## Sequence as a Noun

### Definitions of "Sequence" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “sequence” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A set of three or more playing cards of the same suit next to each other in value, for example 10, 9, 8.*
- *A part of a film dealing with one particular event or topic.*
- *A set of related events, movements, or items that follow each other in a particular order.*
- *Film consisting of a succession of related shots that develop a given subject in a movie.*
- *A particular order in which related things follow each other.*
- *A following of one thing after another in time.*
- *A repetition of a phrase or melody at a higher or lower pitch.*
- *An infinite ordered series of numerical quantities.*
- *Serial arrangement in which things follow in logical order or a recurrent pattern.*
- *The action of following in order.*
- *Several repetitions of a melodic phrase in different keys.*
- *(in the Eucharist) a hymn said or sung after the Gradual or Alleluia that precedes the Gospel.*

- *The order in which amino-acid or nucleotide residues are arranged in a protein, DNA, etc.*

### clip

The act of clipping or snipping.  
*He undid two **clips** and lifted the lid.*

### **concatenation**

A series of things depending on each other as if linked together.  
*A **concatenation** of events which had finally led to the murder.*

### **course**

A body of students who are taught together.  
*The government took a firm **course**.*

### cycle

A cycle per second one hertz.  
*A **cycle** of reprisal and retaliation.*

<b><u>episode</u></b>	A brief section of a literary or dramatic work that forms part of a connected series. <i>The final <b>episode</b> of the series.</i>
<b><u>excerpt</u></b>	A passage selected from a larger work. <i>He presented <b>excerpts</b> from William James philosophical writings.</i>
<b>extract</b>	A passage selected from a larger work. <i>An <b>extract</b> from a historical film.</i>
<b>line</b>	A dose of a powdered narcotic drug especially cocaine laid out in a line ready to be taken. <i>The letter consisted of three short <b>lines</b>.</i>
<b>order</b>	The position in which a rifle is held after ordering arms. <i>An explosion of a low <b>order</b> of magnitude.</i>
<b>pattern</b>	A repeated decorative design. <i>He set the <b>pattern</b> for subsequent study.</i>
<b><u>progression</u></b>	A passage or movement from one note or chord to another. <i>Good opportunities for career <b>progression</b>.</i>
<b>row</b>	The act of rowing as a sport. <i>A mackerel sky filled with <b>rows</b> of clouds.</i>
<b>run</b>	The act of running traveling on foot at a fast pace. <i>Varnish should be applied with care to avoid <b>runs</b> and an uneven surface.</i>
<b><u>scene</u></b>	The pieces of scenery used in a play or opera. <i><b>Scene</b> changes.</i>
<b><u>section</u></b>	A land unit equal to 1 square mile. <i>Nails of round <b>section</b>.</i>
<b>segment</b>	A part of a figure cut off by a line or plane intersecting it. <i>The market for private cars can be broken down into several <b>segments</b>.</i>
<b>series</b>	(sports) several contests played successively by the same teams. <i>They were investigating a <b>series</b> of bank robberies.</i>
<b>set</b>	Evil Egyptian god with the head of a beast that has high square ears and a long snout; brother and murderer of Osiris. <i>They played two <b>sets</b> of tennis after dinner.</i>
<b><u>string</u></b>	Stringed instruments that are played with a bow. <i>She wore a <b>string</b> of agates round her throat.</i>
<b>succession</b>	The action or process of inheriting a title, office, property, etc. <i>The Cretaceous <b>succession</b>.</i>
<b>successiveness</b>	A following of one thing after another in time.

