Definitions of "Sequence" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “sequence” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A set of three or more playing cards of the same suit next to each other in value, for example 10, 9, 8.*
- *A part of a film dealing with one particular event or topic.*
- *A set of related events, movements, or items that follow each other in a particular order.*
- *Film consisting of a succession of related shots that develop a given subject in a movie.*
- *A particular order in which related things follow each other.*
- *A following of one thing after another in time.*
- *A repetition of a phrase or melody at a higher or lower pitch.*
- *An infinite ordered series of numerical quantities.*
- *Serial arrangement in which things follow in logical order or a recurrent pattern.*
- *The action of following in order.*
- *Several repetitions of a melodic phrase in different keys.*
- *(in the Eucharist) a hymn said or sung after the Gradual or Alleluia that precedes the Gospel.*

- *The order in which amino-acid or nucleotide residues are arranged in a protein, DNA, etc.*

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| <u>episode</u> | A brief section of a literary or dramatic work that forms part of a connected series. <i>The final episode of the series.</i> |
| <u>excerpt</u> | A passage selected from a larger work. <i>He presented excerpts from William James philosophical writings.</i> |
| extract | A passage selected from a larger work. <i>An extract from a historical film.</i> |
| line | A dose of a powdered narcotic drug especially cocaine laid out in a line ready to be taken. <i>The letter consisted of three short lines.</i> |
| order | The position in which a rifle is held after ordering arms. <i>An explosion of a low order of magnitude.</i> |
| pattern | A repeated decorative design. <i>He set the pattern for subsequent study.</i> |
| <u>progression</u> | A passage or movement from one note or chord to another. <i>Good opportunities for career progression.</i> |
| row | The act of rowing as a sport. <i>A mackerel sky filled with rows of clouds.</i> |
| run | The act of running traveling on foot at a fast pace. <i>Varnish should be applied with care to avoid runs and an uneven surface.</i> |
| <u>scene</u> | The pieces of scenery used in a play or opera. <i>Scene changes.</i> |
| <u>section</u> | A land unit equal to 1 square mile. <i>Nails of round section.</i> |
| segment | A part of a figure cut off by a line or plane intersecting it. <i>The market for private cars can be broken down into several segments.</i> |
| series | (sports) several contests played successively by the same teams. <i>They were investigating a series of bank robberies.</i> |
| set | Evil Egyptian god with the head of a beast that has high square ears and a long snout; brother and murderer of Osiris. <i>They played two sets of tennis after dinner.</i> |
| <u>string</u> | Stringed instruments that are played with a bow. <i>She wore a string of agates round her throat.</i> |
| succession | The action or process of inheriting a title, office, property, etc. <i>The Cretaceous succession.</i> |
| successiveness | A following of one thing after another in time. |

trail

A trailer for a film or broadcast.
*A tear left its **trail** on her cheek.*

train

A sequentially ordered set of things or events or ideas in which each successive member is related to the preceding.
*The journey took two hours by **train**.*

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| <u>ceaseless</u> | Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The fort was subjected to ceaseless bombardment.</i> |
| concatenate | Add by linking or joining so as to form a chain or series. <i>Some words may be concatenated such that certain sounds are omitted.</i> |
| <u>consecutive</u> | In a consecutive manner. <i>A consecutive pattern of what the film would be like.</i> |
| constant | A number representing a quantity assumed to have a fixed value in a specified mathematical context. <i>These discs rotate at a constant speed.</i> |
| <u>continual</u> | Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>Some patients need continual safeguarding.</i> |
| <u>continuation</u> | A part added to a book or play that continues and extends it. <i>The continuation of discussions about a permanent peace.</i> |
| continuing | Remaining in force or being carried on without letup. <i>The continuing struggle to put food on the table.</i> |
| continuity | The unbroken and consistent existence or operation of something over time. <i>The BBC continuity announcer.</i> |
| continuous | Continuing in time or space without interruption- James Jeans. <i>A continuous rearrangement of electrons in the solar atoms results in the emission of light.</i> |
| <u>episode</u> | A section between two choric songs in Greek tragedy. <i>Acute psychotic episodes.</i> |
| homologous | (of chromosomes) pairing at meiosis and having the same structural features and pattern of genes. <i>The wing of a bat and the arm of a man are homologous.</i> |
| incessant | (of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>Night and day we live with the incessant noise of the city.</i> |
| <u>nonstop</u> | Occurring without stops. <i>How many nonstops are there to Dallas.</i> |
| <u>ongoing</u> | Currently happening. <i>Ongoing negotiations.</i> |

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| perennial | A perennial plant. <i>His perennial distrust of the media.</i> |
| permanence | The state or quality of lasting or remaining unchanged indefinitely. <i>The clarity and permanence of the dyes.</i> |
| perpetual | Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>Their perpetual money worries.</i> |
| relentless | Harsh or inflexible. <i>The relentless beat of the drums.</i> |
| repetitive | Repetitive and persistent. <i>A repetitive task.</i> |
| sequel | A part added to a book or play that continues and extends it. <i>The Prisoner of Zenda and its sequel.</i> |
| sequential | In regular succession without gaps. <i>Sequential processing of data files.</i> |
| seriatim | In a series; one after another. <i>It is proposed to deal with these matters seriatim.</i> |
| series | A range of products sharing features of design or assembly and marketed with a separate number from other lines. <i>A series III SWB Land Rover.</i> |
| similarity | A Gestalt principle of organization holding that (other things being equal) parts of a stimulus field that are similar to each other tend to be perceived as belonging together as a unit. <i>The similarity of symptoms makes them hard to diagnose.</i> |
| succession | The process by which a plant or animal community successively gives way to another until a stable climax is reached. <i>She had been secretary to a succession of board directors.</i> |
| successive | In regular succession without gaps. <i>They were looking for their fifth successive win.</i> |
| successively | Immediately one after another. <i>He served successively as a major and a lieutenant colonel.</i> |
| unceasing | Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>The unceasing efforts of the staff.</i> |
| unchanging | Showing little if any change. <i>The party stood for unchanging principles.</i> |
| uninterrupted | Without a break in continuity. <i>The window gives an uninterrupted view of the mountains.</i> |
