### Definitions of "Servitude" as a noun

- *The state of being a slave or completely subject to someone more powerful.*
- *The subjection of property to an easement.*
- *State of subjection to an owner or master or forced labor imposed as punishment.*

<b>abolition</b>	The act of abolishing a system or practice or institution (especially abolishing slavery. <i>The <b>abolition</b> of capital punishment.</i>
<b><u>bucolic</u></b>	A short poem descriptive of rural or pastoral life. <i>A pleasant <b>bucolic</b> scene.</i>
<b>captivity</b>	The state of being a slave-Shakespeare. <i>He was held in <b>captivity</b> until he died.</i>
<b>confinement</b>	The act of keeping something within specified bounds (by force if necessary. <i>He was immediately released from his <b>confinement</b>.</i>
<b>enforced</b>	Caused by necessity or force; compulsory. <i><b>Enforced</b> obedience.</i>
<b>enslavement</b>	The act of making slaves of your captives. <i>The <b>enslavement</b> of millions of Africans.</i>
<b><u>expel</u></b>	Force to leave or move out. <i>She was <b>expelled</b> from school.</i>
<b>exploitation</b>	The action of making use of and benefiting from resources. <i>The <b>exploitation</b> of copper deposits.</i>
<b><u>farmer</u></b>	A person who operates a farm.
<b>feudal</b>	According to resembling or denoting the system of feudalism. <i>His view of patriotism was more than old fashioned it was positively <b>feudal</b>.</i>
<b>forced</b>	Forced or compelled. <i>A <b>forced</b> landing.</i>
<b>intelligentsia</b>	An educated and intellectual elite. <i>A distrust of the <b>intelligentsia</b> and of theoretical learning.</i>
<b>labor</b>	A social class comprising those who do manual labor or work for wages. <i>His <b>labor</b> did not require a great deal of skill.</i>
<b>laity</b>	Ordinary people, as distinct from professionals or experts.
<b><u>liberate</u></b>	Steal (something). <i>The energy <b>liberated</b> by the annihilation of matter is huge.</i>

<b>manumission</b>	The formal act of freeing from slavery. <i>A leading advocate of <b>manumission</b>.</i>
<b>manumit</b>	Release from slavery; set free. <i>Old Angus had never <b>manumitted</b> a single slave.</i>
<b>peasant</b>	A crude uncouth ill-bred person lacking culture or refinement. <i>That is a civilized drink you <b>peasant</b>.</i>
<b>peon</b>	A person who does menial work. <i>Racing drivers aren't exactly nine to five <b>peons</b>.</i>
<b>reaper</b>	A person or machine that harvests a crop.
<b>runaway</b>	Someone who flees from an uncongenial situation. <i>A teenage <b>runaway</b>.</i>
<b>rustic</b>	Made in a plain and simple fashion. <i>They paused to watch the <b>rustics</b> dance and carouse.</i>
<b>serf</b>	A person who is bound to the land and owned by the feudal lord.
<b>serfdom</b>	The state of being a serf or feudal labourer. <i>The liberation of the peasants from <b>serfdom</b>.</i>
<b>slavery</b>	Excessive dependence on or devotion to something. <i>He was resolved to impose a number of reforms including the abolition of <b>slavery</b>.</i>
<b>thrall</b>	The state of being under the control of another person. <i>The town in <b>thrall</b> to a villain.</i>
<b>vassalage</b>	The state of a serf.
<b>vendible</b>	Fit to be offered for sale.