**trail**

A trailer for a film or broadcast.  
*A tear left its **trail** on her cheek.*

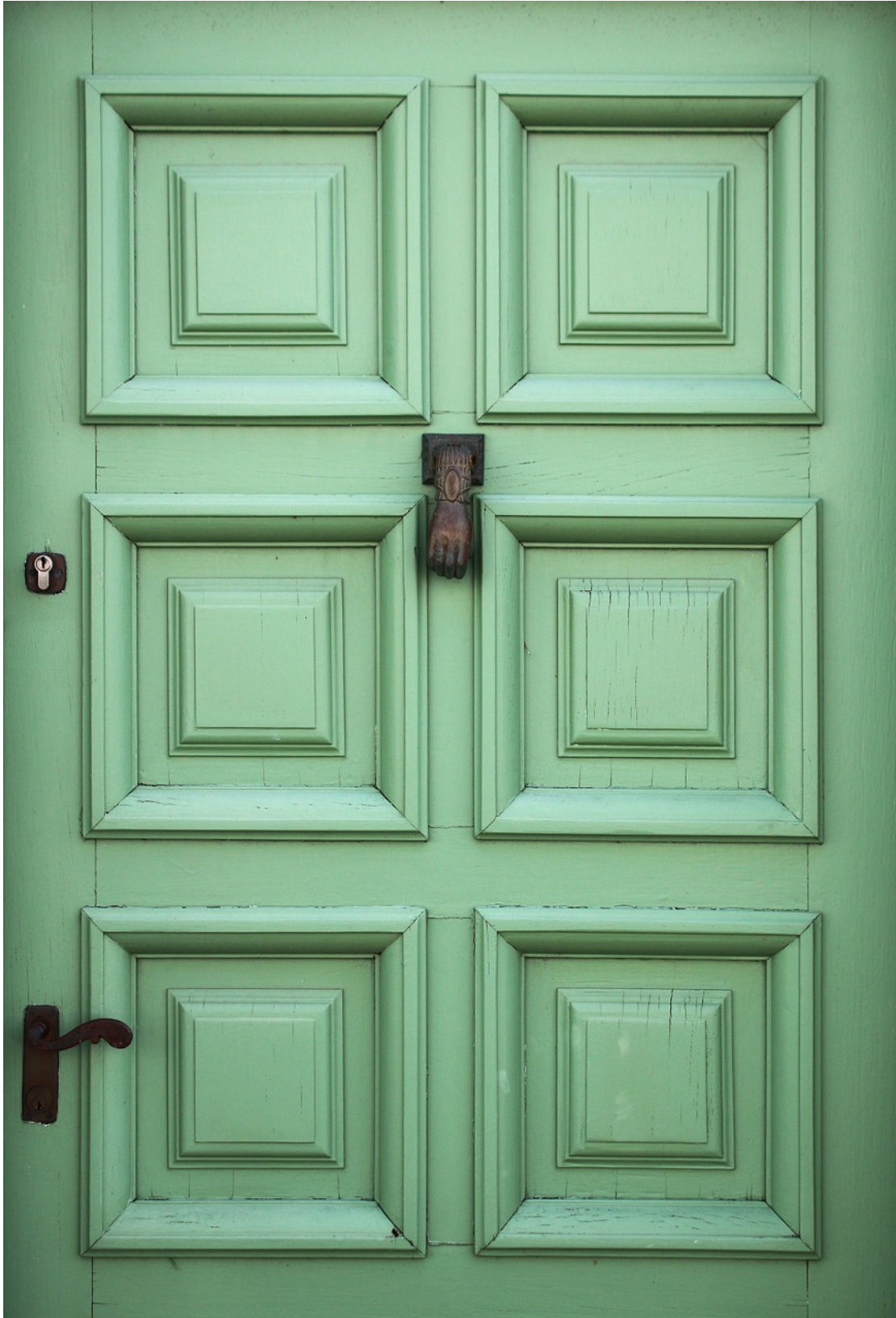
**train**

A sequentially ordered set of things or events or ideas in which each successive member is related to the preceding.  
*The journey took two hours by **train**.*

<b><u>ceaseless</u></b>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The fort was subjected to <b>ceaseless</b> bombardment.</i>
<b>concatenate</b>	Add by linking or joining so as to form a chain or series. <i>Some words may be <b>concatenated</b> such that certain sounds are omitted.</i>
<b><u>consecutive</u></b>	In a consecutive manner. <i>A <b>consecutive</b> pattern of what the film would be like.</i>
<b>constant</b>	A number representing a quantity assumed to have a fixed value in a specified mathematical context. <i>These discs rotate at a <b>constant</b> speed.</i>
<b><u>continual</u></b>	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>Some patients need <b>continual</b> safeguarding.</i>
<b><u>continuation</u></b>	A part added to a book or play that continues and extends it. <i>The <b>continuation</b> of discussions about a permanent peace.</i>
<b>continuing</b>	Remaining in force or being carried on without letup. <i>The <b>continuing</b> struggle to put food on the table.</i>
<b>continuity</b>	The unbroken and consistent existence or operation of something over time. <i>The BBC <b>continuity</b> announcer.</i>
<b>continuous</b>	Continuing in time or space without interruption- James Jeans. <i>A <b>continuous</b> rearrangement of electrons in the solar atoms results in the emission of light.</i>
<b><u>episode</u></b>	A section between two choric songs in Greek tragedy. <i>Acute psychotic <b>episodes</b>.</i>
<b>homologous</b>	(of chromosomes) pairing at meiosis and having the same structural features and pattern of genes. <i>The wing of a bat and the arm of a man are <b>homologous</b>.</i>
<b>incessant</b>	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>Night and day we live with the <b>incessant</b> noise of the city.</i>
<b><u>nonstop</u></b>	Occurring without stops. <i>How many <b>nonstops</b> are there to Dallas.</i>
<b><u>ongoing</u></b>	Currently happening. <i><b>Ongoing</b> negotiations.</i>

<b>perennial</b>	A perennial plant. <i>His <b>perennial</b> distrust of the media.</i>
<b>permanence</b>	The state or quality of lasting or remaining unchanged indefinitely. <i>The clarity and <b>permanence</b> of the dyes.</i>
<b>perpetual</b>	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>Their <b>perpetual</b> money worries.</i>
<b>relentless</b>	Harsh or inflexible. <i>The <b>relentless</b> beat of the drums.</i>
<b>repetitive</b>	Repetitive and persistent. <i>A <b>repetitive</b> task.</i>
<b>sequel</b>	A part added to a book or play that continues and extends it. <i>The Prisoner of Zenda and its <b>sequel</b>.</i>
<b>sequential</b>	In regular succession without gaps. <i><b>Sequential</b> processing of data files.</i>
<b>seriatim</b>	In a series; one after another. <i>It is proposed to deal with these matters <b>seriatim</b>.</i>
<b>series</b>	A range of products sharing features of design or assembly and marketed with a separate number from other lines. <i>A <b>series</b> III SWB Land Rover.</i>
<b>similarity</b>	A Gestalt principle of organization holding that (other things being equal) parts of a stimulus field that are similar to each other tend to be perceived as belonging together as a unit. <i>The <b>similarity</b> of symptoms makes them hard to diagnose.</i>
<b>succession</b>	The process by which a plant or animal community successively gives way to another until a stable climax is reached. <i>She had been secretary to a <b>succession</b> of board directors.</i>
<b>successive</b>	In regular succession without gaps. <i>They were looking for their fifth <b>successive</b> win.</i>
<b>successively</b>	Immediately one after another. <i>He served <b>successively</b> as a major and a lieutenant colonel.</i>
<b>unceasing</b>	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>The <b>unceasing</b> efforts of the staff.</i>
<b>unchanging</b>	Showing little if any change. <i>The party stood for <b>unchanging</b> principles.</i>
<b>uninterrupted</b>	Without a break in continuity. <i>The window gives an <b>uninterrupted</b> view of the mountains.</i>
