<b>personal</b>	Concerning or affecting a particular person or his or her private life and personality. <i>He rejected the notion of a <b>personal</b> God.</i>
<u>private</u>	Concerning things deeply private and personal. <i><b>Private</b> lessons.</i>
<b>privileged</b>	Having been granted a special honour. <i>In the nineteenth century only a <b>privileged</b> few had the vote.</i>
<b>quick to respond to</b>	Accomplished rapidly and without delay.
<b>quiet</b>	(of the sun) characterized by a low level of surface phenomena, such as sunspots. <i>The street below was <b>quiet</b> little traffic braving the snow.</i>
<b>raw</b>	Brutally unfair or harsh. <i>There were a number of errors in the <b>raw</b> data.</i>
<b>reactive to</b>	Reacting to a stimulus.
<b>responsive to</b>	Readily reacting or replying to people or events or stimuli; showing emotion.
<b>sensible</b>	Showing reason or sound judgment. <i>The <b>sensible</b> universe.</i>
<b>sentient of</b>	Consciously perceiving- W.A.White.
<b>sore</b>	(of a part of one's body) painful or aching. <i>I didn't even know they were <b>sore</b> at us.</i>
<u>subtle</u>	(of a mixture or effect) delicately complex and understated. <i>He tried a more <b>subtle</b> approach.</i>

Showing skill and sensitivity in dealing with people.  
*A **tactful** remark eased her embarrassment.*

**tender**

Hurting.  
***Tender** loving care.*

**thin-skinned**

Quick to take offense.

**thoughtful**

Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention.  
*How very **thoughtful** of you.*

**touchy**

Difficult to handle; requiring great tact.  
*She s a little **touchy** about her age.*

<b>considerate</b>	Showing careful thought. <i>Friends <b>considerate</b> enough to leave us alone.</i>
<b>contemplative</b>	A person devoted to the contemplative life. <i>She regarded me with a <b>contemplative</b> eye.</i>
<b>dedicated</b>	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high purpose. <i>A chapel <b>dedicated</b> to the dead of World War II.</i>

<b>respondent</b>	The codefendant especially in a divorce proceeding who is accused of adultery with the corespondent. <i>The <b>respondent</b> defendant.</i>
<u><b>responsive</b></u>	(of a section of liturgy) using responses. <i>Children are often the quickest and most <b>responsive</b> members of the audience.</i>
<b>responsiveness</b>	Responsive to stimulation. <i>The <b>responsiveness</b> of the vehicle.</i>
<u><b>susceptible</b></u>	(often followed by `of' or `to') yielding readily to or capable of. <i>The problem is not <b>susceptible</b> of a simple solution.</i>
<b>thoughtful</b>	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>Her work is <b>thoughtful</b> and provocative.</i>
<b>touched</b>	Being excited or provoked to the expression of an emotion. <i>Very <b>touched</b> by the stranger s kindness.</i>
<b>touchy</b>	(of an issue or situation) requiring careful handling; delicate. <i>She s a little <b>touchy</b> about her age.</i>
<u><b>unstable</b></u>	Likely to give way; not stable. <i>Everything was <b>unstable</b> following the coup.</i>
<u><b>vulnerable</b></u>	Capable of being wounded or hurt. <i>An argument <b>vulnerable</b> to refutation.</i>
