- *Relating to sensation or the physical senses; transmitted or perceived by the senses.*

aesthetic	Relating to or dealing with the subject of aesthetics. <i>Aesthetic feeling.</i>
centripetal	Tending to unify. <i>Centripetal force.</i>
gratifying	Giving pleasure or satisfaction. <i>Found her praise gratifying.</i>
luxurious	Rich and superior in quality. <i>Enjoyed a luxurious suite with a crystal chandelier and thick oriental rugs.</i>
pleasurable	Pleasing; enjoyable. <i>Pleasurable activities.</i>
receptive	Able to absorb liquid (not repellent). <i>Only the dominant male would have had access to the receptive female.</i>
rich	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>A rich gas mixture.</i>
sensational	Very good indeed; very impressive or attractive. <i>You look sensational.</i>
sensorial	Involving or derived from the senses. <i>Sensorial stimulation.</i>
sumptuous	Ostentatiously rich and superior in quality. <i>The banquet was a sumptuous luxurious meal.</i>

ambrosial	Worthy of the gods. <i>Ambrosial food.</i>
<u>aroma</u>	A subtle, pervasive quality or atmosphere. <i>The tantalizing aroma of fresh coffee.</i>
<u>aromatic</u>	An aromatic compound. <i>A massage with aromatic oils.</i>
cerebrum	The principal and most anterior part of the brain in vertebrates, located in the front area of the skull and consisting of two hemispheres, left and right, separated by a fissure. It is responsible for the integration of complex sensory and neural functions and the initiation and coordination of voluntary activity in the body.
<u>eureka</u>	An alloy of copper and nickel with high electrical resistance and a low temperature coefficient; used as resistance wire.
feel	Have a feeling or perception about oneself in reaction to someone's behavior or attitude. <i>The girls hated it when he tried to sneak a feel.</i>
<u>fragrance</u>	A distinctive odor that is pleasant. <i>Our fine selection of classic fragrances for men and women.</i>
fragrant	Pleasant-smelling. <i>She gathered the fragrant blooms.</i>
gustatory	Concerned with tasting or the sense of taste. <i>Gustatory delights.</i>
musky	Resembling the smell of musk.
<u>nerve</u>	Any bundle of nerve fibers running to various organs and tissues of the body. <i>He had the nerve to insult my cooking.</i>
nerves	Control of your emotions. <i>This kind of tension is not good for my nerves.</i>
<u>odor</u>	Any property detected by the olfactory system.
odoriferous	Having or giving off a smell, especially an unpleasant one. <i>An odoriferous pile of fish.</i>
odorous	Having a natural fragrance. <i>Fresh odorous bread.</i>
olfaction	The faculty that enables us to distinguish scents.
olfactory	Of or relating to olfaction. <i>The olfactory organs.</i>

<u>perceive</u>	Become aware or conscious of (something); come to realize or understand. <i>He perceived the faintest of flushes creeping up her neck.</i>
perception	Knowledge gained by perceiving. <i>Luther had a new perception of the Bible.</i>
perceptual	Of or relating to the act of perceiving. <i>A patient with perceptual problems who cannot judge distances.</i>
<u>perfume</u>	Impregnate with perfume or a sweet smelling substance. <i>The cream is perfumed with rosemary and iris extracts.</i>
recognize	Show official appreciation of; reward formally. <i>These qualifications are recognized by the Department of Education.</i>
<u>scent</u>	Catch the scent of get wind of. <i>A glass of tea scented with a local herb.</i>
sensate	Perceiving or perceived by the senses. <i>Sensate creatures.</i>
sense	Become aware of not through the senses but instinctively. <i>A good sense of timing.</i>
smell	Smell bad. <i>I smell trouble.</i>
synapse	The junction between two neurons (axon-to-dendrite) or between a neuron and a muscle. <i>Nerve impulses cross a synapse through the action of neurotransmitters.</i>
taste	The sensation that results when taste buds in the tongue and throat convey information about the chemical composition of a soluble stimulus. <i>This pudding is too sweet for my taste.</i>
<u>visceral</u>	Obtained through intuition rather than from reasoning or observation. <i>The voters visceral fear of change.</i>
<u>visual</u>	Visible. <i>Visual navigation.</i>
