## Several as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Several" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “several” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Separate or respective.*
- *Applied or regarded separately.*
- *(used with count nouns) of an indefinite number more than 2 or 3 but not many.*
- *Distinct and individual.*
- *Considered individually.*
- *Of an indefinite number more than 2 or 3 but not many.*



## Synonyms of "Several" as an adjective (6 Words)

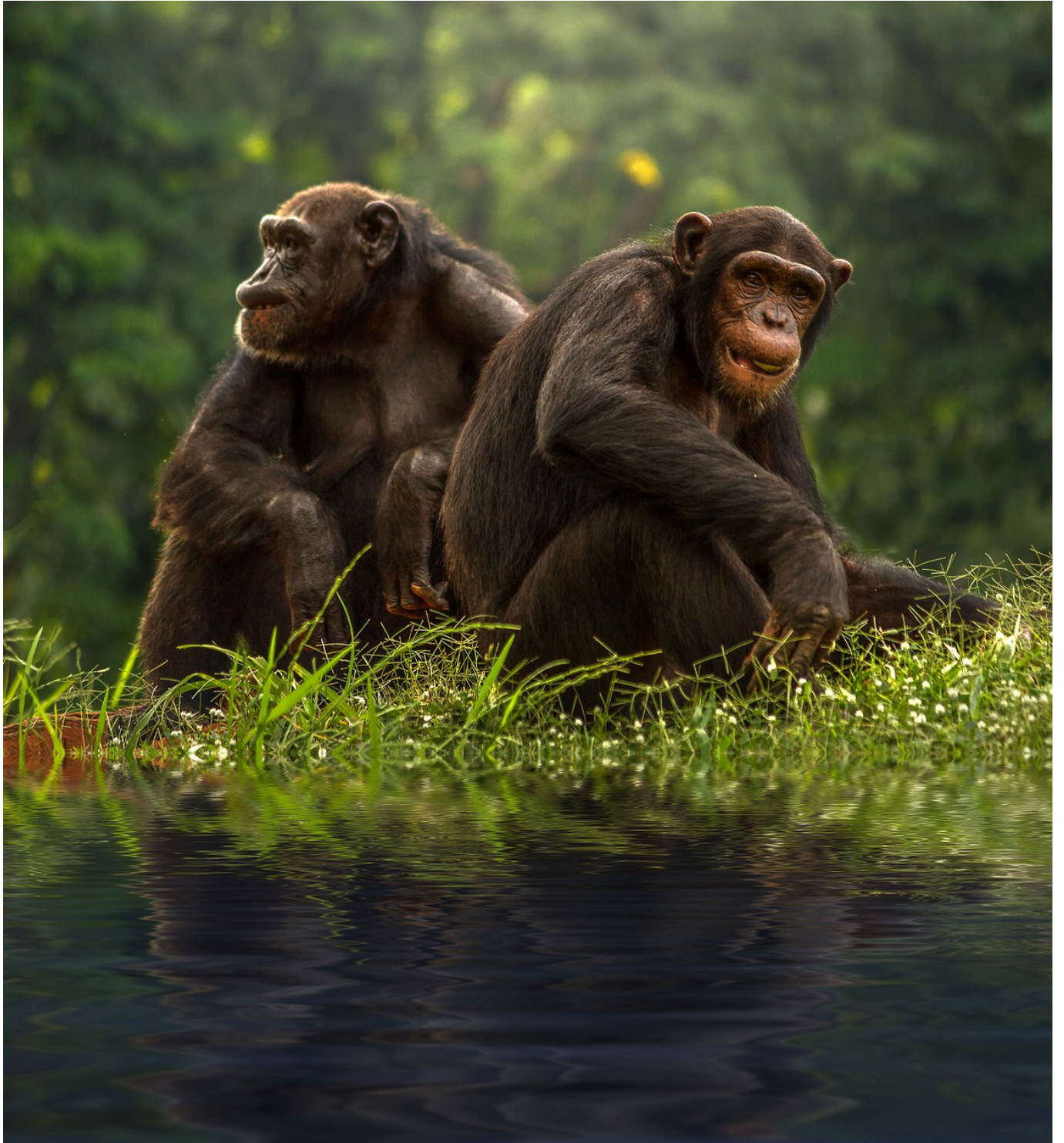
- individual** Of or for a particular person.  
*We all have **individual** cars.*
- own** Done or produced by and for the person mentioned.  
*Do your **own** thing.*
- particular** Separate and distinct from others of the same group or category.  
*A **particular** description of the room.*
- respective** Belonging or relating separately to each of two or more people or things.  
*The **respective** club members.*
- specific** Being or affecting a disease produced by a particular microorganism or condition; used also of stains or dyes used in making microscope slides.  
*Rules with **specific** application.*
- various** Having or showing different properties or qualities.  
*Dresses of **various** colours.*

