Definitions of "Several" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “several” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Separate or respective.*
- *Applied or regarded separately.*
- *(used with count nouns) of an indefinite number more than 2 or 3 but not many.*
- *Distinct and individual.*
- *Considered individually.*
- *Of an indefinite number more than 2 or 3 but not many.*



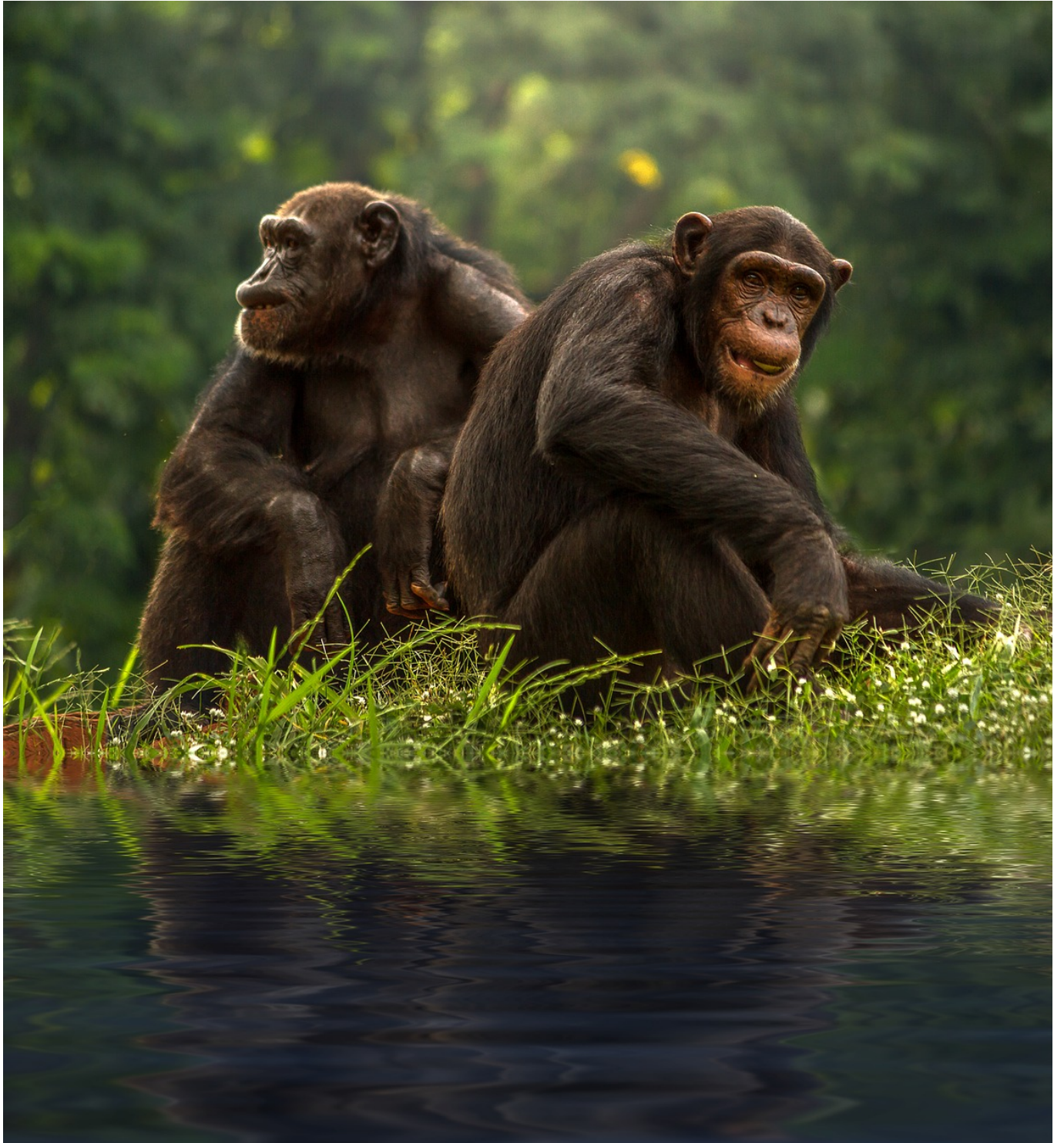
Synonyms of "Several" as an adjective (6 Words)

