## Associations of "Sensibilities" (30 Words)

<b>affective</b>	Denoting or relating to mental disorders in which disturbance of mood is the primary symptom. <i>Affective disorders.</i>
<b>awareness</b>	Concern about and well-informed interest in a particular situation or development. <i>There is a lack of <b>awareness</b> of the risks.</i>
<b>bathetic</b>	Effusively or insincerely emotional. <i>A <b>bathetic</b> novel.</i>
<b><u>cathartic</u></b>	Emotionally purging (of e.g. art). <i>Crying is a <b>cathartic</b> release.</i>
<b><u>cognition</u></b>	A perception sensation idea or intuition resulting from the process of cognition.

<b>emotion</b>	Instinctive or intuitive feeling as distinguished from reasoning or knowledge. <i>Responses have to be based on historical insight not simply on <b>emotion</b>.</i>
<b>emotional</b>	Arousing or characterized by intense feeling. <i>His behavior was highly <b>emotional</b>.</i>
<b>empathy</b>	The ability to understand and share the feelings of another.
<b>feeling</b>	An attitude or opinion. <i>A <b>feeling</b> of joy.</i>
<b>maladjustment</b>	Failure to cope with the demands of a normal social environment. <i>Economic <b>maladjustment</b> left the currency hopelessly vulnerable.</i>
<b>maudlin</b>	Effusively or insincerely emotional. <i>A <b>maudlin</b> jukebox tune.</i>
<b>mawkish</b>	Having a faint sickly flavour. <i>A <b>mawkish</b> ode to parenthood.</i>
<b>melodrama</b>	The genre of melodrama. <i>What little is known of his early life is cloaked in <b>melodrama</b>.</i>
<b>mental</b>	Of or relating to the chin or median part of the lower jaw. <i><b>Mental</b> suffering.</i>
<b>mind</b>	Keep in mind. <i>He reads to improve his <b>mind</b>.</i>
<b>mood</b>	(especially of music) inducing or suggestive of a particular feeling or state of mind. <i>He was obviously in a <b>mood</b>.</i>
<b>moody</b>	Giving an impression of melancholy or mystery. <i>Grainy film which gives a soft <b>moody</b> effect.</i>
<b>pathos</b>	A quality that evokes pity or sadness. <i>The film captured all the <b>pathos</b> of their situation.</i>
<b>prosody</b>	Prosody a system of versification. <i>The translator is not obliged to reproduce the <b>prosody</b> of the original.</i>
<b>psychological</b>	Of, affecting, or arising in the mind; related to the mental and emotional state of a person. <i><b>Psychological</b> research.</i>
<b>psychologist</b>	A scientist trained in psychology. <i>A sports <b>psychologist</b>.</i>
<b>psychology</b>	The mental factors governing a situation or activity. <i>The <b>psychology</b> of interpersonal relationships.</i>

<b>sensitiveness</b>	The ability to respond to affective changes in your interpersonal environment. <i>The <b>sensitiveness</b> of Mimosa leaves does not depend on a change of growth.</i>
<u><a href="#">sentiment</a></u>	Tender, romantic, or nostalgic feeling or emotion. <i>I agree with your <b>sentiments</b> regarding the road bridge.</i>
<u><a href="#">sentimental</a></u>	Given to or marked by sentiment or sentimentality. <i>A <b>sentimental</b> ballad.</i>
<b>susceptibility</b>	The ratio of magnetization produced in a material to the magnetizing force. <i>Lack of exercise increases <b>susceptibility</b> to disease.</i>
<b>thought</b>	Careful consideration or attention. <i>Darwinian <b>thought</b>.</i>
<b>touched</b>	Slightly mad; crazy. <i>Very <b>touched</b> by the stranger's kindness.</i>
<u><a href="#">transference</a></u>	The redirection to a substitute usually a therapist of emotions that were originally felt in childhood in a phase of analysis called transference neurosis. <i>Therapy is aided by the patient's <b>transference</b> to the analyst as mother.</i>
<b>unsentimental</b>	Facing facts or difficulties realistically and with determination. <i>The speeches were short and <b>unsentimental</b>.</i>
