## Sentiment as a Noun

### Definitions of "Sentiment" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “sentiment” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Exaggerated and self-indulgent feelings of tenderness, sadness, or nostalgia.*
- *A view or opinion that is held or expressed.*
- *The expression of a view or desire especially as formulated for a toast.*
- *Tender, romantic, or nostalgic feeling or emotion.*
- *A feeling or emotion.*
- *General feeling or opinion.*
- *A personal belief or judgment that is not founded on proof or certainty.*



## Synonyms of "Sentiment" as a noun (15 Words)

<b>attitude</b>	A position in which one leg is lifted behind with the knee bent at right angles and turned out, and the corresponding arm is raised above the head, the other extended to the side. <i>She snapped her fingers with <b>attitude</b>.</i>
<b>belief</b>	A religious conviction. <i>Christian <b>beliefs</b>.</i>
<b>emotion</b>	Any strong feeling. <i>She was attempting to control her <b>emotions</b>.</i>
<b>emotionalism</b>	Emotional nature or quality.
<b>feeling</b>	An intuitive understanding of something. <i>He laughed to conceal his true <b>feelings</b>.</i>
<b>idea</b>	(in Kantian thought) a concept of pure reason, not empirically based in experience. <i>The accompanist picked up the <b>idea</b> and elaborated it.</i>
<b>mawkishness</b>	Insincere pathos.
<b>opinion</b>	The beliefs or views of a group or majority of people. <i>His <b>opinions</b> appeared frequently on the editorial page.</i>
<b>persuasion</b>	The action or process of persuading someone or of being persuaded to do or believe something. <i>Monica needed plenty of <b>persuasion</b> before she actually left.</i>
<b>point of view</b>	One percent of the total principal of a loan; it is paid at the time the loan is made and is independent of the interest on the loan.
<b>sentimentalism</b>	Excessively sentimental behaviour, writing, or speech. <i>The author blends realism with surrealism journalism with <b>sentimentalism</b>.</i>
<b>sentimentality</b>	Falsely emotional in a maudlin way. <i>There are passages which verge on <b>sentimentality</b>.</i>
<b>thought</b>	One's mind or attention. <i>I asked him if he had any <b>thoughts</b> on how it had happened.</i>
<b>view</b>	Purpose the phrase with a view to means with the intention of or for the purpose of. <i>They were soon out of <b>view</b>.</i>
<b>way of thinking</b>	A course of conduct.



## Usage Examples of "Sentiment" as a noun

- *Public sentiment was on the side of reform.*
- *I agree with your sentiments regarding the road bridge.*
- *An intense sentiment of horror.*
- *Many of the appeals rely on treacly sentiment.*





## Associations of "Sentiment" (30 Words)

<b>affective</b>	Characterized by emotion. <i><b>Affective</b> disorders.</i>
<b><u>amok</u></b>	Wildly; without self-control.
<b>bathetic</b>	Producing an unintentional effect of anticlimax. <i>The movie manages to be poignant without becoming <b>bathetic</b>.</i>
<b>bullish</b>	Expecting a rise in prices. <i>High points in the stock market cycle when investors are at their most <b>bullish</b>.</i>
<b><u>cathartic</u></b>	Providing psychological relief through the open expression of strong emotions; causing catharsis. <i>Crying is a <b>cathartic</b> release.</i>
<b><u>cognition</u></b>	A perception sensation idea or intuition resulting from the process of cognition.
<b><u>deranged</u></b>	Mad; insane. <i>A <b>deranged</b> gunman.</i>
<b>emotion</b>	Any strong feeling. <i>Responses have to be based on historical insight not simply on <b>emotion</b>.</i>
<b>emotional</b>	Of more than usual emotion. <i>He was a strongly <b>emotional</b> young man.</i>
<b>epistolary</b>	(of a literary work) in the form of letters. <i>An endless sequence of <b>epistolary</b> love affairs.</i>
<b>lyrical</b>	Suitable for or suggestive of singing. <i>He gained a devoted following for his <b>lyrical</b> cricket writing.</i>
<b>maladjustment</b>	Failure to cope with the demands of a normal social environment. <i>Basic <b>maladjustments</b> in the cost structure.</i>
<b>maudlin</b>	(of a book, film, or song) highly sentimental. <i>A bout of <b>maudlin</b> self pity.</i>
<b>mawkish</b>	Effusively or insincerely emotional. <i>A <b>mawkish</b> ode to parenthood.</i>
<b>melodrama</b>	Behaviour or events that resemble melodrama. <i>He abandoned <b>melodrama</b> for realism.</i>
<b><u>mental</u></b>	Of or relating to the mind. <i><b>Mental</b> illness.</i>
<b><u>moody</u></b>	Showing a brooding ill humor. <i>Grainy film which gives a soft <b>moody</b> effect.</i>

<b><u>pathos</u></b>	A feeling of sympathy and sorrow for the misfortunes of others. <i>The film captured all the <b>pathos</b> of their situation.</i>
<b>prosody</b>	Prosody a system of versification. <i>A general theory of <b>prosody</b>.</i>
<b><u>psychological</u></b>	Mental or emotional as opposed to physical in nature. <i><b>Psychological</b> warfare.</i>
<b><u>psychology</u></b>	The science of mental life. <i>The <b>psychology</b> of interpersonal relationships.</i>
<b><u>sensibility</u></b>	Sensitivity to sensory stimuli. <i>Cruelty offended his <b>sensibility</b>.</i>
<b><u>sentimental</u></b>	Given to or marked by sentiment or sentimentality. <i>A <b>sentimental</b> ballad.</i>
<b>sentimentality</b>	Extravagant or affected feeling or emotion. <i>There are passages which verge on <b>sentimentality</b>.</i>
<b>telepathy</b>	The supposed communication of thoughts or ideas by means other than the known senses.
<b>thinking</b>	Thoughts; meditations. <i><b>Thinking</b> always made him frown.</i>
<b>touched</b>	Slightly insane. <i>Very <b>touched</b> by the stranger's kindness.</i>
<b>unsentimental</b>	Not displaying or influenced by sentimental feelings. <i>The speeches were short and <b>unsentimental</b>.</i>
<b><u>upbeat</u></b>	(in music) an unaccented beat preceding an accented beat. <i>The town was finally on the <b>upbeat</b> after our recent troubles.</i>
<b>wellbeing</b>	A contented state of being happy and healthy and prosperous.
