enslavement	The act of making slaves of your captives. <i>The enslavement of millions of Africans.</i>
slavery	Excessive dependence on or devotion to something. <i>He was resolved to impose a number of reforms including the abolition of slavery.</i>
subjection	The action of subjecting a country or person to one’s control, or the fact of being subjected. <i>The country’s subjection to European colonialism.</i>
subjugation	The act of conquering. <i>The colonial subjugation of a country by means of brute military force.</i>

Associations of "Servitude" (30 Words)

abolition	The act of abolishing a system or practice or institution (especially abolishing slavery. <i>The abolition of capital punishment.</i>
bucolic	A short poem descriptive of rural or pastoral life. <i>A pleasant bucolic scene.</i>
captivity	The state of being a slave-Shakespeare. <i>He was held in captivity until he died.</i>
confinement	The act of keeping something within specified bounds (by force if necessary. <i>He was immediately released from his confinement.</i>
enforced	Caused by necessity or force; compulsory. <i>Enforced obedience.</i>
enslavement	The act of making slaves of your captives. <i>The enslavement of millions of Africans.</i>
expel	Force to leave or move out. <i>She was expelled from school.</i>
exploitation	The action of making use of and benefiting from resources. <i>The exploitation of copper deposits.</i>
farmer	A person who operates a farm.
feudal	According to resembling or denoting the system of feudalism. <i>His view of patriotism was more than old fashioned it was positively feudal.</i>
forced	Forced or compelled. <i>A forced landing.</i>
intelligentsia	An educated and intellectual elite. <i>A distrust of the intelligentsia and of theoretical learning.</i>
labor	A social class comprising those who do manual labor or work for wages. <i>His labor did not require a great deal of skill.</i>
laity	Ordinary people, as distinct from professionals or experts.
liberate	Steal (something). <i>The energy liberated by the annihilation of matter is huge.</i>

manumission	The formal act of freeing from slavery. <i>A leading advocate of manumission.</i>
manumit	Release from slavery; set free. <i>Old Angus had never manumitted a single slave.</i>
peasant	A crude uncouth ill-bred person lacking culture or refinement. <i>That is a civilized drink you peasant.</i>
peon	A person who does menial work. <i>Racing drivers aren't exactly nine to five peons.</i>
reaper	A person or machine that harvests a crop.
runaway	Someone who flees from an uncongenial situation. <i>A teenage runaway.</i>
rustic	Made in a plain and simple fashion. <i>They paused to watch the rustics dance and carouse.</i>
serf	A person who is bound to the land and owned by the feudal lord.
serfdom	The state of being a serf or feudal labourer. <i>The liberation of the peasants from serfdom.</i>
slavery	Excessive dependence on or devotion to something. <i>He was resolved to impose a number of reforms including the abolition of slavery.</i>
thrall	The state of being under the control of another person. <i>The town in thrall to a villain.</i>
vassalage	The state of a serf.
vendible	Fit to be offered for sale.
