## **Selfless as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Selfless" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “selfless” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Showing unselfish concern for the welfare of others.*
- *Concerned more with the needs and wishes of others than with one's own; unselfish.*



## Synonyms of "Selfless" as an adjective (4 Words)

<b>altruistic</b>	Showing a disinterested and selfless concern for the well-being of others; unselfish. <i>It was an entirely <b>altruistic</b> act.</i>
<b>self-denying</b>	Willing to deprive yourself.
<b>self-sacrificing</b>	Willing to deprive yourself.
<b><u>unselfish</u></b>	Disregarding your own advantages and welfare over those of others. <i><b>Unselfish</b> devotion.</i>

## Associations of "Selfless" (30 Words)

- alms** (in historical contexts) money or food given to poor people.  
*The riders stopped to distribute **alms**.*
- altruistic** Showing a disinterested and selfless concern for the well-being of others; unselfish.  
*I question how **altruistic** his motives were.*
- benefactor** A person who gives money or other help to a person or cause.  
*A low interest loan from a **benefactor** allowed them to build a floor for the exhibition hall.*
- beneficent** Doing or producing good.  
*A **beneficent** democracy.*

<b>benevolent</b>	(of an organization) serving a charitable rather than a profit-making purpose. A <b>benevolent</b> contributor.
<b>benignity</b>	The quality of being kind and gentle. <i>His air of <b>benignity</b>.</i>
<b>bounteous</b>	Given or giving freely. <i>The <b>bounteous</b> goodness of God.</i>
<b>charitable</b>	Relating to or characterized by charity. <b>Charitable</b> to the poor.
<b>considerate</b>	Careful not to inconvenience or harm others. <i>Friends <b>considerate</b> enough to leave us alone.</i>
<b>dedication</b>	A short message (as in a book or musical work or on a photograph) dedicating it to someone or something. <i>A faintly engraved inscription or <b>dedication</b>.</i>
<b>devotion</b>	Love, loyalty, or enthusiasm for a person or activity. <i>His <b>devotion</b> to duty never wavered.</i>
<b>donor</b>	An impurity atom in a semiconductor which contributes a conducting electron to the material. <i>A blood <b>donor</b>.</i>
<b>eleemosynary</b>	Generous in assistance to the poor. <b>Eleemosynary</b> relief.
<b>generosity</b>	Acting generously. <i>Diners certainly cannot complain about the <b>generosity</b> of portions.</i>
<b>generous</b>	Not petty in character and mind. <i>A <b>generous</b> assessment of his work.</i>
<b>giver</b>	A person who gives something. <i>A <b>giver</b> of advice.</i>
<b>humane</b>	(of a branch of learning) intended to have a civilizing effect on people. <i>The <b>humane</b> education of literary study.</i>
<b>kind</b>	A category of things distinguished by some common characteristic or quality. <b>Kind</b> to sick patients.
<b>leniency</b>	Mercifulness as a consequence of being lenient or tolerant. <i>The court could show <b>leniency</b>.</i>
<b>love</b>	Be enamored or in love with. <i>Children need a lot of <b>love</b>.</i>

<b>magnanimous</b>	Generous and understanding and tolerant. <i>She should be <b>magnanimous</b> in victory.</i>
<b>mercy</b>	Leniency and compassion shown toward offenders by a person or agency charged with administering justice. <i>He threw himself on the <b>mercy</b> of the court.</i>
<b>mildness</b>	Lack of severity. <i>The <b>mildness</b> of his manner and his desire to please everyone.</i>
<b>munificent</b>	Characterized by or displaying great generosity. <i>A <b>munificent</b> bequest.</i>
<b>philanthropic</b>	(of a person or organization) seeking to promote the welfare of others; generous and benevolent. <i>They receive financial support from <b>philanthropic</b> bodies.</i>
<b>tolerant</b>	Tolerant and forgiving under provocation. <i>These fish are quite <b>tolerant</b> as long as extremes of pH are avoided.</i>
<b>undying</b>	(especially of an emotion) lasting forever. <i>His <b>undying</b> fame.</i>
<b>unselfish</b>	Willing to put the needs or wishes of others before one's own. <i><b>Unselfish</b> devotion.</i>
<b>unstinting</b>	Given or giving without restraint; unsparing. <i>Called for <b>unstinting</b> aid to Britain.</i>
<b>wholehearted</b>	Showing or characterized by complete sincerity and commitment. <i>Gave <b>wholehearted</b> support to her candidacy.</i>
