cognitive	Of or being or relating to or involving cognition. <i>The cognitive processes involved in reading.</i>
cognizance	Having knowledge of. <i>The Renaissance cognizance of Greece was limited.</i>
cognizant	(sometimes followed by `of') having or showing knowledge or understanding or realization or perception. <i>Statesmen must be cognizant of the political boundaries within which they work.</i>
conscious	Intentionally conceived. <i>We are conscious of the extent of the problem.</i>

consciously	In a deliberate and intentional way. <i>She consciously chose to ignore him.</i>
<u>consciousness</u>	Having knowledge of. <i>His sudden consciousness of the problem he faced.</i>
informed	Having or showing knowledge of a subject or situation. <i>The informed customer.</i>
know	Have knowledge or information concerning. <i>I want to know who is winning the game.</i>
knowable	Capable of being known. <i>The full extent of the damage isn't knowable in advance.</i>
knowledge	Facts, information, and skills acquired through experience or education; the theoretical or practical understanding of a subject. <i>He denied all knowledge of the incidents.</i>
perceivable	Capable of being apprehended or understood. <i>Perceivable through the mist.</i>
perception	The way in which something is regarded, understood, or interpreted. <i>A man admired for the depth of his perception.</i>
recognizance	(law) a security entered into before a court with a condition to perform some act required by law; on failure to perform that act a sum is forfeited. <i>He was released on his own recognizance of 30 000.</i>
recognize	(of a computer or other machine) automatically identify and respond correctly to (a sound, printed character, etc). <i>Julia hardly recognized Jill when they met.</i>
savvy	Know or understand. <i>Bob is a savvy veteran who knows all the tricks.</i>
semiconscious	Partially conscious; not completely aware of sensations.
sensate	Perceiving or perceived by the senses. <i>The sensate world.</i>
thinking	Endowed with the capacity to reason. <i>Thinking always made him frown.</i>
understandable	To be expected; natural, reasonable, or forgivable. <i>It is understandable that mistakes occur sometimes.</i>
wakefulness	The process of paying close and continuous attention. <i>Consciousness during wakefulness in a sane person is pretty well ordered and familiar.</i>

waken Stop sleeping.
*She knew he would **waken** in an hour or so.*

waking The state of remaining awake.
*He hangs between sleeping and **waking**.*
