
Sentiment as a Noun

- A view or opinion that is held or expressed.
- The expression of a view or desire especially as formulated for a toast.
- Tender, romantic, or nostalgic feeling or emotion.
- A feeling or emotion.
- General feeling or opinion.
- A personal belief or judgment that is not founded on proof or certainty.






Usage Examples of "Sentiment" as a noun