- individual** Of or for a particular person.
*We all have **individual** cars.*
- own** Done or produced by and for the person mentioned.
*Do your **own** thing.*
- particular** Separate and distinct from others of the same group or category.
*A **particular** description of the room.*
- respective** Belonging or relating separately to each of two or more people or things.
*The **respective** club members.*
- specific** Being or affecting a disease produced by a particular microorganism or condition; used also of stains or dyes used in making microscope slides.
*Rules with **specific** application.*
- various** Having or showing different properties or qualities.
*Dresses of **various** colours.*



Usage Examples of "Several" as an adjective

- *Three several times.*
- *Several people were injured in the accident.*
- *Specialists in their several fields.*
- *The two levels of government sort out their several responsibilities.*
- *Several letters came in the mail.*



Associations of "Several" (30 Words)

about	(of quantities) imprecise but fairly close to correct. <i>Let s look about for help.</i>
<u>almost</u>	(of actions or states) slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>He almost knocked Georgina over.</i>
approximately	(of quantities) imprecise but fairly close to correct. <i>A journey of approximately two hours.</i>
around	All around or on all sides. <i>Waited around for the next flight.</i>
bit	The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press. <i>I fell asleep for a bit.</i>
equidistant	The same distance apart at every point. <i>The line joins together all points which are equidistant from the two axes.</i>
<u>few</u>	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by `a'; a small but indefinite number. <i>It was designed for the discriminating few.</i>
<u>handful</u>	The quantity that can be held in the hand. <i>A small handful of fresh coriander.</i>
least	Used in names of very small animals and plants e g least shrew. <i>He has the least talent of anyone.</i>
<u>less</u>	(usually preceded by `no') lower in quality. <i>In 25 words or less.</i>
little	Used in names of animals and plants that are smaller than related kinds e g little grebe. <i>He accepted the little they gave him.</i>
<u>mere</u>	Used to emphasize that the fact of something being present in a situation is enough to influence that situation. <i>The city is a mere 20 minutes from some stunning countryside.</i>
mini	Denoting a miniature version of something. <i>A leather mini.</i>
<u>minimal</u>	Characterized by the repetition and gradual alteration of short phrases. <i>Production costs are minimal.</i>
<u>minimum</u>	The point on a curve where the tangent changes from negative on the left to positive on the right. <i>Clients with a minimum of 500 000 to invest.</i>

<u>nearly</u>	Closely. <i>The person most nearly concerned.</i>
<u>partially</u>	To some extent; in some degree; not wholly. <i>A partially open door.</i>
<u>practically</u>	In a practical manner. <i>The place was practically empty.</i>
rarefaction	Reduction in the density of something, especially air or a gas. <i>A series of rarefactions and compactions.</i>
<u>rather</u>	To some (great or small) extent. <i>I rather regret that I cannot attend.</i>
<u>respective</u>	Belonging or relating separately to each of two or more people or things. <i>The respective club members.</i>
<u>roughly</u>	With roughness or violence rough is an informal variant for roughly. <i>The man picked me up roughly.</i>
<u>scarce</u>	Scarcely. <i>As raw materials became scarce synthetics were developed.</i>
smattering	A small number or amount. <i>Edward had only a smattering of Welsh.</i>
<u>some</u>	To some extent quite a lot. <i>He needs feeding up some.</i>
soupcon	A slight but appreciable amount.
trifle	A thing of little value or importance. <i>The thousand yen he d paid seemed the merest trifle.</i>
<u>various</u>	Of many different kinds purposefully arranged but lacking any uniformity. <i>Animals as various as the jaguar and the cavy and the sloth.</i>
<u>virtually</u>	In essence or effect but not in fact. <i>The disease destroyed virtually all the vineyards in Orange County.</i>
wee	Very small. <i>The wee hours of the morning.</i>
