Synonyms of "Serene" as an adjective (26 Words)

calm

(of a place) peaceful after violent activity.

*The city was reported to be **calm** but army patrols remained.*

collected

(of a horse) moving with a shortened stride and with its hind legs correctly placed to achieve balance and impulsion.

*The **collected** works of Shakespeare.*

composed	Serenely self-possessed and free from agitation especially in times of stress. <i>I felt calm and more composed than I had in a long time.</i>
cool, calm, and collected	Fashionable and attractive at the time; often skilled or socially adept.
equable	Not varying or fluctuating greatly. <i>An equable temper.</i>
even-tempered	Not easily irritated.
<u>imperturbable</u>	Not easily perturbed or excited or upset; marked by extreme calm and composure. <i>An imperturbable self possession.</i>
pacific	Disposed to peace or of a peaceful nature. <i>The result of this pacific policy was that no troops were called up.</i>
peaceful	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. <i>She said her dad was a peaceful man who was always happy.</i>
<u>placid</u>	Not easily irritated. <i>A ribbon of sand between the angry sea and the placid bay.</i>
<u>poised</u>	In full control of your faculties. <i>A gull in poised flight.</i>
quiet	Characterized by an absence or near absence of agitation or activity. <i>His quiet middle aged parents.</i>
relaxed	(of a muscle or other body part) not tense. <i>Gave the impression of being quite relaxed.</i>
relaxing	Affording physical or mental rest. <i>The warm water was very relaxing.</i>
<u>restful</u>	Affording physical or mental rest. <i>The rooms were cool and restful.</i>
self-possessed	In full control of your faculties.
<u>soothing</u>	Reducing pain or discomfort. <i>Almond oil is renowned for its soothing properties.</i>
still	Not sparkling. <i>The night was still.</i>
<u>tranquil</u>	(of a body of water) free from disturbance by heavy waves. <i>Tranquil life in the country.</i>
unagitated	Not agitated or disturbed emotionally.

undisturbed

Untroubled by interference or disturbance.
*A quiet weekend of **undisturbed** tranquillity.*

unexcitable

Not easily excited.
*An **unexcitable** temperament.*

unperturbed

Free from emotional agitation or nervous tension.
*Kenneth seems **unperturbed** by the news.*

unruffled

Free from emotional agitation or nervous tension- Anthony Trollope.
*Robbie seemed **unruffled** by her words.*

untroubled

Not beset by troubles or disturbance or distress.
***Untroubled** times.*

unworried

Free of trouble and worry and care.
*Foreign investors are largely **unworried** by the government's fall.*



Usage Examples of "Serene" as an adjective

- *He remained serene in the midst of turbulence.*
- *Serene skies and a bright blue sea.*
- *A serene expression on her face.*
- *Her eyes were closed and she looked very serene.*
- *Serene certainty.*

ambience	The character and atmosphere of a place. <i>The relaxed ambience of the cocktail lounge is popular with guests.</i>
calm	The absence of strong emotions calm feelings. <i>The night was clear and calm.</i>
calming	The act of appeasing (as by acceding to the demands of).
composed	Serenely self-possessed and free from agitation especially in times of stress. <i>A very talented and composed young player.</i>
coolheaded	Marked by calm self-control (especially in trying circumstances); unemotional. <i>Stayed coolheaded in the crisis.</i>
halcyon	Idyllically calm and peaceful; suggesting happy tranquillity. <i>The halcyon days of the mid 1980s when profits were soaring.</i>

<u>idyllic</u>	Like an idyll; extremely happy, peaceful, or picturesque. <i>An idyllic spot for a picnic.</i>
<u>imperturbable</u>	Unable to be upset or excited; calm. <i>Hitherto imperturbable he now showed signs of alarm.</i>
noiseless	Making no sound- Shakespeare. <i>The cycle is a noiseless form of transport.</i>
nonviolence	Peaceful resistance to a government by fasting or refusing to cooperate.
nonviolent	Achieved without bloodshed.
pacific	The largest ocean in the world. <i>The pacific temper seeks to settle disputes on grounds of justice rather than by force.</i>
<u>pacifist</u>	A person who believes that war and violence are unjustifiable. <i>She was a committed pacifist all her life.</i>
peaceable	Inclined to avoid conflict or dissent. <i>In a peaceable and orderly manner.</i>
peaceful	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. <i>She said her dad was a peaceful man who was always happy.</i>
peacetime	A period when a country is not at war. <i>In peacetime regiments were billeted upon towns and villages.</i>
pigeon	A pigeon descended from the wild rock dove kept for racing showing and carrying messages and common as a feral bird in towns.
<u>placid</u>	Free from disturbance by heavy waves. <i>Remained placid despite the repeated delays.</i>
quiescent	Causing no symptoms. <i>The quiescent melancholy of the town.</i>
quietude	A state of peace and quiet. <i>A moment of quietude.</i>
relaxing	Affording physical or mental rest. <i>The warm water was very relaxing.</i>
<u>restful</u>	Having a quiet and soothing quality. <i>She spent a restful night at home.</i>
<u>rustic</u>	A small brownish European moth. <i>Rustic awkwardness.</i>
<u>stillness</u>	(poetic) tranquil silence. <i>An eerie stillness engulfed the camp.</i>
<u>tranquil</u>	(of a body of water) free from disturbance by heavy waves. <i>The sea was tranquil.</i>

tranquility	An untroubled state; free from disturbances.
tranquelize	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to.
tranquillity	A state of peace and quiet. <i>Passing cars are the only noise that disturbs the tranquillity of rural life.</i>
unarmed	(used of persons or the military) not having or using arms. <i>He was shooting unarmed civilians.</i>
unflappable	Not easily perturbed or excited or upset; marked by extreme calm and composure. <i>Unflappable in a crisis.</i>