- *Three several times.*
- *Several people were injured in the accident.*
- *Specialists in their several fields.*
- *The two levels of government sort out their several responsibilities.*
- *Several letters came in the mail.*





## Associations of "Several" (30 Words)

<b>about</b>	(of quantities) imprecise but fairly close to correct. <i>Let s look <b>about</b> for help.</i>
<b><u>almost</u></b>	(of actions or states) slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>He <b>almost</b> knocked Georgina over.</i>
<b>approximately</b>	(of quantities) imprecise but fairly close to correct. <i>A journey of <b>approximately</b> two hours.</i>
<b>around</b>	All around or on all sides. <i>Waited <b>around</b> for the next flight.</i>
<b>bit</b>	The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press. <i>I fell asleep for a <b>bit</b>.</i>
<b>equidistant</b>	The same distance apart at every point. <i>The line joins together all points which are <b>equidistant</b> from the two axes.</i>
<b><u>few</u></b>	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by `a'; a small but indefinite number. <i>It was designed for the discriminating <b>few</b>.</i>
<b><u>handful</u></b>	The quantity that can be held in the hand. <i>A small <b>handful</b> of fresh coriander.</i>
<b>least</b>	Used in names of very small animals and plants e g least shrew. <i>He has the <b>least</b> talent of anyone.</i>
<b><u>less</u></b>	(usually preceded by `no') lower in quality. <i>In 25 words or <b>less</b>.</i>
<b>little</b>	Used in names of animals and plants that are smaller than related kinds e g little grebe. <i>He accepted the <b>little</b> they gave him.</i>
<b><u>mere</u></b>	Used to emphasize that the fact of something being present in a situation is enough to influence that situation. <i>The city is a <b>mere</b> 20 minutes from some stunning countryside.</i>
<b>mini</b>	Denoting a miniature version of something. <i>A leather <b>mini</b>.</i>
<b><u>minimal</u></b>	Characterized by the repetition and gradual alteration of short phrases. <i>Production costs are <b>minimal</b>.</i>
<b><u>minimum</u></b>	The point on a curve where the tangent changes from negative on the left to positive on the right. <i>Clients with a <b>minimum</b> of 500 000 to invest.</i>

<b><u>nearly</u></b>	Closely. <i>The person most <b>nearly</b> concerned.</i>
<b><u>partially</u></b>	To some extent; in some degree; not wholly. <i>A <b>partially</b> open door.</i>
<b><u>practically</u></b>	In a practical manner. <i>The place was <b>practically</b> empty.</i>
<b>rarefaction</b>	Reduction in the density of something, especially air or a gas. <i>A series of <b>rarefactions</b> and compactions.</i>
<b><u>rather</u></b>	To some (great or small) extent. <i>I <b>rather</b> regret that I cannot attend.</i>
<b><u>respective</u></b>	Belonging or relating separately to each of two or more people or things. <i>The <b>respective</b> club members.</i>
<b><u>roughly</u></b>	With roughness or violence rough is an informal variant for roughly. <i>The man picked me up <b>roughly</b>.</i>
<b><u>scarce</u></b>	Scarcely. <i>As raw materials became <b>scarce</b> synthetics were developed.</i>
<b>smattering</b>	A small number or amount. <i>Edward had only a <b>smattering</b> of Welsh.</i>
<b><u>some</u></b>	To some extent quite a lot. <i>He needs feeding up <b>some</b>.</i>
<b>soupcon</b>	A slight but appreciable amount.
<b>trifle</b>	A thing of little value or importance. <i>The thousand yen he d paid seemed the merest <b>trifle</b>.</i>
<b><u>various</u></b>	Of many different kinds purposefully arranged but lacking any uniformity. <i>Animals as <b>various</b> as the jaguar and the cavy and the sloth.</i>
<b><u>virtually</u></b>	In essence or effect but not in fact. <i>The disease destroyed <b>virtually</b> all the vineyards in Orange County.</i>
<b>wee</b>	Very small. <i>The <b>wee</b> hours of the morning.</i>
