conscience, reflecting social standards learned from parents and teachers. <i>The father is the model for the <b>superego</b>.</i>
<b>vainglorious</b>	Feeling self-importance. <i>This <b>vainglorious</b> boast of personal infallibility.</i>
<b>vanity</b>	Feelings of excessive pride. <i>The <b>vanity</b> of human wishes.</i>
