bathetic	Effusively or insincerely emotional. <i>The movie manages to be poignant without becoming <b>bathetic</b>.</i>
cloying	Excessively sweet, rich, or sentimental, especially to a disgusting or sickening degree. A romantic rather <b>cloying</b> story.
dewy-eyed	Exhibiting childlike simplicity and credulity.
drippy	Effusively or insincerely emotional. A wet <b>drippy</b> day.



emotional	Arousing or characterized by intense feeling. He was a strongly <b>emotional</b> young man.
hokey	Noticeably contrived. A <b>hokey</b> country western accent.
<u>kitschy</u>	(of art, objects, or design) considered to be in poor taste because of excessive garishness or sentimentality, but sometimes appreciated in an ironic or knowing way. <i>Kitschy</i> pop culture.
loving	Feeling or showing love and affection. <i>Loving</i> glances.
maudlin	Self-pityingly or tearfully sentimental. <i>Maudlin</i> expressions of sympathy.
mawkish	Sentimental in an exaggerated or false way. The <b>mawkish</b> smell of warm beer.
misty-eyed	Having eyes blurred as with tears.
mushy	Effusively or insincerely emotional. A <b>mushy</b> film.
<u>nostalgic</u>	Feeling, evoking, or characterized by nostalgia. A <b>nostalgic</b> account of an idyllic childhood.
overemotional	Excessively or abnormally emotional. We re not an <b>overemotional</b> family.
<u>saccharine</u>	Relating to or containing sugar; sugary. <i>Saccharine music</i> .
sappy	(of a plant) containing a lot of sap. <b>Sappy</b> maple trees.
schmaltzy	Excessively sentimental. <b>Schmaltzy</b> ballads.
schmalzy	Effusively or insincerely emotional.
<u>sickly</u>	Somewhat ill or prone to illness. She liked her coffee sweet and <b>sickly</b> .
slushy	Resembling, consisting of, or covered with slush. <i>Slushy novels</i> .
soft	Soft and mild not harsh or stern or severe. <i>He must be going <b>soft</b> in the head.</i>
soppy	Wet through and through; thoroughly wet. My little sisters were too <b>soppy</b> for our adventurous games.



soupy	Mawkishly sentimental. The <b>soupy</b> air.
sugar-coated	Encrusted with sugar or syrup.
sugary	Excessively sentimental. Energy restoring <b>sugary</b> drinks.
syrupy	Overly sweet. <b>Syrupy</b> puddings.
tender	Hurting. <b>Tender</b> loving care.

delicate	A delicate fabric or garment. A <b>delicate</b> lace shawl.
deplore	Feel or express strong disapproval of (something. We <b>deplore</b> the government s treatment of political prisoners.
doting	Extremely and uncritically fond of someone; adoring. She was spoiled outrageously by her <b>doting</b> father.
emotional	Determined or actuated by emotion rather than reason. <i>He would become <b>emotional</b> over nothing at all.</i>

exhaustion	Extreme fatigue. The rapid <b>exhaustion</b> of fossil fuel reserves.
<u>farce</u>	The dramatic genre represented by farces. <i>He toured the backwoods in second rate farces.</i>
feel	Have a feeling or perception about oneself in reaction to someone s behavior or attitude. <i>The dead cannot feel</i> .
<u>fond</u>	Extravagantly or foolishly loving and indulgent. <b>Fond</b> of his nephew.
heartfelt	(of a feeling or its expression) deeply and strongly felt; sincere. <i>Our heartfelt thanks.</i>
lament	A mournful poem a lament for the dead. There were constant <b>lament</b> s about the conditions of employment.
loving	Feeling or showing love and affection. The cargo was described in <b>loving</b> detail.
maudlin	Effusively or insincerely emotional. <i>Maudlin</i> expressions of sympathy.
mawkish	Effusively or insincerely emotional. A <b>mawkish</b> ode to parenthood.
melodrama	Behaviour or events that resemble melodrama. <i>He gloated like a villain in a Victorian <b>melodrama</b>.</i>
mood	A characteristic (habitual or relatively temporary) state of feeling. A concept album which captures the <b>mood</b> of modern times.
<u>pathos</u>	A feeling of sympathy and sorrow for the misfortunes of others. The actor injects his customary humour and <b>pathos</b> into the role.
<u>pity</u>	A cause for regret or disappointment. It s a <b>pity</b> he couldn t do it.
<u>romantic</u>	A person with romantic beliefs or attitudes. <i>He s very handsome and so <b>romantic</b>.</i>
sadness	Emotions experienced when not in a state of well-being. A source of great <b>sadness</b> .
sensitiveness	Sensitivity to emotional feelings (of self and others. The <b>sensitiveness</b> of Mimosa leaves does not depend on a change of growth.
<u>sentiment</u>	General feeling or opinion. Public <b>sentiment</b> was on the side of reform.



sentimentality	, Falsely emotional in a maudlin way. There are passages which verge on <b>sentimentality</b> .
susceptibility	The state or fact of being likely or liable to be influenced or harmed by a particular thing. Lack of exercise increases <b>susceptibility</b> to disease.
tender	Make tender or more tender as by marinating pounding or applying a tenderizer. A <b>tender</b> glance.
touched	Slightly mad; crazy. You have to be a little <b>touched</b> to do my job.
touching	Arousing feelings of sympathy or gratitude. A <b>touching</b> reconciliation scene.
