<b>plenary</b>	A meeting or session attended by all participants at a conference or assembly. <i>Working parties would report back to the <b>plenary</b> with recommendations.</i>
<b>school term</b>	A large group of fish.
<b>school year</b>	A building where young people receive education.
<b>seance</b>	A meeting of spiritualists. <i>The <b>seance</b> was held in the medium's parlor.</i>
<b>sitting</b>	A period of time spent as a model for an artist or photographer. <i>There will be two <b>sittings</b> for Christmas lunch.</i>
<b>spell</b>	A time period for working (after which you will be relieved by someone else). <i>A <b>spell</b> of good weather.</i>
<b>stretch</b>	A stretch limo. <i>Running at full <b>stretch</b>.</i>
<b>time</b>	Time as allotted available or used. <i>The landlord called <b>time</b>.</i>

<b>glimpse</b>	Catch a glimpse of or see briefly. <i>She caught a <b>glimpse</b> of the ocean.</i>
<b>instant</b>	Instant coffee. <i>An <b>instant</b> need.</i>
<b>interlude</b>	Perform an interlude. <i>The romantic <b>interlude</b> palled rapidly once he was back in town.</i>
<b>layover</b>	A brief stay in the course of a journey. <i>There was only a forty eight minute <b>layover</b>.</i>
<b>meeting</b>	The act of joining together as one. <i>He still remembers their <b>meeting</b> in Paris.</i>
<b>minutes</b>	A written account of what transpired at a meeting.
<b>moment</b>	A quantity that expresses the average or expected value of the first second third or fourth power of the deviation of each component of a frequency distribution from a given value typically mean or zero The first moment is the mean the second moment the variance the third moment the skew and the fourth moment the kurtosis. <i>Wait just a <b>moment</b>.</i>
<b>overview</b>	A general summary of a subject. <i>The report <b>overviews</b> the needs of the community.</i>
<b>pithiness</b>	Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.

<b>provisional</b>	A provisional stamp. <b>Provisional</b> bookings.
<b>short</b>	Tending to crumble or break into flakes due to a large amount of shortening. He said <b>shortly</b> that he didn't like it.
<b>sitting</b>	Not moving and therefore easy to attack. The resignation of the <b>sitting</b> member.
<b><u>snapshot</u></b>	A shot in soccer or hockey taken quickly with little backlift. A collection of family <b>snapshots</b> .
<b>stopover</b>	A brief stay in the course of a journey. They made a <b>stopover</b> to visit their friends.
<b><u>succinct</u></b>	(especially of something written or spoken) briefly and clearly expressed. <b>Succinct</b> comparisons.
